Α PROCLAMATION,

For quieting the Post-master General his Deputies and Affigns in the Execution of his Office.

JAMES R.

Hereas Our dearly beloved Brother the late King was pleafed by His Procla-mations to fignifie His Pleafure for exempting from bearing Offices and quartering of Soldiers His Poffi mafter general and all Inn-keepers, Villuallers and other perfons, who were allually Post-masters, Masters of the Letter Office or Prequet Boats, and Employed by the Post master Gene-

ral or bis Deputy in the Grand Letter Office in London; We purposing to continue the said Priviledges and Exemptions, which we conceive to be for Our Service, are graciously pleased, and do accordingly bereby Declare Our Will and Pleafure to be, That no Soldier, Horfe, Foot, or Dragoons be Quartered in the House of any Inn-keeper, Victuallar, or other person, who is or shall be actually a Post-master, Master of the Letter Office or Pacquet Boats, and employed by Our Post-master General for the time being, or bis Deputy, or some other Person or Persons Commissionated by Us for the Management of the Office or Place of Post-master General, by Vertue of some De-putation or Commission from our Post-master General or bis Deputy, or fuch other Person, who shall be therein Employed by Us, And that if any Juch Soldiers be already Quartered upon any such Person as aforesaid they be forthwith Removed from his House to fome other place. And Our further Will and Pleasure is, That Our Pol master General for the time being. bu Deputies, Servants, and Assigns shall be from beneeforth Freed and Exempted and Discharged off and from Serving upon all Furies, Inquefs, Multers or any other publick Employments or Attendances, that may any way Impede, Retard, or Prejudice the Execution of bis or their Duty and Service in the faid Office, and from all Pains and Penalties, which be, they, or any of them might or may Incur for or by reason of bus or their Omission or Refusal to perform the said Employments or any of them. And Our further Will and Pleasure is. That all Our Officers both Civil and Military do take Notice bereof and Conform thereunto accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Windfor the Seventh day of September, 1685. In the First Year of Our Reign.

Genova, August 29. The 22 inftant Signior Pierro Durazzo, was chosen Doge of this Republick in the place of Signior Francisco Matia Imperiale Lercaro, who had finished his two years; The 23 he was Crowned in the Palace, after which, being Seated under a Canopy, the Sword and Scepter were prefented to him, and the next day he went in his Ducal Habit to the Cathedral with the usual Solemnity. The 23 arrived here the Si ur d' Aubeville Envoy Extraordinary from the Most Christian King, who had the 26 a private Audience of the Doge to Compliment him upon his new Dignity, and the day following had his publick Audience. This week arrived here the Manibal from Cadiz, from whence our march that way. Yefterday the Duke of Lorrgis

the brought 500 Soldiers for the fervice of the State of Milan, who Landed at Final. We are expect-ing two of this States Gallies from Meffina, where they have been to lade Silk. The Duke of M.nua Fortifics Guaftalla.

Cracow, August 26. The Letters from Lembourg of the 20th inflant give an account that the Polish Army, which marched the 30th of the laft month from Gliniani where had been their Rendezvous, under the Command of the Crown General and the General of the Artillery, came the 8th inftant to Trembola and encamped the next day between that place and Ufiatin, where the Generals intended to flay fome days to expect the coming up of those Troops that had not yet joyned the Army, as well as farther Orders from the King; In their march they had feveral Rencounters with the Turks and Tartars who were abroad from the Neighbouring Garifons, in which they had always the advantage; And in one of them above 600 of the Enemy, the whole Party being a-bout 3000, were killed upon the place, and the reft purfued till they got under the Protection of the Cannon of Caminiec. There are Letters which fay the Poles will Attack that place; but we can hardly believe they will folate in the year begin the Siege of a place of that firength, which has in it a Garifon of 10000 Men, and is furnished with Provisions and Ammunition for a long defence; but think rather they will Attack Bar and Miedzibos, which being Mafters of they will more cafily block up Cami-nice during the Winter. In the mean time we hear that Soliman Baffa, whom the Grand Signior has appointed to be General of his Forces that are to act against this Crown, hath not yet been able to get together above 1 2000 Turks, and about that number of Tartars. The Polifh Army is at prefent compoled of about 25000 Men, but when the Forces of Litbuaniz, and the Coffacks Commanded by General Mohila have joyned it, will be above 50000. The Popes Nuncio belides the Provisions he has furnished for the fubficance of the Army has given a fum of Mony to provide Medicines for the fick and wound-We have advice that the Cham of Tartary has fent to Soliman Baffa to excuse his not joyning with him, for that he fears the Molcovites would take the advantage of hisablence to invade his Country, which we have the more reafon to give credit to feeing we do not hear any thing of the Chams March.

From the Imperial Camp between Post and Vaccia, The Parties the Duke of Lorrain fent September 2. out to learn news of the Enemy being returned, confirm, That the Serafquier has repatied the Danube. at Buda, after having fent a Detachement to reinforce the Garilon of Agria; and add, That there is a great Conflemation in the Turkish Army, and that the Tartars, who were between 7 and 8000, are gone home, taking their march by the way of Zolnocke. The Turks abandoned Novigral the 29th of the last month, and Vaccia the day following, having done all they could in the fhort time they had to demolish the Fortifications, and letting fire to both these places when they left them. They have like-wife deflroyed the Country and burnt all the Villages and Caffles for feveral miles on this fide Pefl to hinder (chué
