

# The London Gazette.

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Genova, July 14.

**T**He French Gallies commanded by the Duke de *Morimor*, are now at *Porto-fino*; as they went into that Port they discovered two Gallies at Sea, whereupon the General sent two Gallies to see what they were; they proved to be Genouefes bound hither from *Sicily*; The French obliged them to follow the Fleet into *Port*, but after having performed the Salute, permitted them to continue their Voyage. The *Crown* and *Lyon* are arrived here from *Messina*, both bound for the Coast of *Spain*. This week sailed from hence the *Success* for *Venice*, the *Mary* for *Spain*, and the *Castle* for the *Riviera*.

*Venice*, July 13. The Fleet of this State was, according to our last advice at *Dragomestre*, being in all about 100 Sail; Captain General *Morofini* has changed the resolution he had taken to attack *Lepanto*, upon the advice he received of the good condition that *Portress* is in, being provided with all things necessary for its defence. We have an account from *Corfu*, that some Men of War of *Majorca*, who were Cruising in the *Archipelago*, meeting a Convoy of Turkish Saigues laden with Provisions, had taken several of them and dispersed the rest, some whereof took their Course towards *Rhodes*, being pursued by two of the said Men of War, which the Captain *Balla* who was at Sea with the Turkish Fleet, having notice of, he sent a Squadron after them, who took the said two Men of War and some Gallies they met in their way. The Troops of *Saxony* were expected on Tuesday last at *Verona*.

From the Camp before *Newhuesel*, July 18. The 11th Instant the Imperial Army commanded by the Duke of *Lorraine* marched from their Camp near *Barhan*; The 6th they encamped on the side of a little River called *Schir*, that falls into the *Danube* near *Comorra*; which they passed the 7th, and came the same day before *Newhuesel*. This place is situated in a Plain full of Morasses, but in most places passable, having six Bastions lined with very good Stone-work; The Ditch is full of Water between seven and eight foot deep, and about 18 broad, but for Out-works it has only two Half-Moons before the two Gates; The River *Neutra* passes within Pistol-shot of the Ditch, and the Army is encamped between this River and the *Schirvag*, which are both fordable in several places. The Garrison as we are assured, consists still of 1300 or 2000 men, and they have a great many Cannon in the place. The 8th the Troops of the Princes of *Lunenburgh* arrived with their Artillery, being between 10 and 11000 men, and encamped on a Line on the left of the Imperial Army; The 9th those of the *Elector of Bavaria* likewise arrived, being about the same number, and encamped on the right. The 10th the besieged, who till then had not given us any disturbance, made a Sally with 500 Horse and Foot, endeavoring to draw our men under the fire of their Ramparts; The Princes *de Conti* and *de Rohé-sur-Ton*, accompanied with several Volontiers, went presently to charge them, but the General Officers

divided them to retire, otherwise there might have been a great many men lost in this occasion: The Prince *de Roche-Sur-Ton* was in great danger, a Cannon Bullet having passed between his Horse's Legs, the Prince *de Wirtemberg*, Colonel of the King of *Denmarks* Guards *du Corps*, received a dangerous wound by a misquost Bullet in the Head, the Prince *de Commercy* was lightly wounded in the Thigh, and four other Volontiers were hurt. The same day the Duke of *Lorraine* observed the place very near, and appointed the chief Attack, which is in the same place where the Turks made theirs, when they took this Fortress from the Christians in the last War. The following night Colonel *Beck* with two Lieutenant-Colonels, two Majors, 17 Captains as many Lieutenants and Edgents, and 1000 Men were detached to take several very dangerous Posts the Enemy made a great fire upon them, but with out any considerable effect. The 11th about nine at night three thousand Foot opened the trenches of the other side of the River, and carried it that night within 80 paces of the Ditch. The 12th another Trench was carried from the right to the left like to the first, and we began to raise two Batteries to undermine the Defences of the place. The 13th at night we finished the Work, and made a Redoubt at the head of each Trench, to secure them against the Enemies Salles. The 14th at night we began a false Attack on the side opposite to the True one. And we made a Parallel which joyned the heads of the two Trenches: The 15th at night we carried on the two Attacks to the edge of the Ditch; And finished a Battery of 18 pieces of Cannon in the middle of the Parallel. The sixteenth in open day a Christian Slave, though with Chains on his Legs, endeavored to escape out of the Town, but three Turks pursued him and cut off his Head; We fired upon them from our Trenches and killed two of them. The 16th at night the Enemy made a continual fire upon us, and besides shot a great many Arrows, and threw Stones; They killed us 15 men and wounded about 300. This day the Enemy have abandoned a Palanque which covered one of the Gates of the place on the left of our Attack, and at the same time set fire on that side to the Palisadoes, upon which there were 3 or 400 Heads of Christians. The Besiegers are raising Batteries, and making Retrenchments within the two attacked Bastions. To morrow or next day at farthest we shall have 40 pieces of Cannon and 16 Mortars planted against the Town, which with the Blessing of God we hope to be Masters of in twelve or fourteen days. We have intercepted Letters written by the Duke of *Bassa*, who commands in the place, to the Viceroy of *Buda*, demanding speedy relief. The Duke of *Lorraine* has caused two Bridges to be laid over the *Danube* near *Comorra*, in order to march with part of the Army against the Enemy, in case they should attempt the Siege of *Gran*. We have advice that on the 15th Instant 7000 Turks of the Garrison of *Buda* surprized the Lower Town of *Kisgyrad*, which they plundered and burnt, putting most of the Inhabitants to the Sword.

*Vienna*,

*Vienna, July 19.* The Elector of *Bavaria* arrived here on Sunday last with a very magnificent Train; The Emperor received him at his Landing; The Cannon was discharged round the Town, and the Garison and Burgheis were in Arms. His Imperial Majesty and his Electoral Highness went directly to the *Augustins* Church, whither the young Archdutchess was brought presently after by the Empress and the Empress Dowager; They were Married by the Bishop of *Colonitz*; After which the Cannon was again discharged round the Town, and their Highnesses were conducted to the Palace, where they supped publicly with their Imperial Majesties, the Ambassadors of *Spain* and *Venice* sitting at the same Table. The Cannon was discharged the third time, and the Palace and almost all the Houses in the Town were illuminated with Flambeaux and Torches, accompanied with all other expressions of publick Joy. His Electoral Highness intends to go the next week to the Siege of *Newbeusel*, which advances very successfully. The Imperial Army now before that place, is composed of above 50000 men, as good Troops as can be seen, and will be very suddenly reinforced with those of *Cologne*, *Franconia*, and the Upper *Rhin*, which will make 15000 men more, besides 10000 Hungarians, which will joyn the Army if there be occasion. The advices we have of the strength of the Enemies Army do very much differ, some say they are between 40 and 50000, and others reckon them at 70000.

*Ratisbonne, July 15.* Part of the Troops of the Circle of *Franconia* are arrived here, and the rest are expected to morrow. The Regiment of Horse commanded by the Count *de Furstemberg*, is likewise on its march towards *Hungary*. The Letters from the Imperial Camp tell us, they opened their Trenches the 11th Instant at night, and the next day began to raise their Batteries; That the besieged had made a Sallie, in which a Turkish Officer, who commands next the Bassa in the Town, was wounded; Some Persons of Quality have been likewise wounded on the side of the Christians.

*Cologne, July 20.* The Electoral Prince Palatin and the Archdutchess his Wife arrived last night at *Mulheim* with a Train of about 200 Persons; Their Highnesses do not intend to come into this City, but will pass by in the Yaths which the Elector of *Mentz* hath sent to attend them; They will be this night at a place about a mile and half from hence, and will dine to morrow at *Wesselin*, where the Elector of *Cologne* intends to meet them, and from thence to accompany them to *Bon*. Great preparations are making for their reception at *Coblentz* and *Mentz*. It's said that the Electoral Prince will stay in the Palatinate, while the Archdutchess goes to the Baths of *Austria*.

*Brussels, July 27.* Don *Francisco Antonio d'Agurto* our present Governor, is gone for *Flanders* to visit the Garisons in that Province. The Nations of this City being assembled to consent to the Present of 25000 Florins which is usually given to a new Governor, his Excellency sent to acquaint them that his Catholick Majesty hath named the Duke *de Villa Hermosa* to be Governor General of these Countries, and therefore desired them not to proceed in that matter at present. The last Letters from *Vienna* are of the 15th Instant; They tell us that on the 10th the Turks made a Sally out of *Newbeusel* with Five hundred men, but were repulged; That on our side the Prince *de Commercy*, the Prince *de Wirtemberg* and the Baron *de Rosencrans* were dangerously wounded; That the 11th the Trenches were opened; he besieged fired their Cannon, with several Volleys of small shot, but did little execution.

*Brussels, August 1.* The Letters from *Vienna* of the 19th past say, That the day before a great Convoy parted from thence with Provisions and Ammunition for the Imperial Army before *Newbeusel*; From whence they had an account that the Besiegers were advanced to the Ditch; That the 16th they began to batter the place with 18 Peices of Cannon, and that in two or three days another Battery of 26 Peices would be finished. They write from Upper *Hungary* that General *Schultz* having invested Count *Teckeley* in one of his Castles, he escaped from thence in the night and retired to *Poday*, and from thence fled to the Castle of *Zatwar*. And that General *Schultz* was thereupon returned before *Esperies*, resolving to renew the Siege of that place.

*Whitehall, July 24.* The King having been informed that the Sieur *Hieronimo Nunez de Costa* Agent for the King of *Portugal* in *Holland*, had paid the Money for the Ship which the late Duke of *Monmouth* came over to *England* in; And that the Powder and Arms laden, among other Merchandizes by the said Sieur *de Costa* and Partners in a Ship called *Staw*, bound for the *Tercera* Islands, which was brought into *Plimouth* by one of His Majesties Ships, were for the Assistance of the Rebels, his Majesty ordered Mr. *Skelton* His Envoy Extraordinary to the States General of the *United Provinces* to examine the matter, which he having done, and found the same to be false, invented by the Enemies of the said Sieur *de Costa*, His Majesty, upon his report, commanded Mr. *Skelton* to declare to the Sieur *de Costa* in His Name, that he was very well satisfied with his proceeding; And that He had given Orders that the Powder and Arms taken out of the said Ship the *Staw*, should be restored to him, or the value thereof paid.

*Whitehall, July 28.* This morning died the Right Honorable *Henry* Earl of *Arlington*, Lord Chamberlain of his Majesties Household, at *Arlington-House*, in the 67th year of his Age.
