Dublin, Oct. 30.

Here are lately arrived in this Port two Merchants Ships from *Rotterdam*, one French ship and a vessel from *London*. Two large ships are now lying out in the way, but the weather so much opposes them that they are not at present able to reach the Harbor; all our Ports begin to be full of Trade, to the great satisfaction of all people, and the Commodities of the Country daily vented.

Pendennis, Oct. 31. Here are newly arrived part of a Dutch Fleet of 100 sail of Merchants, with 8 men of War their Convoyes, under the Command of Vice-Admiral *Swaers*; with these, which are about 50 sail, we have now in Port 150 Vessels, all waiting for a fair wind.

Plymouth, Nov. 1. Here are lately put into this Port 16 or 18 sail of Dutch Merchantmen with two Men of War, bound for the Straights, and with them their Consul designed for *Constantinople*; 30 or 40 more with six Men of War shelter themselves at *Falmonth*, and will all of them put to Sea again with the first fair wind, as will also several Merchants from *London*, which were driven in here by contrary Winds.

Newcastle, Nov. 1. The great Fleet of Colliers is put to Sea with a fair wind.

Rome, Oct. 15. The Pope is not yet resolved when to leave this place for his divertisement at *Castel Gondolfo*, the little indispositions of body of which he was some time since very sensible, are now wholly taken off by the arrival of his kindred from *Pistoja*, with whom he has allotted himself to spend a month in the enjoyment of their company, whom he entertains with all the tenderness and affection imaginable.

The Abby of *Chiaravalle* having been in the late Popes time conferred on Cardinal *Chigi* his Nephew upon the death of the Cardinal *de Medici*; his Heirs have upon their complaints remonstrated to the present Pope the damage they have suffered by that succession, Cardinal *Chigi* having detained all the Cattle and stock found upon it, but of right belonging to them as heirs to the deceased; whereupon his Holiness has for their satisfaction commanded restitution to be made by him, or the sum of twelve thousand Crowns to be paid in lieu thereof.

The Apostolical Chamber have required of the same Cardinal *Chigi*, that the sum of 25 thousand Crowns which were thence issued out and paid to him towards the expences of his intended Voyage to Complement the Empress at her arrival at *Milan* in the name of the late Pope his Uncle, be refunded, he having not performed that Journey.

The Pope has by his Brief declared his Nephew Abbot *Rospigliosi* his Apostolical Protonotary, who may also be expected here by the end of this Month, at whose arrival his Holiness intends to fill up the five Cardinalships that are vacant. Cardinal *Litta* is gone from hence towards his Archbishoprick of *Milan*, the differences that were formerly between the Governour *Don Luis Pons de Leon* and himself about some pretensions of the Canons *della Scala* in this City, being composed and ended.

Disto, Oct. 22. The Pope being every day more intent upon the composition of the differences between the two Crowns of *France* and *Spain*, has lately made choice of Seigneur *Franciotti* Nephew to the late Cardinal of that name, to be his Plenipotentiary for that Mediation.

Our new levies for Souldiers go on vigorously, one Com-

pany being already sent away for *Dalmatia*, and 500 Foot more will suddenly follow them to supply the place of those Companies that have been from thence embarked for the assistance of the *Venetians* in the Defence of the Isle and City of *Candia*.

Prior *Bichi* is with the Gallies under his Command returned home and arrived at *Civita Vecchia*, having left behind him in *Candia* all the Souldiers and Provisions he could possibly spare out of his Gallies for that Service.

From *Naples* we are told, that several French Privateers have been lately cruising upon those Coasts and the Isle of *Sicily*, and had taken several Barques; that the Dukes *Di Matalone*, *de Popoli*, and *Di Sancto Giorgio* were committed to safe custody in *Castel Nuovo*, for the late Duel in which the Prince *della Rocca Flomarino* was killed: That the Dutchess *di Monte Leon* was lately deceased; and that the Vice-Roy continues his preparations for War, having lately given out Commissions to Serjeant Major *Dominico Magno* for the speedy raising of 20 Companies of Foot.

Genoua, Octob. 21. The Senate is daily expecting the return of the Courier sent into *France*, to expostulate for the late seizing a Merchant Ship of this place bound for *Lisbon*, for which they require just satisfaction may be made; and in the mean while the Convoy designed for *Spain* and *Portugal* are stopt: if no satisfactory answer be returned them, the Senate is resolved to fit up 5, 6, or 7 of their best Men of War, and send them out to sea for the defence of their Merchants.

Venice, Oct. 29. We are here much flattered with good News from *Ancona*, which tells us that the Grand Visier was by some chance or practices on his person, empoysoned; and that his Army, much lessened by the long Siege, but more discouraged by the loss of their General, had left the Town and were retired. A ship arriving at *Legorn*, gives us also a report that the Turks were gone off from *Candia*, and that our men had by a lusty Sally fallen upon the rear of them, where they had made a great slaughter, and were returned with much plunder and spoil, but we are not over-hasty in the belief of this welcome news, since by our last Letters we were told, that a Paquet was lately by some of our ships intercepted going from the Grand Visier, demanding Succours and assistance, and with all, professing his Resolution not to leave the place till he had either taken it, or buried all his men in the Trenches.

From *Zante* we are assured, that a Tartane lately arriving there, had met with two of our Squadrons near *Candia*, whether they were passing with all sorts of necessaries for the supply of that place, and that more were daily sending after them, that nothing might be wanting for the preservation of a place of so great importance to the Christian World.

Dantzick, Oct. 29. His Majesty of *Poland* is resolved to raise all the Forces he is able, to march against the Tartars and Cossacks, who have lately done great spoil upon the Frontiers: One party of Tartars having lately invaded *Russia*, in which they have, after several Assaults, and the loss of many thousands of their Army, taken the Town of *Podas*. Another party have blocked up *Russe Lemberg*, and reduced the General *Sobieski* to great straits, having surrounded him with their Army, and were grown more powerful by the addition of 6000 Cossacks; but the General valiantly issuing out upon them, had broken in amongst them with a great slaughter of the Enemy, and little loss to himself; and with the assistance of some other Forces which are marching towards him for his assistance, 'tis hoped he will speedily quit himself from
