Venice, August

He Auxiliary Troops of Saxony were Mustered on Monday last at the Lido, after which they Exercised, and then received their Pay, besides which each Soldier had given him a Dutat, and the Officers Medals of Gold according to their several Degrees, The next day these Troops embarked; And a great quantity of Powder, Bombs, Carcaffes, and other Ammunition, is laden on the fame Vessels, which will sail with the first fair Wind to joyn the Fleet. The Senate have made choice of Signior Martello to Command this Convoy; and to be Proveditore Extraordinary in the Levant. By a Petache of Ragusa which came from the Archipelago, we have advice, that the Forces of this State, which attackt Coron, were advanced to the Body of the place; That they had railed a Battery of feven pieces of Canhon, and another of as many Mortars, which had ruined great part of the Town, and that it was believed the Belieged could not fiold out long. From Dalmatia we have advice that the Proveditore General Valier and extranging that the Balla of Boffma. was marched with, 6000 Men, in pursuance of the repeated Orders he had received from the Port, 20wards Hungary; was gone to Narenta with a resblution to make use of the absence of the said Bassa and the Froops under his Command, and to Refiege Singn. And that the Chevalier fanco had made an Incorfion into the Turkish Territories, where he had burnt several Villages, and had taken a great deal of Booty. The Marquis de Villa-garcia who has included here some time as Ambassador from Spain, being named by his Catholick Majesty to go in the same Quality to the Court of France, is accordingly prewaring for his departure.

Milan, August 1. Our Governor the Count de Melgar has Disbanded the 2000 Suffers that were in the Service of this State, and it's said a farther Reform will be made of several Troops, according to the Orders his Excellency has received from the Court of Spain. The Letters from Tunin tell us, That the Duke of Savoy having appointed a review of his Troops, was gone from Tunin to be present at it. They write from Rome of the 27th past, that Prince Charles of Branswick had had Audience of the Pope, who made hims Present of several nurious Medals, and that two days after he parted from thence in his return to Venice. That Eardinal Pio did very carnessly solficite, the Pope to will the Emperor with a further supply of Money for the Service of this Campagnes; and that the Marquis de Parella haddiktwist, in a late Audience he had of his Holines, very much pressed him to glyc a sum of Money to be employed towards the maintaining the Troops in Granza.

The same instances have been made to the Pope in the name of the King of Poland, but his Holiness is much distained with the backwar ness of the preparation of the Vinceton

tions in that Kingdom,
Warlaw, Fulz 20. The general Rendezvous of the
Forces, of this Kingdom is appointed to be held at Gliniani, which is about four miles from Leopol; The Crown General is gone thither; and at the same time the Great General of Liebuania does likewise assemble the Troops of that Dutchy. We have advice that a considerable body of Tartars is come into the Neighborhood of Caminiec; but do not hear that the Tucks have yet any Army towards our Frontiers. Some persons that are come from Podolia and the Lower Ruffia affure us, that those Provinces have suffered extreamly by the late Incursions of the Tartars, a great number of Towns and Villages being burnt, the Country destroyed and many of the Inhabitants carried away, so that it will be very difficult for an Army to subsist there. As for the Differences between this Crown and the Moscovites, it's hoped they will be amicably composed, for we are told that the Ambassadors which were lately fent from hence to Moscow, have been yery well received there; That Commissioners have been appointed to treat with them; And that the Czars at the instance of the Ambassadors have recalled their Troops which were sent rowards the Erontiers of Linbuania. There is a report that the two Czirs are resolved to divide their Dominions, that so each may Govern absolutely in that part thereof which shall fall to his lot. The Great Chancelor of this Kingdom will in a day or two begin his journey for France as Ambassador Extraordinary to his Most Christian Majesty.

Danizick, July 30-1 The last Letters from Warfaw, said, the King and Queen of Poland were at Villanoua, and that they intended to continue there some time longer, the King not enjoying his Health very well, for which reason his Majesty hath resolved not to go into the Field this Summer, but to leave the Army to be commanded by the Crown General. They, write from Moscow that the Ambassadors from Roland were arrived there, and had had Audience of the Czars, and that Commissioners were appointed to enter into Conference with them. These Lett rs farther tell us, that the Czars have given leave to the Cossacks under their Ober dience to joyn with those now in Arms for the Service of the Crown of Poland, in order to op-, Randonne, August 4. The Colledge of Electors and that of the Princes are not yet agreed concerning the place where the Deputies are to meet to fet-tle the Limits between the Empire and the Crown of France, pursuant to the late Treaty of Truce; The first hath named this City, and the latter Spire. Cologn, August 14. On Saturday last the Imperial Ban against Nicholas Gulicke, Abraham Saxen, and Anthray Mechavius, who have been the chief Authors of the Differders that have so long disturbed the Peace of this City, was published by the Commissioners of the Elector of Trier a d the Duke of Juliers; By which all fedgle are forbid to have any Commerce or Cortopoudence with the faid three Persons, or to re-ceive, harbor, or assist them, on p in of suffering the lime punishment; And a Reward is offered to fuch as that bring them in alive or dead, with liberty to take and seize any of their Goods moveable or immoveable. In the mean time the Magistrates and the Combant s of Trades have been leveral times affembled, and have resolved (four of the said Companies still opposing it) to submit to the Imperial Commisfion, and this afternoon the Burghermafter Rodenkirken with two Deputies from the Burghers, are gone to Mulbeim to acquaint the Deputies of the Elector of Trier and the Duke of Juliers therewith, and to receive their Proposals thereupon. The Duke of fuliers arived last night at Brugh, two German miles from hence, having hastned his return to give the greater vigor by his presence to the Emperor's Com-And the Empetor, we are told, has written to the Directors of the Circle of Wellphalia to furnish their Quota of Troops in case there shall be need of them to feduce this City to their Duty. They write from Heydelbeig that the Elector Palatin was to make as yellerday his Publick Entry into That 'City.

Bruffels, August: 7. We are with great impationce expecting our Letters from Vienna, believing they will bring the news of a Battle between the Imperialits and the Turks; Our last which were of the 5th Instant telling us, that the Elector of Bavaria, the Duke of Lorrain, and Prince Waldeck were marched to fight the Fnemy, having left 16000 Men

to continue the Siege of Newbeulel.

Marfeilles, August 6. The French Gillies, 15 in number, under the Command of the Duke de Mortemar are returned from the Coast of Italy: And as many more are firting out here, which will be ready to fail in few days. Two Men of Warare arrived at

Thoulon with 182 Slaves released at Triebli; From whence the Marcichal d'Estres is gone with nine Ships and four Galiots carrying Mortars to Tunü to confirm our Peace with those People.

Para, August 22. The King has fixed l'isjourney to Chamber for the 30th of this month. The Marquis de Saignelay parted from hence the last week to visit our Ports in Britany and Provence. The King has named the Abbot of Bezons to be Bishop of Aire, and the Abbot of Moretz to be Bishop of Ricz. The News we had of the arrival of the New Spain fleet, is confirmed. The last Letters from Germany gave an account that the Duke of Lyrrain was marched with 35000 Men to fight the Turks who had befieged Gran.

Tork, August 8. This Evening was brought histher his Majesties Royal Charter to this City by Sir Henry Thompson of Castlegate and Mr. Scot, being met at some distance from hence by a great many solide and Foot to the number of near 5000, and received at the Gate of the City by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council in their Formalities, who passed from thence amidst the continued Acclamations of the People, with Drums beating and Trumpuss sounding to the Lord Mayor's House, where the whole Company drank their Majesties Healths; The Streets were filled with Bonsies, the Musick played, the Bells rung, and nothing was omitted that might on this occasion express the Duty and Loyalty of the Inhabitants of this City.

Plimouth, August II. This day came into this Port between 50 and 60 Sail of Merchant Ships of the Fleet that sailed lately out of the Downs; the rest are expected to morrow, the Wind at S. W.
