Genoa, July 24.

THis week arrived here the *Loyal Goring*, the *Legburnese*, and the *Success* from *Cadix* and *Alicant*. The Duke of *Hanover* is returned to *Venice*, during his stay here his Highness was accompanied by four Gentlemen deputed for that purpose by the Senate, who shewed him all that was worth seeing in this City and was splendidly entertained by several of the Nobility. The Senate have made choice of Signior *Francisco Maria Censurione* to go and reside on the part of this Republick at the Court of *France*.

Venice, June 22. By a Saigue arrived from *Spalato*, we have advice that the Bassa of *Bosnia* had in pursuance of the repeated orders he had received from the Port begun his march towards *Hungary*, having appointed the Bassa of *Arcigovina* to command the few Troops he left in *Dalmatia*. These Letters add that the Chevalier *Fanco* had made an Incurfion into the Enemies Territories, and had plundered and burnt 10 Villages, and the Bourg of *Och-Juch*; and that meeting with a Party of 500 Turks, he defeated them, killing 150 upon the place, and putting the rest to flight. The Letters from *Prevesa* of the 13th Instant gave an account, that Captain General *Morofni* was then ready to Sail with the Fleet of the Republick towards the *Levant*; And since we have advice of their arrival in the Gulf of *Coron*, and that the General had Landed his Forces to Attack the Fortresses of *Calamata*; the taking whereof will facilitate the Conquest of several other places in the *Mores*. It's said that several thousand Greeks have joynd the *Venetian* Army. They write from *Rome* that Cardinal *Pio*, in an Audience he had of the Pope the 13th Instant, had with great earnestness prayed him to assist the Emperor with a further supply of Money for the Service of this Campagne against the Turks; And that the Marquis de *Paravia* likewise Solicited a Sum of Money to be employed for the maintaining the Troops in *Croatia*. We are informed by a Vessel arrived from *Zant*, that they had news there of the Turkish Fleet being gone towards *Rhodes*.

Warsaw, July 6. The Great General of *Poland* is gone to the Rendezvous near *Leopol*, and in the mean time has repeated his Orders to the Troops of the Crown to hasten their march thither. The Great General of *Lithuania* is likewise gone to put himself at the head of the Troops of that Dutchy.

Vienna, July 26. The Letters from the Camp before *Newbeusel* of the 21st Instant tell us, They Battered the place with 32 Pieces of Cannon and 14 Mortars; That the first had made a breach in one of the Attackt Bastions, and that the latter had laid great part of the Town in Ashes; That they had let 4 foot water out of the Ditch; That their Miners had passed it, and had lodged themselves at the Foot of the Bastion, and that they doubted not but in two or three days they should have filled up the Ditch, and be ready for a General Assault; That the Duke of *Lothain* had written to the Bassa of *New-*

beusel, to let him know that in the same manner he treated the Christian Slaves now in his hands, he and the Garrison must expect to be dealt with, if the place be taken, but that the Bassa would not receive this Letter, causing his men to Fire upon the person that brought it. It is confirmed that the Turks are in a considerable Body near *Buda*; and it's generally believed they will attack *Gran*; The Duke of *Lorraine* has a watchful Eye upon them; and so soon as they move that way, will pass the *Danube* with all the Imperial Cavalry and greatest part of the Foot to meet them. His Highness has in the mean time sent out Colonel *Beuffer* with 600 Horse to learn news of them; And Count *Stirum* has followed him with another strong Party. The Palatin of *Hungary* parted from hence this week having undertaken to joyn the Imperial Army with 6000 Hungarians.

Vienna, July 26. An Officer is arrived here from the Camp before *Newbeusel*, who informs us that the Besiegers have fixed their Miners, that they have made a great Breach with their Cannon; That their Bombs have done great execution in the Town, and that according to all appearance the Besieged cannot hold out 10 days longer. Yesterday arrived here 4000 Foot of the Elector of *Cologne's* Forces; And the Troops of *Franconi* are we hear come to *Stockhausen*, from whence they will march directly to *Hungary*. The Elector of *Bavaria* will part from hence this Evening to put himself at the head of his Troops. It's said the Turks are marching towards *Gran*.

Hamburg, July 26. The Letters from *Copenhagen* give an account of the Arrival there of Sir *Gabriel Sylvius* Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain to the King of *Denmark*, who is now in *Norway*; His Majesty was the 6th of this Month at *Drontheim*, and from thence intended to go to *Bergue*. These Magistrates have accepted the Elector of *Saxony's* Mediation for the composing the differences, between the Duke of *Zell* and this City; and have sent to his Electoral Highness to inform him how this matter stands at present. They write from *Leopol* of the 5th Instant that the Steur *Lajniski*, being abroad with a Party of Poles, was informed by some Prisoners he took that a great Body of Tartars was expected at *Caminiec* to joyn the Turkish Forces commanded by *Soliman* Bassa; That besides these the Turks have several thousand Men on the Frontiers of *Valachia* to secure that Province; And that the Enemies design this Summer is only to act defensively. The Army of *Poland* is appointed to Rendezvous the 20th of this Month near *Leopol*; It will be composed of 30000 men; The Forces of *Lithuania* are about 20000, and the Auxiliary Troops of *Brandenburg* are between 2 and 3000 more, so that the whole Army, besides the Cossacks will consist of about 50000 men. It's believed the King of *Poland* will not go himself into the Field, but that he will leave the command of the Army to the Crown General. The *Moscovites* are very quiet, and it's hoped the differences between them and the Poles will be amicably composed.

Brussels, July 30. Our Governor *Don Francisco Antonio d'Agarto* returned from *Flanders* on Friday last.

last. The Commons of this City have resolved to make his Excellency a Present of 10000 Florins, and to make it up 25000 if he be confirmed in this Government, which he has accepted and given them thanks, but has ordered the said money to be employed towards the paying the Soldiers. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 26th of the last month tell us they had an account from the Imperial Camp before *Newbeusel* that the Besiegers had almost dried the Ditch, that the Miners had passed it, and had begun a Mine in the Wall of the place; That they had dismantled all the Enemies Cannon, and had done great Execution with their Bombs. Prince *Waldeck* was gone from *Vienna* to *Hungary* with a Commission to command at the Siege of *Newbeusel*, in case the Duke of *Lorraine* march against the Enemy, as his Highness was resolved to do so soon as he heard that they moved towards *Gran*. The Infantry of the Elector of *Cologne's* Forces arrived the 25 past at *Vienna*.

Hague, August 3. The first Instant the Prince of *Orange* accompanied with the Count de *Solms* and several other Persons of Quality, went from hence to *Breda*; The Princess will remove the next week with the whole Court to *Dieren*, where the Prince will meet her Royal Highness. The Sieur *Fuchs* Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, hath had several Conferences with the Deputies of this State concerning the Arrears of Subsidies that are due to his Electoral Highness. The States General having some time since given orders for the Cleansing and Deepning the Lower *Rhin* and *Issel*; they have appointed Commissioners to go and see what progress has been made in this Work, who are for this purpose accordingly gone to *Scenk Scans*.

Hague, August 7. The Heer *Benting* returned hither the 15th Instant from *England*, having been sent to his Majesty by the Prince of *Orange*. The States of *Friezeland* have, we are told, written to the States General to acquaint them that they have disbanded a Sergeant, a Drummer, and five Soldiers out of each Company of Foot in their Pay. It's believed that the Sieur *Fuchs* Negotiation will be very speedily terminated to the satisfaction of both sides. The said Sieur *Fuchs* and the Sieur *d'Amerongen* are gone to *Amsterdam* to endeavor to compose the Differences between the *West-India* Company of these Countries, and some of the Subjects of the Elector of *Brandenburg*, about the Ship called the *Arms of Brandenburg*, which was taken some time since by the Ships of the said Company. The Letters from *Copenhagen* tell us, that the King of *Denmark* is expected back from *Norway* about the middle of this month.

Paris, August 11. The 19th of *June* the French Fleet commanded by the Marschal *d'Esfree* came to an Anchor in the Road of *Tripoli*. The 20th the Men of War and the Gallies carrying Mortars, took their Posts; The 22. in the morning they began to throw their Bombs with great success, killing many of the Turks, and setting Fire to the Town in several places; The 24th the Tripolins being in a great consternation, sent off in a Boat with a White Flag, a very old Man, Father in Law of *Baba Hassan*, who had formerly been their Dey, who coming on Board the Marschal *d'Esfree*, told him he was sent to desire a Peace; The Marschal answered he would grant it them upon condition that they should restore all the Christian Slaves taken under French Colors, together with all the Effects taken from the Subjects of *France*; and that ten of the Principal Officers of the Divan should be put into his hands as Hostages. The 25th and 26th was spent in Negotiation, and the Tripolins at last agreed to pay 500 thou-

sand Florins for the Prizes they had taken from the French. The 27th they paid part of this sum in Silver, Gold, Jewels, &c. (the Marschal *d'Esfree* giving them 20 days to pay the rest) and restored a Ship of *Marseilles* then in Port with 180 French Slaves. The first Instant the Sieur *Spanbeim* Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, had Audience of the King at *Versailles*, conducted by the Sieur de *Boneuil* Introducator of Ambassadors. Signior *Ramuzzi* the Popes Nuncio has been to Compliment the Duke de *Bourbon* upon his Marriage with Mademoiselle de *Nantes*. The Court will go about the end of this month to *Chambor*. The Marquis de *Villars* is returned from his Embassy in *Denmarke*.

Whitehall, July 31. This day the Right Honorable George Earl of *Berkeley* was Sworn of His Majesties most Honorable Privy Council, and accordingly took his place at the Board.

Whitehall, August 4. This day the Parliament met at *Westminster* according to their last Adjournment; And my Lord Treasurer, whom His Majesty has appointed to perform the part of my Lord Keeper in his absence, having declared to the House of Lords His Majesties Pleasure, That they should again Adjourn to the 9th of *November* next, And the same having been signified to the House of Commons by the Earl of *Middleton* one of His Majesties Principal Secretaries of State, Both Houses accordingly Adjourned to the 9th of *November* next.

This Afternoon Their Majesties went from hence to *Windsor* to pass sometime there.
