WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of December last, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the parish of Whitkirk, in the west riding of the county of York, and within the diocese of Ripon, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an

Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," be assigned to the church or chapel recently erected and consecrated; and called Saint James's Church, and situate at Seacroft, in the said parish of Whitkirk; and that such district should be named, "The Chapelry District of Seacroft," and should consist of all that part of the parish of Whitkirk which lies on the northern side of the Leeds and Selby Railway, and be bounded as follows, that is to say; on the south west by the parish of Leeds; on the west, north west, north, and east, by the parish of Barwick in Elmet; and on the south by the Leeds and Selby Railway, as the said district is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink:

"That banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said church; and that all the fees arising therefrom should belong and be paid to the Minister of such church for the time being:

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Thomas Bishop of Ripon has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said Charles Thomas Bishop of Ripon has signed and sealed this representation:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns and the
