The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Llanelly, in the county of Carmarthen, and in the diocese of St. David's:

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is

recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the meantime, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as hereinafter provided :

“ And whereas the said parish of Llanely is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of such parish hereinafter mentioned and described, such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth :

“ Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Connop Bishop of St. David's, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said parish of Llanely, described in the schedule hereunto annexed,—all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto also annexed,—shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be named, “ The District of Saint Paul, Llanely.”

“ And we further recommend and propose, that

there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of one hundred pounds; and upon any building within such district, being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of divine service, according to the same Act, there shall be paid by us, in like manner, to such minister, the further sum of thirty pounds, making in the whole the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds; and that so soon as any church or chapel within such district shall have been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the said sum of one hundred pounds, one hundred and thirty pounds, or one hundred and fifty pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such building, or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

“ And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

" The district of SAINT PAUL, LLANELLY, being—

" All that part of the parish of Llanelly, in the county of Carmarthen, and in the diocese of St. David's, situate on the southern side of an imaginary line extending in a straight direction eastward from high-water mark to the north eastern angle of the Union Tavern, near the Harbour-office, and thence along the middle of the road or footpath leading to Llanelly to the south eastern angle of the garden and premises belonging to J. T. Wedge, Esquire, and now or lately in the occupation of Mr. Samuel Heinekin and Mr. Edward Leigh, and thence in a straight direction through certain lands belonging to W. Chambers and R. S. Pemberton, Esquires, to the western entrance of a certain tunnel belonging to the said R. S. Pemberton, and thence along such tunnel as far as the middle of the parish road from Llanelly to Transtre, and thence along the middle of such last-mentioned road as far as the northern boundary of Transtre Farm, and thence along such boundary as far as the river Dafen, and on the western side of an imaginary line extending southward from the termination of the first-mentioned imaginary line along the eastern bank of the said river Dafen as far as the road and embankment separating certain lands belonging to J. D. Llewellyn and R. J. Nevill, Esquires, and thence along such road and embankment to a certain field or enclosure belonging to Lord Cawdor, and thence continuing in a straight direction southward as far as high-water mark."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron of the church of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act; and such incumbent and patron have respectively consented to the said scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and

every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of St. David's.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act for the further amendment of the church building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-third day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, viz.

" Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" continued by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled " An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last Parliamentary census was taken, the united parish of Saint John the Baptist and Saint Mary the Virgin, in the town of Cardiff, in the

county of Glamorgan, and within the diocese of Llandaff, contained a population of ten thousand and seventy-nine persons; that such parish consists of two parishes hitherto for more than thirty years past united, or reputed to have been united, for ecclesiastical purposes, called respectively the parish of Saint John the Baptist and the parish of Saint Mary the Virgin, and that the population of each of such parishes is nearly equal, but was not taken separately on taking the last Parliamentary census; that there are in the said parish two churches, one of which is situate in the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, and is called the church of Saint John the Baptist, and has been duly consecrated, and affords accommodation for about one thousand persons in pews, and for two hundred persons on free seats; and the other of such churches, which has been recently erected in the said parish of Saint Mary the Virgin, is calculated to afford accommodation for six hundred and forty-two persons in pews, and for one thousand one hundred and sixty-two persons on free seats:

“ That, at the time of the passing of an Act, in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty’s reign, intituled “ An Act for the further amendment of the “ church building Acts,” there was not any consecrated church in the said parish of Saint Mary the Virgin, but the said church, so lately erected therein, has, since the passing of such last-mentioned Act, been duly consecrated by the name of the church of Saint Mary the Virgin, and which said church was partly built out of funds at the disposal of your Majesty’s said Commissioners:

“ Your Majesty’s Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the said united parish of Saint John the Baptist and Saint Mary the Virgin, in Cardiff aforesaid, it appears to them to be expedient, that the whole of the said parish of Saint Mary the Virgin, according to the ancient and known bounds thereof, should be disunited, for all ecclesiastical purposes, from the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, and formed into a separate and distinct parish for such purposes, under the provisions of the fifth section of the before-recited Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty’s

reign, and also under the provisions of the sixteenth section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third; and that the said church, lately erected and consecrated as aforesaid in the said parish of Saint Mary the Virgin, should be and become the parish church of such last-named parish:

“ That the boundaries of each of the said two several parishes of Saint John the Baptist and Saint Mary the Virgin, respectively, are distinct, ascertained, and well known:

“ And your Majesty’s said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that, in the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, there are two pieces of glebe land, both of which are now used as gardens, one of them being called the Vicarage-garden, and of the estimated annual sum of two pounds two shillings, and the other which heretofore formed the site of the tithe-barn of the said parish, and now called the Glebe-garden, and of the estimated annual sum of three pounds three shillings, which two pieces of glebe land or gardens it is expedient should belong to the Vicar of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist for the time being:

“ And your Majesty’s said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that there is no glebe land either situate within or belonging to the said parish of Saint Mary the Virgin:

“ And your Majesty’s said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it appears to them to be expedient, that the whole of the tithes and moduses, if any, arising or accruing within and belonging to the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, and which have been separately commuted for the annual sum of forty-eight pounds three shillings and three pence, should remain with and belong to the Vicar of such last-named parish; and also that a certain annual payment of fifty-two pounds thirteen shillings and four pence, heretofore and now made by the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of the Holy Trinity at Gloucester, or their lessees, out of the impropriate rectory of Cardiff aforesaid, to the Vicar of the said united parish of Saint John the Baptist and Saint Mary the Virgin, Cardiff, should belong and be paid to the Vicar for the time being of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist; and that the whole of the tithes and moduses (if any) arising or accruing within the said parish of Saint M^r

the Virgin, and which have been separately commuted at the annual sum of sixty-one pounds twelve shillings, should belong and be paid to the Vicar of such last-mentioned parish of Saint Mary the Virgin for the time being:

“ And your Majesty’s said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that the estimated amount of the relative proportions of tithes, moduses, and endowments, belonging or accruing to the Vicar of each of the said two parishes, will be one hundred and six pounds one shilling and seven pence to the Vicar of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, and sixty-one pounds twelve shillings to the Vicar of the said parish of Saint Mary the Virgin:

“ And your Majesty’s said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it is estimated that the annual amount of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, including pew rents, which will arise and accrue to the Vicar of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist will be about one hundred and one pounds sixteen shillings, and that the annual amount of those which will arise and accrue to the Vicar of the said parish of Saint Mary the Virgin will be about one hundred and thirty-eight pounds thirteen shillings and four pence:

“ And your Majesty’s said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it will be expedient that a certain annual payment of two pounds three shillings and four pence to Captain Penrice, and his heirs, now charged upon the united benefices of Saint John the Baptist and Saint Mary the Virgin, in Cardiff aforesaid, should, from and after the proposed disunion and division of the said two parishes shall have taken effect, be borne and paid in equal moieties by and out of the revenues of the respective benefices of Saint John the Baptist and Saint Mary the Virgin, Cardiff:

“ That the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Bishop of Llandaff, as Bishop of the diocese, and of the Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral church of Gloucester, as the patrons of the said united vicarages or parishes of Saint John the Baptist and Saint Mary the Virgin, Cardiff, have been severally obtained thereto, as required by the sixteenth section of the said Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof, the said Edward Bishop of Llandaff has

signed and sealed this representation; and the said Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral church of Gloucester have caused their common or chapter seal to be hereunto affixed:

“ Your Majesty’s said Commissioners, therefore, beg leave to lay before your Majesty the above-mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet.”

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of glebe land, tithes, moduses, and endowments, fees, oblations, offerings, and other ecclesiastical dues or profits, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

is fit and proper for the importation of goods of places within the limits of the East India Company's charter :

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Cromarty Point and Chanonry Point Lighthouses.

Edinburgh, 15th April 1846.

THE Commissioners of the Northern Lighthouses hereby give notice, that a lighthouse has been erected upon Cromarty Point, in the county of Cromarty, and another upon Chanonry Point, in the county of Ross, the lights of which will be exhibited on the night of the 15th May 1846, and every night thereafter, from sun-set to sun-rise.

The following is a Specification of the Lighthouses, and the appearance of the Lights, by Mr. Allan Stevenson, Engineer to the Commissioners.

1. Cromarty Point Lighthouse is situated in N. latitude $57^{\circ} 40' 58''$, and W. longitude $4^{\circ} 2' 7''$, within the entrance of Cromarty Frith. The light will be known to mariners as a fixed light, of a red colour. The lantern, which is open from W. N. W. round to S. E. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. in a northerly direction, is elevated 50 feet above the level of the Sea; and the light, being red, should not be expected to be often seen beyond the distance of 9 miles, and at lesser distances, according to the states of the atmosphere.

2. Chanonry Point Light is situated in N. latitude $57^{\circ} 34' 32''$, and W. longitude $4^{\circ} 5' 28''$, at the entrance of the Frith, leading to Inverness and the Caledonian Canal. The light will be known to mariners as a fixed light of the natural appearance. The lantern, which is open from W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., round to N. by E. in a southerly direction, is elevated 40 feet above the level of the Sea; and the light will be seen at the distance of 11 miles, and at lesser distances, according to the state of the atmosphere.

And the Commissioners hereby further give notice, that, by virtue of a warrant from the Queen in Council, dated 13th September 1845, the following tolls will be levied in respect of this light, viz.

I. Chanonry Lighthouse.

For every British vessel, the same not belonging to Her Majesty, or being navigated wholly in ballast, and for every foreign vessel privileged to

enter the ports of the United Kingdom, on paying the same tonnage as British vessels, which shall pass or derive benefit from the said light :

If the same shall not exceed 50 tons burthen, six pence.

And if the same exceed 50 tons, for each additional 50 tons, or part of 50 tons, a like toll of six pence.

And double the said respective tolls for every foreign vessel sailing as aforesaid, not privileged as aforesaid.

II. Cromarty Lighthouse.

The same duties as above on similar vessels which shall pass or derive benefit from the said light (that is, which shall arrive at or depart from any port or place in the Frith of Cromarty, within the sutors of Cromarty).

School of Physic in Ireland.

If any Creditor intends to oppose a Prisoner's discharge, notice of such intention must be given, by entry thereof in the proper page and column of the book kept for that purpose at the Office of the Court, between the hours of Ten in the Forenoon and Four in the Afternoon, two clear days before the day of hearing above mentioned, exclusive of Sunday, and exclusive both of the day of entering such notice and of the said

day of hearing; but in the case of a Prisoner, for the removal of whom for hearing in the country an order has been obtained, but not carried into effect by the Creditors, notice of opposition will be sufficient if given one clear day before the day of hearing.

N.B. Entrance to the Office in Portugal-street.

2. The petition and schedule, and all books, papers, and writings filed therewith, will be produced by the proper Officer for inspection and examination until the last day for entering opposition, inclusive; and copies of the petition

and schedule, or such part thereof as shall be required, will be provided by the proper Officer, according to the Act, 1 and 2 Vict. c. 110, sec. 105.

3. Notice to produce at the hearing any books or papers filed with the schedule must be given to the Officer having the custody thereof, within the hours above mentioned, on any day previous to the day of hearing.

4. Opposition at the hearing can only be made by the Creditor in person, or by Counsel appearing for him.
