HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual "care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act "to make better provision for the spiritual care of "populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate

district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Bermondsey, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to

fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the meantime, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as thereinafter provided:

"And whereas the said parish of Bermondsey is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of such parish hereinafter mentioned and described, such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard Bishop of Winchester, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said parish of Bermondsey, described in the schedule hereunto annexed,—all which part, together with the boun-

daries thereof, is delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto also annexed,—shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be named, "The District of Saint Paul, Bermondsey."

" And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within such district, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to such minister; the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within such district shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said sum of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from

recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

"The district of SAINT PAUL, BERMONDSEX, being-

" All that part of the parish of Bermondsey, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester, situate on the western side of an imaginary line, commencing at a point (marked a on the map or plan hereunto annexed) in the middle of the street or road called Snows-fields, where such street or road crosses the boundary between the said parish of Bermondsey and the parish of Saint Olave, Southwark, in the same county and diocese, and thence, extending towards the south west, along the middle of such street or road, to a point (marked b as aforesaid) opposite to the middle of the street called Suffolk-place, and thence southward, along the middle of such last-mentioned street, to a point (marked c as aforesaid) opposite to the boundary between the houses on the east side of Suffolk-place aforesaid and certain premises in the occupation of Messrs. Nicholson, and thence eastward, along such boundary, as far as the middle of a certain ditch or sewer adjoining thereto, and thence southward, along the middle of such ditch or sewer, across Market-street, to the north eastern corner of certain premises in the occupation of the Leather Warehouse Company, and along the eastern boundary of such lastmentioned premises, as far as certain premises in the occupation of Messrs. J F

Cordrey, and thence eastward, along the northern boundary of such last-mentioned premises, and of certain other premises in the occupation of Jacob Tout, to the eastern corner thereof, and thence southward, along the eastern boundary of such last-mentioned premises, across Long-lane, and along the middle of the street or road called Wild's-rents, to a point (marked d as aforesaid) opposite to the middle of Elim-street, and thence westward, along the middle of such last-mentioned street, to a point (marked e as aforesaid) opposite to the middle of Wilderness-street, and thence southward, along the middle of such last-mentioned street and of Baalzephon-street, as far as the boundary of the said parish of Bermondsey."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbent and to the patroness of the church of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act; and whereas one calendar month has expired since such draft was so transmitted:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Winchester.

" Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Lichfield, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all those parts of the said parish of Wolverhampton, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, and therein numbered respectively 1. and 2.,-all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof respectively, are delineated and set forth in the maps or plans hereunto also annexed, and respectively numbered in like manner,-shall beconstituted separate districts for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be respectively named as follows, that is to say; the district, numbered 1. in the said schedule, shall be named, "The District of Saint Matthew, Wolverhampton;" and the district, numbered 2. therein, shall be named, "The District of Saint Mark, Wolverhampton."

" And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of each of the districts so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within either of such districts, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same-Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to the minister for the time being of such district the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within either of such districts shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church orchapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such,

district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said respective sums of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid, by equal halfyearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November, as the case may be, next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of either of such districts or new parishes shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

" No. 1.—The district of SAINT MATTHEW, WOLVERHAMPTON, being—

"All that part of the township of Wolverhampton, in the parish of Wolverhampton, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, situate on the south eastern side of the Wyrley and Essington Canal, and on the eastern and north eastern sides of that part of the Birmingham Old Canal which is to the south of such first-mentioned canal, excepting such part of the said township as is situate within the district of Ettingshall, in the said county and diocese.

" No. 2.—The district of Saint Mark, Wolverhampton, being—

"All that part of the said parish of Wolyerhampton bounded as follows, that is to say;

on the north by an imaginary line extending eastward, from the western boundary of the said parish at Newbridge, along the middle of the Tettenhall-road, to a point (marked a on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and numbered 2) opposite to the middle of Darlington-street, and thence towards the north east, along the middle of such street as far as Stafford-place; on the east by an imaginary line extending southward from Stafford-place aforesaid, along the middle of Cockstreet and of the street called Boblake, to the extreme north eastern corner of the district of Saint Paul, in the said parish of Wolverhampton; on the south and south east by the same district; and on the west by the parish of Tettenhall."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

"And whereas it is by the said Act further enacted, that it shall be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, at any time to assign the right of patronage of any such district or new parish as aforesaid, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any ecclesiastical corporation aggregate or sole, or to either of the universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or

persons, or the nominee or nominees of such persons or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person or persons contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion, and in such manner, as shall be approved by the like authority:

"And whereas certain persons, being the committee of a fund called "The Church Extension Fund," have contributed and transferred to our account and into our names, in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, a sufficient sum of Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities to produce the annual sum of fifty pounds towards the permanent endowment of the district of Castle Hall; so herein recommended to be constituted as aforesaid; and such committee have also contributed and have deposited with us a sum of two thousand pounds, upon trust, to be expended upon the building of a fit church or chapel within the limits of the same district, and it has been agreed by the said committee that such church or chapel, when erected and completed, shall be offered for approval by us, and for consecration as the church or chapel of the said district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof:

"And whereas also a sum of three hundred pounds has been deposited with us by the said committee, upon trust, to be applied in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient, as a permanent fund, towards the repairs and mainstenance of the fabric of such church or chapel:

"And whereas the said committee have, by an instrument in writing under their hands, nominated to us the five several persons, hereinafter named and described, as trustees of the patronage in perpetuity of the said district and contemplated new parish, and of the right of nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof; and have, in and by the same instrument, proposed that vacancies in the trusteeship of such patronage shall be filled up from time to time in manner hereinafter mentioned:

"We, therefore, further recommend and propose, that the patronage of the said district and new parish of Castle Hall, and the right of nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof, shall

be assigned in perpetuity to the Worshipful Henry Raikes, Chancellor of the said diocese of Chester, the Reverend Hugh M'Neile, Minister of the church of Saint Jude, in the parish of Walton-on-the-Hilb in the said diocese of Chester, Andrew Hamilton, of Streatham, in the county of Surrey, Esquire, James John Cummins, of Brixton, in the said county of Surrey, Esquire, and the Honourable Francis Maude, of Gloucester-terrace, Regent'spark, in the county of Middlesex, Captain in Her Majesty's Navy, as trustees duly nominated to us for that purpose, and that such patronage and right of nomination shall for ever thereafter be exercised by the same persons, or the survivors or survivor of them, as such trustees, and by such future trustee or trustees, being a member or members of the United Church of England and Ireland, as shall from time to time be nominated by writing under the hands or hand of the trustees or trustee for the time being, or the major part of them, in the place and stead of any one or more of them who shall from time to time die, resign, or become incapable of acting; provided always, that the number of such trustees shall not at any time exceed five; and that the aforesaid patronage and right of nomination may be exercised by the majority of the trustees for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

" The district of CASTLE HALL, being-

"All that part of the district of Dukinfield, in the parish of Stockport, in the county and diocese of Chester, situate on the eastern side of an imaginary line, commencing at a point (marked a on the map or plan herewith) on the northern boundary of the said district of Dukinfield, and at the southern end of the bridge over the river Tame, near Castle-street, and thence extending first southward along the middle of such street, and then eastward, along the middle of the same street, to a point (marked b as aforesaid) opposite to the middle of Canal-street, and thence southward, in a straight direction, along the middle of such lastmentioned street, as far as the boundary of the said district of Dukinfield."

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better "provision for the spiritual care of populous "parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual "care of populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting

a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Birstal, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the meantime, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council, that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall

be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as thereinafter provided:

"And whereas the said parish of Birstal is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of such parish hereinafter mentioned and described, such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Thomas Bishop of Ripon, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said parish of Birstal, described in the schedule hereunto annexed,—all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto also annexed,—shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be named, "The District of Gomersal."

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within such district, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to such minister, the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within such district shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty

and that the said sum of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

" The district of Gomersal, being-

" All that part of the township of Gomersal, in the parish of Birstal, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, situate on the south western side of an imaginary line commencing at a point (marked a on the map or plan hereunto annexed) on the common boundary between the said township of Gomersal and the township of Heckmondwike, in the same parish, and at a distance of two hundred and fifty yards or thereabouts to the south west of the middle of Muffitlane, and thence extending towards the north west, parallel with the middle of the said lane, as far as the south western angle of Popeley-house, and thence also towards the north west, and in a straight direction across certain fields forming part of the Popeley estate, across Craven-lane, and a certain close called 'Near Lower Bank Close,' to the north western angle thereof, and thence

northward, along the western fence of a certain croft adjoining the said close and Lane-side House, as far as the middle of the Leeds and Elland turnpike road, and thence towards the north east, and in a straight direction to the south western angle of a certain close called 'Near Walton Close,' and thence northward along the western fence of such last-mentioned close and of 'Susan Close,' and continuing in a straight direction across two small woods and an intervening close called 'Lower Moor Close,' to the western fence of a certain other close called ' Monk Ing,' and thence along such western fence and the western fences of certain other closes called ' Upper Monk Ing,' 'Upper Park Oaks,' 'Far Upper Park Oaks,' and 'Far Scotland,' across the Dewsbury and Gomersal turnpike road, and along the western fence of a certain other close called 'Low Scotland,' to a certain stream or rivulet adjoining thereto, and thence along the middle of such stream or rivulet as far as the boundary of the district of Birkenshaw cum Hunsworth, in the said parish of Birstal, and thence, first towards the north west, along the boundary of the said district, as far as the north western boundary of the said township of Gomersal."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron of the church of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act; and such incumbent and patron have respectively consented to the said scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

HER Majesty the Queen having been graciously pleased to direct, that the Medical Director General, the Inspectors, and the Deputy Inspectors of Hospitals and Fleets, the Surgeons, the Secretaries, and the Paymasters and Pursers of the Royal Navy shall in future wear two epaulettes with their respective uniform coats, and that Mates, Second Masters, Assistant Surgeons, and Passed Clerks shall each wear one epaulette on the right shoulder of their uniform coats:

The following distinctions for denoting the rank of the several Officers of the Royal Navy wearing epaulettes are in future to be adopted, viz.

The Admiral of the Fleet, on each of his epaulettes, four stars, crossed batons, and a crown.

Admirals, three stars, crossed sword and baton, and a crown.

Vice Admirals, two stars, crossed sword and baton, and a crown.

Rear Admirals, one star, crossed sword and baton, and a crown.

and a crown.

Captains of three years standing, a crown, a star, and an anchor.

Captains under three years, a crown and an anchor.

Commanders, a star and an anchor.

Lieutenants, an anchor.

Masters, two anchors crossed.

Mates, one epaulette on right shoulder, an anchor. Second Masters, one epaulette on right shoulder, two anchors crossed.

Medical Director General, on each of his epaulettes, a gold erown and a star.

Inspectors of Hospitals and Fleets, on theirs, a gold crown.

Deputy Inspectors of Hospitals and Fleets, a gold star.

Surgeons, plain.

Assistant Surgeons, one on right shoulder, plain. Secretaries to Commanders in Chief, a gold star. Secretaries to Junior Admirals, plain.

Paymasters and Pursers, plain.

Passed Clerks, one on right shoulder, plain.

Shoulder straps, having the distinctive marks above described, may be substituted for the epaulettes on board the ships with the undress uniforms, and are also to be used on great coats on all oceasions.

Great Coats.

The great coats for Officers in the Royal Navy are to be of blue cloth, double or single breasted, with the number and arrangement of the buttons according to the undress uniform assigned to their respective ranks, omitting the pocket flaps, and with stand and fall collars, according to pattern at the Admiral's Office at each port. The straps of the respective epaulettes heretofore described to be worn with them, except by Flag Officers, who are not to wear the straps.

Undress Cap.

A crown, according to pattern, worked in gold, and to be of the same size in all ranks, to be worn in front of the undress uniform cap above the lace band.

The following is, therefore, the description of the Uniforms which, in pursuance of Her Majesty's pleasure, are in future to be worn in the Royal Navy:

ADMIRAL OF THE FLEET.

Dress Uniform.

Coat.—Blue cloth, double breasted, ten buttons in each row, three inches apart across the breast; white collar sloped off in front, two inch gold lace of the Navy pattern along the top and front edges, and one inch lace along the bottom edge, coming partly on the coat; blue cuffs with two inch lace round the top and down the front of cuff; white slash pointed flaps in the sleeve with three small buttons, and one and a quarter inch lace round the edge; four rows of five eighths of an inch distinction lace round the sleeve above the cuff, at such distance from each other as place them within the length of the slash; pointed blue flaps on the skirt, laced all round with two-inch lace and three buttons under them; a row of one and a quarterinch lace to encircle the hip button's and form a point above them.on the seam; and bottom of lappell and front and back edges of the skirt to be laced with the same; the skirts to begin at one fifth the circumference from the front edge, and to be lined with white kerseymere; one button at the bottom of each plait.

Buttons.—Raised, gilt, and one inch in diameter, indented with a round rim, and within, an anchor and a cable, and a crown over between two wreaths of laurel; the small buttons to be half an inch in diameter.

Epaulettes.—Two gold epaulettes with embroidered straps, oak leaf and acorn pattern, with pearl crescent and edging; three stars within the crescent and one star on the strap, above it crossed batons surmounted by a crown; a double row of dead and bright loose bullions three inches and a half long, and one inch and five eighths in circumference.

N.B.—The devices on all the Executive Officers' epaulettes to be embroidered in silver according to patterns, except batons and swords, which are to be solid.

Trowsers.—Blue cloth, with two inch gold lace down the outside seam, to be worn over boots, between the 15th October and the 22d April; and white duck, over boots, between the 23d April and 14th October.

N. B.—Commissioned Officers, and Warrant Officers ranking with them, shall have gold lace of the same width as that of their coats down the outside seam of their blue trowsers in dress.

Cravat or Stock.—Black Silk.

Hat.—Cocked; the flaps eight and a half inches in the back, seven and a half inches in the front, five and three quarters inches at each corner, bound with gold lace two inches wide, shewing one inch on each side. Black silk cockade, five inches wide, looped with six gold dead and bright bullions, three and a half eighths of an inch wide, and the two centre twisted, with a button of the same size and pattern as that on the coat; and tassels with five gold and five blue bullions each.

Sword .- The hilt solid, half basket guard, with raised bars, and crown and anchor badge, lion head back piece, white fish-skin gripe, bound with three gilt wires; outside length, five inches and three quarters; inside length, four inches and a half. The blade slightly curved, thirty-one inches and a quarter long, and one inch and three eighths wide at the shoulder, with a flat back, and the blade ground hollow, to within eleven inches of the end, with a double edged spear point.

Scabbard.—The top and middle lockets to be four and three inches and a half long respectively; to have loops and rings, and to be ornamented with embossed oak leaves in bas relief; the chape to be seven inches and a half long, and to have oak leaves, as above, round the upper part, and a honeysuckle ornament at the end.

Sword Knot.—Blue and gold rope, twenty-three inches long, with ditto ditto vellum basketwork head, and twelve gold bullions; a piece of the same sort of cord, fourteen inches and three quarters long, is to be fixed to the hilt, to which the knot is attached.

Sword Belt.—Blue morocco leather, lined, full one inch and a half wide in the girdle; single, one inch wide, sword slings on carriages; the whole embroidered in gold, with oak leaves and acorns down the middle, and margined with a straight line near each edge. Gilt mountings with circular clasp in front, two inches diameter, laurel embossed edges, crown, anchor, and laurel on the centre; embossed carriage buckles, plain girdle buckles and rings, the latter one inch and three quarters diameter in the centre, and plain studs under the carriage buckles, for the more easily attaching and detaching the sword, superseding the use of swivels; a plain, strong, gilt hook attached to the ring to suspend the sword short.

The belt to be worn over the coat.

Undress Uniform.

Coat.—Blue cloth, double breasted, eight buttons in each row, with stand and fall collar; pointed flaps with three notched holes, and buttons under; round cuffs with three notched holes and buttons, and four rows of five eighths of an inch distinction lace round the cuffs, across the holes, below the buttons.

Buttons. — The same.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress, and also with great coats.

Waistcoats .- White cloth or kerseymere, single breasted, with small buttons.

Trowsers.-Blue cloth, with or without gold lace on the seams; in warm climates or on the home station in summer, Officers may wear white

Cravat or Stock.-Black silk.

Hat .- The same, or without lace.

Sword.—The same.

Scabbard.—The same.

Sword Knot.—The same.
Sword Belt.—Black patent leather, of the same width as in full dress, but without embroidery; the mountings and edges to be also the same as in dress, but the carriage buckles to be plain instead of embossed.

ADMIRAL.

Dress Uniform.

The same uniform and appointments as Admiral of the Fleet, except that there are to be three rows only of distinction lace on the sleeves; and the

Epaulettes—are to have lace straps, with three stars within the crescent, above them crossed sword and baton, surmounted by a crown.

Undress Uniform.

The same as Admiral of the Fleet, except that

Coat-is to have three rows only of distinction lace on the sleeves.

Epaulettes.—'The same as in dress, and also with great coats.

VICE ADMIRAL.

Dress Uniform.

The same uniform and appointments as an Admiral, except that the

Coat-is to have two rows only of distinction lace on the sleeves; and

Epaulettes-two stars only within the crescent, under the crossed baton and sword,

Undress Uniform.

The same as an Admiral, except that the Coat—is to have two rows only of distinction lace on the sleeves.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress, and also, with great coats.

REAR ADMIRAL.

Dress Uniform.

The same uniform and appointments as an Admiral, except that the

Coat—is to have one row only of distinction lace on the sleeves; and

Epaulettes-one star, of a larger size, within the crescent, under the crossed baton and sword.

Undress Uniform.

The same as an Admiral, except that the Coat—is to have one row only of distinction lace on the sleeves.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress, and also, with great coats.

COMMODORES OF THE FIRST CLASS, AND CAPTAINS OF THE FLEET, WHEN NOT FLAG OFFICERS.

Dress Uniform.

The same as a Rear Admiral, with the following exception:

Epaulettes.—The same pattern as the Admiral's, but the bullions to be bright, with an anchor and chain cable within the crescent, above it a star, surmounted by a crown.

Undress Uniform.

The same as a Rear Admiral, except that the epaulettes are to be the same as in dress, and also with great coats.

COMMODORES OF THE SECOND CLASS.

Dress Uniform.

The same as Commodores of the First Class, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—The lace on the bottom edge of lappell and on front and back edges of skirt to be omitted; the lace round top edge of the collar to be one and a half inch wide, and three quarters of an inch along the bottom; one and a half inch lace round the flaps and cuffs, and three quarters of an inch on slash flaps in sleeve; and one inch to encircle the hip buttons.

Buttons.—The same as the Admiral's, omitting the laurel wreaths.

Undress Uniform.

The same as Commodores of the First Class.

CAPTAINS AND COMMANDERS.

Dress Uniform.

The same as Commodores of the Second Class, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—The distinction lace on the sleeves to be omitted for Captains, and also the lace round the hip buttons for Commanders.

Epaulettes.—CAPTAINS of three years standing, the same as Commodores. Those under three years standing to be distinguished by the anchor, surmounted by a crown; and

COMMANDERS, by the anchor surmounted by a star, and the bullions to be only three inches and a quarter long, and one inch and three eighths in circumference.

Hats.—The same as the Admiral's, but bound with black silk instead of gold lace, of the oak-leaf pattern, and looped with four bright gold bullions, the two centre twisted.

Scabbards.—The same as the Admiral's, but the chape to be only six inches and a half long; both lockets and chape to be ornamented with fluted threads and scrolls instead of oak leaves.

Commanders and Officers below that rank to have the lockets plain, and the chape threaded, six inches long, with horse-shoe bottom.

Sword Belts.-Black Morocco leather, lined, the same dimensions as the Admiral's, embroidered in gold, with three straight lines, one down the middle, and one at each margin near the edge; gilt clasps, with circular fronts, with embossed laurel edges, crown and anchor in the centre; plain carriage and girdle buckles with studs under, and plain gilt ring and hook.

Undress Uniform.

The same as Commodores of the Second Class, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—The distinction lace on the cuffs to be omitted.

Epaulettes.—The same; or on board ship, two straps, the same as those of the epaulettes without bullions.

Hats.—The same.

Scabbards.—The same.

Sword Belts.—The same as the Admiral's, omitting the laurel in the centre of the clasp.

LIEUTENANTS.

Dress Uniform.

The same uniform and appointments as Com-

manders, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—The lace to be only one inch wide instead of one inch and a half; and half an inch

instead of three quarters of an inch.

Epaulettes.—To be smaller, the bullions to be only three inches long, and one inch and an eighth in circumference, and with the anchor only within the crescent.

Hats.—To be looped with only two bullions, twisted.

Sword Belts.—To have only two straight lines, one near each edge.

Undress Uniform.

Coat.—The same as Commanders.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress; or on board ship, two straps, the same as those of the epaulettes, without bullions.

Hat .- The same.

Sword Belts.—The same as Commander's.

MASTER OF THE FLEET.

Dress Uniform.

The same uniform and appointments as a Lieutenant, except that the

Epaulettes—are to have crossed anchors, without cables, within the crescent, surmounted by a gold and silver star on the strap.

Undress Uniform.

The same as Lieutenants, except that the Epaulettes—are to be the same as in dress; or on board ship, two straps, the same as those of the epaulettes, without bullions.

MASTERS.

Dress Uniform.

The same uniform and appointments as Master of the Fleet, omitting the star on the strap of the epaulettes.

Undress Uniform.

The same as Master of the Fleet, omitting the star on the strap of the epaulettes; or on board ship, two straps, the same as those of the epaulettes, without bullions.

MATES.

Dress Uniform.

The same uniform and appointments as Lieutenants, with the following exceptions:

Coats.—The lace to be only three quarters of an inch wide.

Trowsers.—To have no lace on the outside seams.

Epaulette.—One, to be worn on the right shoulder, of the same pattern as Lieutenants, but smaller; the device to be also smaller, and the bullions to be only two inches and a half long, and three quarters of an inch in circumference.

Undress Uniform.

Coats.—The same as Lieutenants.

Trowsers.—Same as in dress.

Epaulette.—Same as in dress; or on board ship, a strap on the right shoulder, the same as that of the epaulette, without bullions.

SECOND MASTERS.

Dress Uniform.

The same uniform and appointments as Mates, except that the device on the epaulette is to be the same as the Masters, but smaller.

Undress Uniform.

The same as the Mates, except that the device on the epaulette is to be the same as the Masters, but smaller.

MIDSHIPMEN.

Coat.—Blue cloth, single breasted, with nine notched holes on each breast, and three on each euff and pocket-flap, with buttons to correspond, lined with white serge, stand-up collar, with a white tura-back on each side of the collar, with notched hole and button.

Swords.—Of the same pattern as Mates, but of such length as may be convenient.

Sword Belts.—The same as the Lieutenant's undress waist belt.

MASTER'S ASSISTANT.

The same as Midshipmen, but instead of the white turn-back, a button-hole of blue twist at each end of the collar, with a corresponding button.

NAVAL CADETS.

The same as Midshipmen, but instead of the white turn-back, a button-hole of white twist on the collar, with a corresponding button.

GUNNERS, BOATSWAINS, AND CARPENTERS.

Coat.—Blue cloth; if lined, to be with serge, fall-down collar, blue lapels to button across, and round cuffs; nine buttons on the lapels, and three on each cuff and pocket, with corresponding blue twist button-holes, and three buttons in the folds of the skirts. Plain gilt buttons, with an anchor and cable engraved thereon.

Waistcoat.—White.

Cravat or Stock .- Black.

Hat.—Plain ronnd.

Sword.—Of the same pattern and length as Commissioned Officers, but the back-piece of the handle is to be plain, with a flute round the top and down the back, with a black fish skin gripe, bound with three gold wires; the etchings on the blade not blued or gilt.

Sword Knot.—Of blue silk, mixed with gold

fringe, but no bullion.

Sword Belt.—The same as Mates.

PETTY OFFICERS,

Who have not an uniform, are to wear a mark of distinction on the upper part of the left sleeve of their jackets, viz. those of the First Class an anchor surmounted by a crown; those of the Second Class an anchor.

CIVIL BRANCH.

DIRECTOR GENERAL OF NAVAL HOSPITALS AND FLEETS,

Dress Uniform.

The same uniform and appointments as Commodores of the Second Class, except that the

Unless in Holy Orders, the same as Secretaries to Junior Flag Officers, except that the eight buttons on the breast of the coat are to be placed at equal distances, and without epaulettes or lace to the trowsers.

Undress Uniform.

The same as Secretaries to Junior Flag Officers, except that the buttons on the breast of the coat are to be regular, and without epaulettes or lace to trowsers.

ASSISTANT SURGEONS.

Dress Uniform.

The same as Surgeons, with the following exceptions:

Coats.—The lace to be only three quarters of an inch wide.

Trowsers.—To have no lace.

Epaulette.—One on the right shoulder, the same as Mates, without the device.

Undress Uniform.

CLERKS' ASSISTANTS.

The undress uniform of Captains' Clerks.

Engineers.

Coat.—Blue cloth, double breasted; buttons, having a steam engine with a crown above embossed on them, to be placed four and four, and a larger button of the same kind upon the collar.

Waistcoat.—With buttons similar to those on

the coat.

Trowsers .- Plain blue cloth.

Cap.—With a gold lace band one inch wide, and a gold crown according to pattern in front, above the band.

MEMORANDA.

Full Dress.

Full dress is always to be worn on State occasions and at Courts Martial, by all Naval Officers.

Trowsers.—On all occasions of full dress; Officers shall wear white trowsers, over boots, between the 23d of April and the 14th of October, and blue trowsers between the 15th of October and the 22d of April.

Undress.

Shoulder Straps .- Officers may wear, in undress on board ship, shoulder straps similar to those of their epaulettes, without bullions, with their

respective devices thereon.

Great Coats.—The great coats for Officers in the Royal Navy are to be of blue cloth, double or single breasted, with the number and arrangement of the buttons according to the undress uniform assigned to their respective ranks, omitting the pecket flaps, and with stand and fall collars, according to the patterns at the Admiral's Office at each port; the straps of the respective epaulettes heretofore described to be worn with them, except by Flag Officers, who are not to wear the straps.

The blue undress frock heretofore in use is

abolished.

All Officers may wear in undress, with blue trowsers, a blue cloth waistcoat, single breasted, with small uniform buttons; and on board their ships a round jacket without skirts, with their appropriate arrangement of buttons, and the straps of their epaulettes above mentioned; and a round black hat, with a narrow black silk band and a black buckle, and a black silk or leather cockade, with a loop of the same material, half the width of the lace on their dress coats, or if they have no lace on their coats, of black silk ribbon (except Midshipmen, Masters' Assistants, and Naval Cadets, who are to have a loop of gold twist); if preferred, Officers may wear in undress, in lieu of the round hat, a blue cloth cap, with a gold lace band of the width of the lace on their dress coats, and a gold crown according to pattern, and of the same size in all ranks, in front above the band; Officers, who have no lace on their coats, to have a band of gold lace one inch wide round their caps.

Patterns of the uniforms and appointments, which are to be strictly adhered to, are to be seen at this Office, and at the Offices of the several Port Admirals.

All Officers serving in inferior ranks are to wear the uniform of the rank to which they belong.
