W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better pro-" vision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eighteenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say :

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to "make better provision for the spiritual care of po-"pulousparishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting two separate districts for spiritual purposes out of the district of Saint John the Evangelist, Waterloo-road, Lambeth, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent; and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incum-

bent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the mean time, consent to the same; thind it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as thereinafter provided :

"And whereas the said district of Saint John the Evangelist is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular parts of 'such district hereinafter mentioned, neither of which parts at present contains within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be respectively constituted separate districts in manner hereinafter set forth:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard Bishop of Winchester, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all those parts of the said district of Saint John the Evangelist, respectively described in the schedule hereunto annexed, and therein numbered respectively 1. and 2.,—all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are respectively delineated and set forth in the maps or plans hereunto also annexed, and numbered in like manner,—shall be respectively constituted separate districts for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be respectively named as follows, that is to say; the district, numbered 1. in the said schedule, shall be named, "The District of Saint Andrew, Lambeth;" and the district, numbered 2. therein, shall be named, "The District of Saint Thomas, Lambeth."

" And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of each of the districts so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within either of such districts, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to the minister for the time being of such district the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds ; and that so soon as any church or chapel within either of such districts shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said sums of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid, by equal halfyearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be ; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of either of such districts or new parishes shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

" And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE:

" No. 1.—The district of SAINT ANDREW, LAMBETH, being--

" All that part of the district of Saint John the Evangelist, Waterloo-road, Lambeth, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester, situate on the northern side of an imaginary line commencing at a point (marked a on the map or plan hereunto annexed) on the boundary of the said parish, and in the middle of the street or road called the New-cut, and thence extending westward along the middle of such street or road to a point (marked b as aforesaid) opposite to the middle of Cornwall-road, and on the eastern side of an imaginary line extending northward from such last-mentioned point along the middle of Cornwallroad aforesaid, and continuing in a straight direction with the middle of such road as far as, the boundary of the said parish of Lambeth.

" No. 2.—The district of SAINT THOMAS, LAMBETH, being—

" All that part of the said district of Saint John the Evangelist, situate on the southern side of an imaginary line extending from the south western boundary of such district along the middle of the street or road called Lambeth Lower-marsh, and the said street or road called the New-cut, as far as the eastern boundary of the same district."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron of the church of the district out of which it is intended that the districts therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act; and one calendar month has expired since such draft was so transmitted, and no objections have been made thereto:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, fler Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the

said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London. Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby tc direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Winchester.

" And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within such district, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to such minister, the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred, and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within such district shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister inhabitants thereof, and such district and shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said sum of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy. in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

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"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

" The district of WALKER, being-

" All that part of the parish of Long Benton, in the county of Northumberland, and in the diocese of Durham, comprised within the township of Walker."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbent and to the patrons of the church of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act; and one calendar month has expired since such draft was so transmitted, and no objections have been made thereto:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Durham.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled " An " Act to carry into effect, with certain modifi-" tions, the fourth report of the Commissioners " of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act for enabling eccle-" siastical corporations, aggregate and sole, to " grant leases for long terms of years," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for determining the portion of the improved value to be made payable to us in a certain lease of beds of clay, earth, loam, and sand about to be granted by the Reverend Charles Rodwell Roper, Clerk, Rector of the parish of Saint Olave, in the city and diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas by the said last recited Act it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for any ecclesiastical corporation, aggregate or sole (excepting as therein is excepted, which exception does not include the case of a rector), from time to time, with the consents in that behalf thereby required, and subject to the provisions in the same Acts contained, to grant or demise by lease, for any term not exceeding sixty years, any mines, minerals, quarries, or beds belonging to such corporation :

"And whereas, in pursuance of the powers contained in the said recited enactment, it is proposed by the said Charles Rodwell Roper, as such Rector as aforesaid, with the consents required by the same Acts, to grant and demise, by lease, certain beds of earth, clay, loanr, and sand, with the produce thereof, in and under certain lands, being part and parcel of the glebe lands of his said rectory, and situate in the parish of Farringdon, in the county of Devon, and in the diocese aforesaid :

"And whereas by the same Act it is further enacted, that, in case of any lease of mines, minerals, quarries, or beds granted thereunder, such portion of the improved value accruing under such lease, as by the authority provided in the first recited Act shall be determined, not being more than three fourth parts nor less than one moiety of such improved value, shall forthwith, and from time to time as the same shall accrue, be paid to us, and shall be subject to the provisions relating to monies payable to us :

"And whereas the improved value to accrue under the lease so proposed to be granted as aforesaid will, according to the meaning of the same Act, be the whole net amount of the reservation or reservations to be made in such lease, after deducting the sum of twelve pounds per annum, the value of the same premises hitherto received by the said Charles Rodwell Roper, as such Rector as aforesaid :

" Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that one half of the whole net amount (subject to such deduction as aforesaid) of the reservation or reservations to be made in the said lease so to be granted, whether consisting of rent, royalty, or otherwise, shall, by such lease, be made directly payable to us; and that we shall have all the like remedies, in respect of such one half of any such reservation as aforesaid, as if the same were a separate rent reserved to us as lessors or grantors and reversioners of the premises comprised in such lease, independently of the rights and remedies of the said Charles Rodwell Roper, Rector of Saint Olave, and his successors, rectors of Saint Olave, in respect of the remaining one half thereof, without any

priority or preference between us and the said rector of Saint Olave for the time being; and, further, that we shall have full benefit and advantage, either jointly with or separately from the said Charles Rodwell' Roper, and his successors, rectors of Saint Olave for the time being, of all or any of the covenants, conditions, and agreements in the said lease contained on the lessee's part, in like manner as if we had been grantors, lessors, and reversioners as aforesaid, and as in such lease shall be expressed; and that, for effectuating such objects, the said lease shall and may be framed in such manner, and contain all such clauses and provisions as we shall approve, and shall have full force accordingly, any rule of law, statute, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas notice of the said scheme has been given to the said Charles Rodwell Roper, as such Rector as aforesaid, in accordance with the provisions of the first recited Act, and he has made no objection thereto:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Exeter.

The following is a Specification of the Lighthouse and the appearance of the Light, by Mr. Allan Stevenson, Engineer to the Commissioners.

The lighthouse is situated in N. latitude 57° 43' 21'! and W. longitude 3° 20' 14". By compass it bears from Tarbetness Lighthouse S. E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., distant $16\frac{1}{2}$ miles; from Brough Head E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., distant $5\frac{1}{4}$ miles; from Stotfield Point W. N. W., distant 2 miles; from the Beacon on Haliman's Scares W. S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., distant 1 mile; and from Scarnose N. W. by W. 1 W., distant 16 miles.

The Covesea Skerries Light will be known to Mariners as a revolving light, which gradually attains its brightest state once every minute, and then as gradually declines, until, to a distant observer, it totally disappears. From W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. to S. E. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. the light will be of the natural appearance; but from S. E. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. to S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. it will be coloured red. The lantern, which is open from W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. round to S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. in a northerly direction, is elevated '160 feet above the level of the Sea; and the light will be seen at the distance of six leagues, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere; and, to a near observer, in favourable circumstances, the light will not wholly disappear between the intervals of greatest brightness.

The beacon on Haliman's Scares bears from the lighthouse E. N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. It consists of frame work of iron, surmounted by a cylindric cage and a cross, and rises to the height of about 48 feet above high water. There are steps leading from the rock to the cage, in which a temporary shelter may be found in the event of shipwreck on the **Fock**.

The Commissioners hereby further give notice, that, by virtue of a warrant from the Queen in Council, dated 13th September 1845, the following tolls will be levied in respect of this light, viz.
