Earwick Oftober 27.

N Monday last was cast away near Balmborough, about 14 miles from this Port, a laden Collier, the Master and all the Company perishing with

Pendennis, Oft. 28. Several English Vessels are put in here, most of them outward bound, as also a Fleet of Dutch Merchants with their Convoy, bound for Bourde-

Falmouth, Oct. 29. The 27th instant came in here the Monk, with one other Vellel of Hull, the George of Tork, and about 11 thips more belonging to Tarmouth, most of them laden with Coals, and bound for Pourdeaux; as also the Hope of London with Pilchards for Legorne: The next day can e in the Elmor of Amster lam, bound for Bilboa, with three or four obets in her company.

Newcastle, 07. 29. Several light ships are daily putting in here as often as the weather will permit them; 30 fail of la den Colliers are newly put to See, the greater Fleet of 70 or 80 thips more, may this morning put to Sea after them if the weather continue favourable.

Fleet of 20 fail of laden Colliers from the Northwards, whither they were this day followed by 30 fail more, but the wind comming to the South, they are all as yet at Anchor, expecting

a fair opportunity of pursuing their voyage.

West-Comes, Off. 30. The last night arrived here a Privateer of Oftend, having been lately cruifing in the Road near Hauvre de Grace, where with much hazard he escaped the pursuit of two French Men of War of 12 and 36 Guns, which drove him under the Castle, but being a small Vessel, got safely over the shallowes, enduring with little damage, many thots made after him both from the Caftle and the Men of

Stockholme, October 8. Here are lately arrived feveral Deputies from Pomerania, who addreffing their Petitions to his Majesty, have represented to him the suffering condition of their Country, by long continuance of the Swedes Army quartering upon them, by reason whereof many of the Country people have been forced to quit their habitations; defiring that the Army may be taken from them and fent to fresh Quarters; but as yet they have not had any satisfactory aniwer.

The enterview between the Electors of Saxe and Brandenburgh being pas, the latter has feemingly received much fatisfaction by that Conference, the Elector of Saxe being not altogether averse from espousing the Interest of the House of Austria, and during the late Enterview, shewing some dilatisfaction he received by the prefence of Monfieur Millet the French Minister.

His Majesty of Swedeland is lately fallen into a great indisposition, his strength somewhat impaired, but not without hopes of being in little time reflored to his health.

The French Amballador had lately a folemn Conference at the Castle (with several Commissione's appointed for that purpole; amongst whom Monsieur Bielk a Senator, Monsieur Galenftiern Chanceller of the Court, and Monfieur Hersenfiern Counsellor to her Majesty.

Elsenore, Oct. 18. The King of Denmark with his Court is not yet returned, and 'tis believed will first endeavour to lettle his affairs with the Cities of Hamburgh and Lubeck, and conclude a Match defigned between the Duke of Holflein and the eldest Princess his Daughter.

Yesterday arrived in this road a ship, and aboard it the Boey of the Sieux Covet late Ambassador from the Crown of

Sweden into Holland, but by the violence of the weather, is as yet kept from the Port. The Portifications of Copenhaghen are advanced with all possible diligence, and great numbers of men daily employed in the Works, but cannot this year be finished. The trade of these parts begins in some measure to revive again, but the violent storms of late have much prejudiced it, great wrecks having been feen both in the Eaftern and Western Seas.

Rome, OH. 18. The Pope having been acquainted with his Most Christian Majesties inclination to an Accomodation with spain, and his willingness in the interim to consent to a Ceffation of Arms, on condition Spain will agree to a place of Treaty, and fubmit themselves to the Popes Arbitration ; being also inf rined that that King has also fent his Pais-ports to the Frontiers for the fecurity of fuch perfons as shall be employed about this Affair and have occation to pais through his Dominions, being also ready to numinate his Ambattadors for the carrying on of the Work. His Holiness has sent an Express into Spain with the offers above mentioned, whose return is with impatiency expected by his Holines, who is ve-1y zealous to be instrumental in an Affair of so great imporworld. The French Ambahador endeavours likewile to possess the Colle ge with the sincerity of his Masters intentions, a ding, that io foon as this Dispute with Spain shall be ended upon any reasonable composition, his Master will be ready to imploy his power to curb the growing Forces of the Common Enemy.

In case the reaty between both Crowns succeed, his Holineis has nominated his Nuntio at Cologne to affift at it till he can fend his Legat.

Hamburgh, Off. 19. His Majesty of Denmark continues ftill with his whole Court at Gluckstadt, where he has been attended and Complemented by all the Neighbouring Prin-The Duke of Holflein has been there received by his Majeffy with more then usual kindnes, whose Minister Monficur Kielmer has for leveral dayes had Conferences with the Donish Ministers of State, to compose all those Differences which have been of late years formented between them, which the better to effect, and to establish a more firm and lasting Alliance, a Marriage is concluded between that Duke and the eldest vrincels of Denmark, which is to be selemnized at Gluck adt the next Week.

From War fam we are informed, that the Tartars with more violence then formerly pursue their designs in invading that Kingdome; that many thoulands of them are got together near Lemb rg, wasting the Country and exacting great sums of money so. Contribution.

Several Provincial Diets have been lately held and ended at Thoren, Elbing and Marienburg; the result of them amounts to this, that they are resolved to affift the Kingdome of Poland with a Body of 10000 men, and have given order for the speedy raising of them, to be employed against the Tartars in case the Turks joyn with them in the Invasion. The G eat Duke of Mafcour has also promised very considerable affiftance, and hath already a great Army in readiness to mar h against the Common Enemy, and had taken care for the well fortifying of his Frontiers against any In-
