By the King, A PROCLAMATION.

FAMES R.

PHerein in the time of the live Rebellion, We, upon just Grounds, gave Orden for the Apprehending of Henry Lord De la Mere; to the end he might enter into Security to Us for keeping of the Peace towards Ws and Our Subjects during that Rebellion; And although he had notice thereof, and was several times Advertised to Render himself; yet in Contempt of Our Authority, and to render Our Commands for the Preservation of the Peace of Our Kingdoms ineffectual, did abscond himself, and yet doth abscord bindelf, contrary to the Duty of a Good Subject, whereby he hath given Us good Cause to suspect his Fidelity towards Us. We therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy-Council, de Command, Publis, and Declare by this Our Proclamation, That the faid Henry Lord De la Mere do, within Ton days after the Dase bereof, appear before Us in Our Privy Conneil, upon pain of being Proceeded against for his Contempt to Our Royal Commands, according to the Laws of this Our Kingdom.

Given at Our Court at Whiteball, the 19th day of July, 1685. In the Fifth Year of Our Reign.

Genoua, July ro. The French Gallies, according to the last edvice we had of them, were still at Legborn, expecting to more from Marfeilles to joyn them. The last week sailed from bente the Mavice and Sarab for Palermo, the Scanderberg For Lubon, and the Valentine for Cudic.

Venice, July 3. They write from Dalmatia that the Balla of Bossina, to repair the Disgrace the Turks lately suffered at Duare, having been forced by the Troops of this State to retire from thence in great disorder, had drawn all the Force he could together, and was marching with a refolution to renew the Siege of that Fortress; And that the Proveditore General Valier having notice of it, was likewise marching to oppose him. We have advice by a Veffel arrived here from Brindiff, that Captain General Morofini is failed with the Fleet under his Command towards Lepanio. They write from Zan; that a Brigantin was arrived there From Suda, the Master whereof reported, That the Turkish Fleet consisting of 50 Gallies, and several Men of War, was still in the Port of soio, and that the Captain Balla had been forced to disarm to of those Gallies, the better to Manthe reft. There are Letters from Constantinople of the 15th of the last month, which tell us, that the Grand Visier had sente Chapte with a spen of Money to Argiers to sit out there 10 Men of War. That 3500

more were expected from the Black Beat having been raised on the Frontiers of Gersiat That Ubrabim formerly Balla of Babylon and now of Dania, was come to Adrianople with 1 700; but that damped intely after his arrival, his Government was taken from hier, and that he himself was in great danger of being Strangled, for that he had not brought with him 3000 med, according to the Grand Signior's order.

Warfaw, June 29. The Court continues at Villa-tiona, and many begin to think the Hing will not go into the Rield this Summer, but that he will leave the Command of the Avmy to the Ryx Mareschal, and himfelf take a journey towards Pauffia to factle feveral Affairs which want his Prefence share. Troops in the nican time ate marchings to the General Rendervous, but followly that is will be towards the end of the nexon with before themase in a B dy: The Great Mareichal and most of the General Officers arefill here; They had this week a Conforence with the Popes Nuncio, who as received a very confiderable fum of Money from Rome for the Service of this Campagne, but he feems unwilling to distribute it without some assurance that the War will be more vigoroully profecuted this Summer than it was the The General of the Collacks that are Tributary to the Port, having written to Mobile, who com-mands those under the Protection of this Crown, to perswade him to quit the Service he is in, and to put himfelf into that of the Grand Signior, affuring him in that tase of great Preferment and Reward, the Fairl Mebile hath leng this Letter to the King, accompanying it with Protestations of his unalterable Fidelity to him and the Crown of Poland. Since which the said Mobila has, we hear, attacked 10000 Tartars that had posted themselves near Ratukaw; and touted them, killing many of them upon the place; and obliging the rest to repair the Niester in great disorder. The States of Prussia are to meet the 11th of the next month at Graudentz, to agree about the way of railing their proportion of to enine Millions of Livres which the Dyet granted in their last Session, for the supporting the present War against the Turks

Vienna, July 5. The Letters from Bungary tell us, that the Imperial Parties had taken several Perform which came out of Wembeufel, and among these an Officer who in the dilguise of a Pealant was going to Buda with Letters from the Balla of Newbeulel, who therein gives the Vilier of Buda an account of the great diffresthe Garisonds in. That they had caten the field of Hotles, Dogs, &c. lines the beginning of the last months and that they could not defend the place without a speedy relief. The Turks have not yet this Summer, that we hear of, passed the Bridge of Effect in any confiderable Body, And at most they will not have above sooo men in Hungary this Camplagner, And of these the greatest part are raw and undisciplined Men. The Imperial Army was the first Inflant within a mile of Newbeufel, so that the place is by this time formally Belieged; The Duke of Lor-Spances were arrived at Trebisonde, and that 4000 to secure the Passages of the River Stan; And has put a good Garifon into the City of that Name, where they continue to work with great diligence on their new Fortifications. The Troops of Bavaria which had their Winter-quarters in Upper Hungary, are marching to joyn the Imperial Army.

Mamburg, Fuly 6. The Letters from Stockholm give an account of the death of Prince Ulric, the King of Sweden's youngest Son. They write from Berlin that the Envoy of Poland had taken his leave of the Elector of Brandenburgh in order to his return home. That his Electoral Highness has ordered 1200 Horse and Dragoons, of his Troops quartered in Pruffia, to march for Poland, besides the 2000 men he has already sent to the aff. stance of that Crown; And that he has offered the King of Poland his Mediation for the Composing the Differences that Crown has with the Moscovites concerning their Limits. The Marquis de Torey Envoy Extraordinary from his Most Christian Majesty to the King of Denmark, parted from hence this day for Norway, where the King of Denmark at present is. The Marquis de Villars, Ambullador from France, is arrived here from Copenhagen in his return home.

Ratichon, Fuly 12: The Imperialists are now before Newbeulel, which they hope in a very short time to be Masters of. The Advices we receive in the mean time of the condition the place is in dodiffer; Some affure us, that the Gariton is reduced to 1200 men, and that they are in so great want of Provisions that they cannot subsist much longer, while others tell us that there were still 1500 resolute Men in the place, and that the Bassa had not yet opened the Ma-We are gazines, which he referved for the Siege. told that an Officer who came from Buda with 100 men, had endeavoured to put himself into Newbeusel, but that he and most of those with him were taken by the Imperialis. It's said that the Imperial Army is as yet only composed of the Regiments of Horse of Saxe Lawembourg, Caprara, Dunewalt, Palfi, Lodron, Gondola, Salms, Picolomini, Neubourg and Heuster, and of the Regiments of Foot of Stadel, Mansfeldt, Metternich, Souches, Scherffemberg and Grana, which with the Troops of Lunenburgh make about 30000 men. The Elector of Cologne's Troops are arrived at Donawert, from whence they will pass by Water

to Hungary. Cologne, July 6. The Letters from Francfors tell us, that 3300 Men of the Troops of the Elector of Saxony who are going to serve the Republick of Fenice, had passed by Nuremberg. And that the Troops of the Circle of Franconia were to begin their march the 7th of this month for Hungary. They write from Spire that the Infantry of the Upper Rhin were on their march to Friedberg in Westeravia, where their Rendezvous was appointed; that from thence they would pals through the Country of Tulda and of Eyfenach, and so through Bohemia towards Hungary; And that the Cavalry would follow the same way. We are told from Heydelberg that the Corps of the late E-lector Palatin would be Interred the 10th Instant; And that their present Elector was expected there 3 or 4 days after with a Train of 300 Persons. Letters from Hungary inform us, that the Duke of Lorrain had been with 3000 Horse to observe the situation of Novigrad, and that a small Party advancing without his Highnesses order too near the place, they were attacked by some Janisaries who were posted in an Enciosure, and several of them wounded, among which were two French Volontiers: That the Duke of Lerrain being returned to his Camp, a Council of War was held, where it was resolved to defer for

the present the design of attacking Novigrad, and to Befiege Newbeusel, and that accordingly the Army, consisting in between 30 and 40000 men, was set down before that place; That there would be three Attacks, one by the Imperial Troops, another by thole of Bavaria, commanded under the Duke of Lorrain by the Count de Serini, and the third by the Troops of Lunenburg, commanded by Monlicur Chauvet.

Brussels, July 18. The Baron Del Val who was fent by our late Governor to the Court of France returned hither on Monday last, and hath given his Excellency Don Francisco Antonio d'Agurto au account ef his Negotiation. The Duke d'Aerschot arrived here this day from Spain, having parted from Madrid within few hours after he had the news of the death of the Marquis de Grana his Brother in Laws The King of Spain hath given him the Order of the Golden Fleece. Our last Letters from Vienna told us, that fuch care has been taken by the Commissary General, that Forage and all manner of Provisions are very plentiful in the Imperial Army; That several Prifuners have been taken, who came out of Newbeufel, and that they all report that the Garison consists of about 1200 men, and that they are in great want of Provisions, but that they are encouraged by the asfurance the Bassa gives them that the Serasquier is marching with 100000 men to relieve them. fides the Army commanded by the Duke of Lorrain, the Emperor will have 10000 men in Upper Hungary commanded by General Schultz: and 24000 in Groatia, which last are to act in three distinct Bodies.

Portsmouth, July 16. His Majestics Ships the Bristoll, the Tyger, the Charles Gally, the Garland, the Cemurion, the Reserve, and the Fanfan, are arrived at Spitthead from the Westward.

Exeter, July 15. Yesterday Richard Goodenough was brought hither, having been taken with divers others of the Rebels about Ilfercombe; he will be carried to London; And we doubt not but in a day or two Ferguson and Wade will be likewile taken.
