**T**He Auxiliary Troops of Saxony were Mustered on Monday last at the *Lido*, after which they Exercised, and then received their Pay, besides which each Soldier had given him a Ducat, and the Officers Medals of Gold according to their several Degrees. The next day these Troops embarked; And a great quantity of Powder, Bombs, Carcasses, and other Ammunition, is laden on the same Vessels, which will sail with the first fair Wind to joyne the Fleet. The Senate have made choice of Signior *Martello* to Command this Convoy; and to be Proveditore Extraordinary in the *Zevant*. By a Petache of *Ragusa* which came from the *Archipelago*, we have advice, that the Forces of this State, which attackt *Coron*, were advanced to the Body of the place; That they had raised a Battery of seven pieces of Cannon, and another of as many Mortars, which had ruined great part of the Town, and that it was believed the Besieged could not hold out long. From *Dalmatia* we have advice that the Proveditore General *Palisi* understanding that the *Bassa* of *Bosnia* was marched with 6000 Men, in pursuance of the repeated Orders he had received from the Port, towards *Hungary*; was gone to *Narenta* with a resolution to make use of the absence of the said *Bassa* and the Troops under his Command, and to Besiege *Singu*. And that the Chevalier *Fanco* had made an Incursion into the Turkish Territories, where he had burnt several Villages, and had taken a great deal of Booty. The Marquis *de Villa-garcia* who has resided here some time as Ambassador from *Spain*, being named by his Catholick Majesty to go in the same Quality to the Court of *France*, is accordingly preparing for his departure.

*Milan, August 1.* Our Governor the Count *de Melgar* has Disbanded the 2000 Swissers that were in the Service of this State, and it's said a farther Reformation will be made of several Troops, according to the Orders his Excellency has received from the Court of *Spain*. The Letters from *Turin* tell us, That the Duke of *Savoy* having appointed a review of his Troops, was gone from *Turin* to be present at it. They write from *Rome* of the 27th past, that Prince *Charles* of *Branswick* had had Audience of the Pope, who made him a Present of several curious Medals, and that two days after he parted from thence in his return to *Venice*. That Cardinal *Pio* did very earnestly sollicite the Pope to assist the Emperor with a further supply of Money for the Service of this Campaigne; And that the Marquis *de Pavella* had likewise, in a late Audience he had of his Holiness, very much pressed him to give a sum of Money to be employed towards the maintaining the Troops in *Croatia*.

The same instances have been made to the Pope in the name of the King of *Poland*, but his Holiness is much dissatisfied with the backwardness of the preparations in that Kingdom.

*Warsaw, July 20.* The general Rendezvous of the Forces of this Kingdom is appointed to be held at *Gliniani*, which is about four miles from *Leopol*; The Crown General is gone thither; and at the same time the Great General of *Lithuania* does likewise assemble the Troops of that Duchy. We have advice that a considerable body of Tartars is come into the Neighborhood of *Caminiec*; but do not hear that the Turks have yet any Army towards our Frontiers. Some persons that are come from *Podolia* and the Lower *Russia* assure us, that those Provinces have suffered extremely by the late Incursions of the Tartars, a great number of Towns and Villages being burnt, the Country destroyed and many of the Inhabitants carried away, so that it will be very difficult for an Army to subsist there. As for the Differences between this Crown and the *Moscovites*, it's hoped they will be amicably composed, for we are told that the Ambassadors which were lately sent from hence to *Moscow*, have been very well received there; That Commissioners have been appointed to treat with them; And that the Czars at the instance of the Ambassadors have recalled their Troops which were sent towards the Frontiers of *Lithuania*. There is a report that the two Czars are resolved to divide their Dominions, that so each may Govern absolutely in that part thereof which shall fall to his lot. The Great Chancellor of this Kingdom will in a day or two begin his journey for *France* as Ambassador Extraordinary to his Most Christian Majesty.

*Dantzick, July 30.* The last Letters from *Warsaw*, said, the King and Queen of *Poland* were at *Villanowa*, and that they intended to continue there some time longer, the King not enjoying his Health very well, for which reason his Majesty hath resolved not to go into the Field this Summer, but to leave the Army to be commanded by the Crown General. They write from *Moscow* that the Ambassadors from *Holland* were arrived there, and had had Audience of the Czars, and that Commissioners were appointed to enter into Conference with them. These Letters farther tell us, that the Czars have given leave to the *Cossacks* under their Obedience to joyn with those now in Arms for the Service of the Crown of *Poland*, in order to oppose the Incursions of the Turks and Tartars.

*Ratisbonne, August 5.* The Colledge of Electors and that of the Princes are not yet agreed concerning the place where the Deputies are to meet to settle the Limits between the Empire and the Crown of *France*, pursuant to the late Treaty of *Truce*; The first hath named this City, and the latter *Spire*. The last Letters from *Vienna* are of the 5th Instant, which give an account that the Turks had besieged *Gratz*. That they had raised Batteries against the Town

on the Hills of *St. Thomas* and *St. George*; and that the Duke of *Lorraine*, having received the news of it was march'd with the Imperial Army, except such Troops as it was thought necessary to leave before *Newbesel* to make good that Siege, towards the Enemy to give them Battle. The Auxiliary Forces of *Cologne* and those of the Circle of *Frankonia* had join'd the Army, which was then above 50000 strong. The Turks it's said are between 50 and 50000, but the greatest part of them new raised Men.

*Hamburgh, August 6.* They write from *Holslein* that the King of *Denmark* is expected there in his return from *Norway* about the 20th of this month, and that they are accordingly making preparations for his Majesty's reception. We are told that they have discovered in several places of *Norway*, Mines of Silver, Copper, and Iron, from whence they hope to draw very great Advantage. The Count de *Cheverney*, Ambassador Extraordinary from *France*, is arriv'd at *Copenhagen*. The Magistrates of this City have writt'n a very respectful Letter to the Emperor, wherein they pray his Imperial Majesty to permit them to send Deputies to *Vienna*, to justify their Proceedings with relation to those Persons that were some time since Banish'd by them, and who thereupon Address'd themselves to his Imperial Majesty for his Protection; As likewise to give his Imperial Majesty an account of the Differences now depending between the Duke of *Zell* and this City.

*Cologn, August 14.* On Saturday last the Imperial Ban against *Nicholas Gulicke*, *Abraham Saxen*, and *Anthony Meebovius*, who have been the chief Authors of the Disorders that have so long disturb'd the Peace of this City, was published by the Commissioners of the Elector of *Trier* and the Duke of *Fuliers*; By which all People are forbid to have any Commerce or Correspondence with the said three Persons, or to receive, harbor, or assist them, on pain of suffering the same punishment; And a Reward is offer'd to such as shall bring them in alive or dead, with liberty to take and seize any of their Goods moveable or immoveable. In the mean time the Magistrates and the Companies of Trades have been several times assembled, and have resolv'd (four of the said Companies still opposing it) to submit to the Imperial Commission, and this afternoon the Burghmaster *Rodenkirch* with two Deputies from the Burghers, are gone to *Mulheim* to acquaint the Deputies of the Elector of *Trier* and the Duke of *Fuliers* therewith, and to receive their Proposals thereupon. The Duke of *Fuliers* arriv'd last night at *Bragh*, two German miles from hence, having hasten'd his return to give the greater vigour by his presence to the Emperor's Commission. And the Emperor, we are told, has writt'n to the Directors of the Circle of *Westphalia* to furnish their Quota of Troops in case there shall be need of them to reduce this City to their Duty. They write from *Heydelberg* that the Elector Palatin was to make as yesterday his Publick Entry into that City.

*Brussels, August 17.* We are with great impatience expecting our Letters from *Vienna*, believing they will bring the news of a Battle between the Imperialists and the Turks; Our last which wer'd of the 5th Instant telling us, that the Elector of *Bavaria*, the Duke of *Lorraine*, and Prince *Waldeck* were march'd to fight the Enemy, having left 16000 Men to continue the Siege of *Newbesel*.

*Marseilles, August 6.* The French Gallies, 15 in number, under the Command of the Duke de *Mortemar* are return'd from the Coast of *Italy*; And as many more are setting out here, which will be ready to sail in few days. Two Men of War are arriv'd at

*Thoulon* with 182 Slaves releas'd at *Trippoli*; From whence the *Marschal d'Estres* is gone with nine Ships and four Gallies carrying Mortars to *Tunisi* to confirm our Peace with those People.

*Paris, August 22.* The King has fix'd his journey to *Chambor* for the 30th of this month. The *Marquis de Saignelay* parted from hence the last week to visit our Ports in *Britany* and *Provence*. The King has nam'd the Abbot of *Bezons* to be Bishop of *Aire*, and the Abbot of *Moretz* to be Bishop of *Rice*. The News we had of the arrival of the *New Spain* Fleet, is confirm'd. The last Letters from *Germany* gave an account that the Duke of *Lorraine* was march'd with 35000 Men to fight the Turks who had besieg'd *Gran*.

*Tork, August 8.* This Evening was brought hither his Majesties Royal Charter to this City by Sir *Henry Thompson* of *Castlegate* and Mr. *Scot*, being met at some distance from hence by a great many Horse and Foot to the number of near 5000, and received at the Gate of the City by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council in their Formalities, who pass'd from thence amidst the continu'd Acclamations of the People, with Drums beating and Trumpets sounding to the Lord Mayor's House, where the whole Company drank their Majesties Healths; The Streets were fill'd with Bonfires, the Musick play'd, the Bells rung, and nothing was omitted that might on this occasion express the Duty and Loyalty of the Inhabitants of this City.

*Plymouth, August 11.* This day came into this Port between 50 and 60 Sail of Merchant Ships of the Fleet that sail'd lately out of the Downs; the rest are expected to morrow, the Wind at S. W.
