

road leading from Lily-lanes aforesaid to Hartshead-green, and thence eastward for a distance of ten chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a point (marked *c* on the said last-mentioned map) opposite to the middle of a certain road leading towards the reservoir belonging to the Ashton Waterworks Company, and thence towards the south east along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a point (marked *d* on the said last-mentioned map) where the said road terminates, and thence also towards the south east along the eastern fence of a certain field situate at the southern end of the said road, and belonging to the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, and now in the occupation of John Crowther, and along the eastern fence of a certain other field at the southern end of such last-mentioned field, and belonging to the said Earl of Stamford and Warrington, and in the occupation of the said John Crowther, to and across the said reservoir, and along the middle of the road leading thence to Hazlehurst, as far as the middle of the Ashton and Mossley turnpike road, and thence towards the south west along the middle of such last-mentioned road to its junction with Katharine-street aforesaid, and thence towards the north west, along the eastern fence of a certain field situate on the northern side of the said street, and at the eastern end thereof, and belonging to the said Earl of Stamford and Warrington, and now in the occupation of Ann Andrew, and along part of the eastern fence of a certain other field situate at the northern end of such last-mentioned field, and belonging to the said Earl of Stamford and Warrington, and now in the occupation of James Barlow, as far as the southern boundary of the division of Hartshead, and thence also towards the north west along such boundary as far as the boundary of the said district of Christ Church, Ashton-under-Lyne, and thence northward along such boundary to the point where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron of the church of the parish, and of the church or chapel of the district, out of which it is intended that the districts therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, pursuant to the

provisions of the said Act; and such incumbents and patrons have respectively consented to the said scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the twenty-first section of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," as enlarged and extended by the twelfth section of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual the church building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of February one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Saint Mary Abbots, Kensington, in the county of Middlesex, and within the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient, that an ecclesiastical district should, under the provisions of the twenty-first section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for build-
