

" And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act, or any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Saint Asaph.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act to further amend the Church Building Acts," as enlarged and extended by the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-second day of August one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say:

" Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, on the thirteenth day of September one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, your Majesty's said Commissioners, with the approbation of the Right Honourable and

Right Reverend Charles James Lord Bishop of London, made a representation to your Majesty in Council, that it appeared to them to be expedient and humbly praying, that a particular district, under the provisions of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," should be assigned to the consecrated church, called Saint Paul's Church, situate in Wilton-place, in the parish of Saint George, Hanover-square, in the county of Middlesex, and within the diocese of London, and that such district should be named, " The Chapelry District of Saint Paul, Wilton-place," and consist of part of the said parish, and should be bounded as follows:

" On the north by Hyde-park, from Hyde-park-corner to the point where it meets the parish of Chelsea; on the west and south by the said parish of Chelsea, as far as Commercial-place, along the middle of which the boundary proceeds easterly to the Commercial-road, and then in a northerly direction up the middle of that road, and crossing from the end thereof into the end of Avery-farm-row, up the middle of which it proceeds as far as Little Ebury-street; it then proceeds in a north westerly direction, along the middle of Little Ebury and Coleshill streets, until it enters the King's-road, along the middle of which it proceeds in a north easterly direction as far as Upper Eccleston-street; it then proceeds in a north westerly direction, up the middle of that street, until it enters Belgrave-square; and then crosses that square in a northerly direction to Halkin-street; it then proceeds up the middle of that street in a north easterly direction until it enters Grosvenor-place, and then up the middle of Grosvenor-place to Hyde-park-corner, where the boundary commenced, as was shewn by the plan annexed to the said representation, and was thereon coloured blue:
