Whitehall, June 29.

E received this morning an Account that the Earl of Feversham Lieutenant-General of his Majesties Forces, having notice that the Rebels were going to Philipsnorton, he marched from Bath on Saturday last very early, with intention to fall upon their Rear, and for that purpose advanced with a Detachement of 500 Foot commanded by the Duke of Grafton, and of Dragoons, and Horse Grenadiers, leaving the rest of the Forces to follow with the Cannon; And coming to a Lane that leads into Philipfnorton, he heard some Musquet-shots, and thereupon detached 20 of the Horse-Guards with the Company of Foot Granadiers of the Duke of Grafton's Regiment to go into that Lane to discover what it was; The Lane was soon after lined on both sides with Foot and Horse behind the Hedges, who made a very great Fire upon our men; The Duke of Grafton was with them, and went as far as the Gate of the Town with as much courage and resolution as can be ex-pressed; but the Enemy continuing their fire, he retired, and in his retreat was stopt by some of the Rebels Horse, but he passed not withstanding through Captain Hawley who commanded the Grenadiers, did all that a Good Officer could do, and Captain Parker and Captain Vaughan who were there, carried themselves with all the Vigor imaginable, the latter killing Captain Matthews who it's thought commanded the Rebels; and all the Officers and Soldiers in general behaved themselves extreamly well. We lust in this action 8 or 9 men, besides 30 wounded, among which there was not one Officer; Of the Volontiers Mr May was killed, and Mr. Seymour woulded. The rest of the Kings Forces being come up, my Lord Feversham went off from that place and drew up the Army in good order upon a little Hill hard by, the Rebels planted their Cannon (they having fix Picces)and played upon them for two hours, but without doing them the least damage; and my Lord Fever-sham planted likewise his Cannon, which, as he was afterwards informed, did very much incommode the Rebels. The Kings Forces staid there till fix in the Evening, it raining very hard all the time; upon which my Lord Feversham marched to Brad-ford, where he staid the next day to refresh his Proops: Colonel Oglethorpe was fent out with 100 Horse to observe the Rebels, who reported, that th y marched Saturday night to Frome, and that he

met a Gentleman coming from Philippno ton, who told him the Rebels may loft a great many men in this action, and that one Colonel Matthews had been killed

been killed.

Whitehall, Fune 30. The three Scotch Regiments, which were lately fent from Holland to Scotland, being countermanded upon the suppressing of the Rebels in that Kingdom, are arrived this morning at Gravelend. And the three English Regiments in the Service of the States General of the United Provinces, are hourly expected from Holland.

Whitehall, July 1. We are informed that the Rebels rested all Sunday at Frome, and on Monday began to march towards Warmister, but afterwards turned westward towards Shepton-Mallet. The Kings Forces marched on Monday to Westbury, and from thence on Tuesday to Frome or farther to follow the Rebels.

Edenburgh, June 26. This week have been brought in here above 120 of the Rebels Prisoners, among which are four Dutchmen, one of them a Printer, and more are daily taken and carried to other places.

This day Rumbold was brought to his Tryal for having come over with the late Earl of Argyle, and made a Rebellion in this Kingdom, of which being found Guilty, Sentence past upon him as in cases of High-Treason; and accordingly he was this afternoon drawn upon a Hurdle to the Cross, and there Hanged and Quartered.

Tuesday next is appointed for the Execution of the late Earl of Argyle; whose Son Charles, having been lest sick in Argyleshire, is since dead.

Venice, June 18. We have advice that the Popes Gallies and those of Tuscans and Maltha have joyned the Fleet of this State, which was preparing to sail towards the Levans. The Turkish Fleet is at Sea consisting of 60 Gallies and 20 Men of War, but, it's said they are very ill manned. The great Ship launched here the last week with the new Man of War called the St. Foseph, and six Galiots, will sail in three or four days to the Fleet. They write from Dalmatiz that the Bassa of Bossina hath represented to the Port that he cannot march with the Troops under his command for Hungary, without leaving that Country exposed to the Incursions of the Morlaques, and that he expects farther orders from the Grand Signior thereupon before he begins his march.

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Madrid, June 21. The 9th Inflant in the Evening the Duke de Medina Celi received a command from the King to retire within 14 hours to Cogoliudo,

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a Town of his own about 14 Leagues from hence; The Duke dehred leave to go to his Effite in Andu fuziz, and two days imeto provide for his journ y The former was denied; and the latter a fwered wit a permission to stay here 12 hours longer than the first intimation. On the 10th many of the Nobility and Ministers went to pay their respects to him. And on the 11th in the morning he left Madrid accompanied a little way out of Town with several of his Friends and Relations. His Offices of Mafter of the Horic, First Gentleman of the Bedchamber, and President. of the Council of the Indies, are not taken from him, but the King has named three Noblemen to execute them in his absence; The Conde de Baaus that of Master of the Horse, the Conde de Monterey that of first Gentleman of the Bedchamber, and Don Vincence Gonzaga that of President of the Indies? On the 8th Initant Don Alonio Carnero Veador-General of F. anders, arrived here; It's thought he will be made Secretary for Italy in the place of Don Manuel de Lyra, who it's believed will be advanced to the Universal Dispatch. The Count Monterey fince his entring into his new Office, hath had a Dispute with the Constable of Castille, Mayor Domo Mayor, about keeping the Keys of the Palace at night, which the King has determined in this manner, That when the Mayor Domo Mayor does not lodge in the Palacethe Keys thall be delivered to the Conde de Monterey. The Conde de Chinchon is returned from his Government of Navarre, wherein he is succeeded by the Prime de Chinay; And the Marquis de Conflans who was Muiltre de Camp-General there, is recalled from that Post, and is made of the Council of War here. Two old Regiments are ordered to march from Catalonis to Navarre, and several new raised Companies are sent thither from hence and other parts, to form à Body of an Army on those Frontiers. Vienna, June 19. The Duke of Lorrain arrived the

13th Instant in the Imperial Camp near Newbeusel; It's faid he is now at the head of an Army of 30000 Men, and that he intends, before he begins the Siege of Newheusel, to march to Novigrad and possels himself of that place. General Caprara, whom his Highness sent out with 3000 Horse to learn in what poslure the Enemy was, is come back, having met and defeated a Party of Turks who were going to Novigrad: The Prisoners he thok report that 40000 Tuiks have larely passed the Bridge of Effeck, who are to serve in Hungary this Campagne, and that the Army will be Commanded by the Visier that defended Budd the last year; but that the Cham of Tarrary had sent to the Grand Signior to acquaint him that he cannot fend any Troops to his affiltance this Summer, having himfelf need of them to secure his Country against the Invalions of the Cossacks. The Count d'Esterbasi Palatin of Hungary, has undertaken to bring 8000 Hungarians into the Field this Campagne, and to 1010 the Imperial Army with them or to act separately as his Imperial Majesty shall think to be most for his Service. On Monday last the two Princes of Newburgh returned hither from Prince. The Emperor has sent orders to the Viceroy of Crustia to assemble his Troops on that side to make head against the Turks who we hear are preparing to make

a great Incursion into that Country:

Hague, Fune 30. The States of Hölland and West-

The Mose vite Ambassadors who arrived the last week at Reverdamin their return from France, are gone to Implerdam, where they will embark on the first Ship that's bound for Archangel. Six East India Ships are arrived in the Texel, four for the account of the Chamber at Amsterdam one for Horne, and another for Enchussen. The Heet Fuch Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, is gone back to Cleve.
