Venice, July 27.

E have Letters from our Fleet by the way of Otranto of the 2d In stant, which give an account, That they had taken Calamara, and that they afterwards attackt Caron, which they hoped in

few days to be likewise Masters of, though the Garison which consisted as they were informed of 1600 Men, made a very vigorous defence. Upon the first approach of our Troops to Coron the Enemy made a Sally with 300 Men, but they were fo well received that most of them were cut in Pieces; and on our fide the Count de San Vitale a Knight of Malthrand some others were killed; after which our Troops took their Posts round the place, made their Lines of Circumvallation, and opened the Trenches under the Conduct of the Count de St. Paul; and when their Letters were written they were advansed to the Ditch of the Place, and our Cannon and Bombs had laid part of the Town in Ashes, which put the Inhabitants into a great construction. While the Sigge was thus carried on, Captain General Mos rofini fent out feveral parties to make Incursions ince the neighbouring Provinces, but with express com-mand not to do any harm, to the Greeks, who appear very desirous to put themselves under the Protection of the Republick. The Providitore General Walter was according to our last advices at Almisa'id Dalmatia, and Signior Michieli General of the Horse at Duare: The Heydukes of Cliffe have made an incursion into the Percitory of Singa, where they took

many Prifoners, and a great deal of Booty. Warfaw, July 15. The Troops of this Kingdom and those of the Great Dutchy of Librania are marching to the general Rendezvous; but followly that it will be the middle of the next month before they are in a Body! The Army will be commanded by the Crown General, the King not enjoying his health well enough to go into the Field himself. We have a very fad account from Podolia, Volinia, and the leffer Russ, of the late Incutsions of the Tartars, who have Burnt a great many Towns and Villages and definoyed a great number of people, besides those they carried away with them, so that those greke Provinces, which had already very much suffered in the former Campagnes, wi luck in a long time be able to repair the Damage they have now sustained by these sources. An Errory is arrived here from Michael Abapti Prince of Transformin; Ic's faid he comes to affore the King of the good intentions of his Mafter, and thathe will not jove his Troops with the Tarks this Campagney and drom hence the has orders to go to Fienna to give the Emperor the lame afformees; which we think here do not deferve any great regard. The Court continues at Villaneva.

The 18th instant arrived here from the Camp before Newheusel the young Count de Caningseck, being sent by the Duke of Lorrain. to compliment the Elector of Bavaria upon his Mary. riage. ention, having laid the greatest part of the Town in Aihes, and parcicularly the great Church, which the Durk have turned into a Mosque: That their Cannon had made very large breaches in the Walls of the place; that they had dryed the Ditch, and begun the syth to fill it, and that they had fixed their Miner's at the foot of the Baltion. The Enemy in the mean time made a very flout Defence; and in a Sally they made on the 24th furprized a small Redoubt, where they cut in pieces too men, a Lieutenant Colonel, and two Captains of the Troops of Suabia. Count de Bouchsinh Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Souches was killed the26 in the Tranches. Colonel Heufter and Colonel Zabor were come back, having defeated a small Party of Turks near Gran, and faken some Prifaners; by whom they were informed, that the Serafquier was with an Army of between 50 and 60000 men near Buda, having politive orders from the Grand Signior to relieve Newbeusel. That the Dake of Lorrain had likewise received advice, that 11000 Tarturs and 8000 Turks were policed near Novigred; and that he had fent 3000 Horse to secure the pallages of the River Gran.

Cologne, July 31.
