Pembrook, Nov. 2.

from Ireland, one French Veffel with fast and Linnen Cloth from St. Maloes bound for Dublin, and several ships from Eristol bound for France.

Barwick, Nov. 3. On Thursday night last happened a very violent storm of wind, rain and hail, by which a Scottish vessel formerly employed as a Privateer, but now with some goods designed hither to take in Salmon for France, was forced on ground betwixt Holy Island and this place, the men saved, who have some hopes of recovering the greatest part of her lading.

Falmouth, Nov. 4. Yesterday the Dutch Fleet of Merchants ships with their Convoyes, put to Sea again with a prosperous gale. On Friday last a Dutch Merchant ship laden from Amsterdam with packt goods, Books, some Rye, and other lading, bound for Lisbon, was here cast away upon the Rocks by the carelesses or ignorance of her Pilots. On Saturday came in a Spaniard from Cadiz, bound for Ostend, her lading Salt.

Plymouth, Nov. 5. Yesterday and this morning near 40 sail of Merchant ships went out of this Port with a fair wind, outward bound for several places. Several Colliers are this day arrived from Wales, and more hourly expected.

Hull, Nov. 6. Yesterday arrived here three Swedes and one Merchant ship of this Town laden with Pitch, Tarre, Deales and Iron, from North-Bergen and the adjacent parts; they tell us of a Swedish ship of 150 tuns, laden from hence with Lead, Cloth, Corn and other Commodities, that was by force of ill weather driven into Norway, with the loss of all her sails and one of her Masts.

On Sunday last a Vessel from Newcastle going for Bridtington laden with Coals, was unfortunately cast away at the back of their South Peer. Here are still remaining in this Harbour the Roebuck, Panther, Fansan and Flying-Greybound.

Portsmouth, Nov. 7. Yesterday the St. David, formerly put into this Port from Ireland, went off for the Downes; the same day arrived here the Milford from the Downes, which with the Fairfax, Cambridge and Monke, will be suddenly paid off, all the rest being already discharged, with much satisfaction.

Vienna, Ang. 30. The 26th instant the Envoy from the Great Dake of Muscovy was by the Master of the Ceremonies introduced to his Audience from his Imperial Majesty with much Ceremony: where in his Masters name he represented to the Emperor the great troubles which were like to fall upon Muscovy and Poland by the invasion of the Tartars, with the dangers threatned by the Turks upon the Czars Alliance with Poland, which he shall with much difficulty be able to preserve, unless he be thereunto encouraged by fixing the Succession of that Crown upon his Son, who will be contented to embrace the Moman Catholick Religion, which if yielded to he will oblige himself to defend the Crown of Poland with the whole force of his Dominions, in which he desires the affistance and encouragement of the Emperour.

The 25th instant dyed his Eminence the Cardinal d'Harach of a continued Feavor, which he fell into after the toils of his late long Journey.

His Imperial Majesty having considered that in one year only, above two Millions of Silver has been drawn out of the Hereditary Countries by the vending of Laces of the Manufacture of France, is resolved for the future to prohibit the

wearing of any laces that are not made in his own Dominions.

Besides the Recruits of the old standing Regiments of Horse and Foot which are very considerable, the Emperour is resolved to raise 18 new Regiments, each of them consisting of 2000 men, intending with all imaginable vigour to succour and affist the Netherlands the next Spring, if in the mean while the Negotiation for Peace prove ineffectual.

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Genoa, Od. 25. Four Gallies have been lately ordered out for the security of these Seas from the Pirates of Majorca, which were not so vigilant but that one of those Corsayres seifed on a French Barque off of this Port, designed hither with several sorts of Goods from Portugal, and carried her off without opposition; they have also near Alicant lately taken a ship belonging to this place laden with Corn, and bound for Lisbon.

This day arrived here the Giuseppe a Gallion of this place of 1000 tuns from Venice, and may in few dayes put to Sea wish the States Convoy for Spain.

The French Men of War that were some time since plying upon these Coasts, are now gone back and arrived at Thousand and 'tis said are there to be disarmed and laid up for this winter.

From Turin we are informed that the Baron de Greis, the Duke of Savoyes Ambassador to the Cantons of the Swisses, has sent to acquaint the Duke his Master, that his Differences with the City of Geneva are at the last determined, and that the Cantons, to shew the part they take in the Concernments of that City, had dispatched their Deputies to Geneva, in order to the Ratisscation of the Agreement made between both parties.

From Milan we are told, that the Governor having during his late indisposition, made some stay at Kobecco, returned lately to Milan, where with infinite demonstrations of joy, he ordered a publick Jubilee for the Birth of the young Arch-Duke, which done, he went back again with his whole Court to Robecco, giving order for the fortifying of all places which he can imagine may sye open to invasion: He is thinking of giving out new Commissions for fresh Levies, and laying up such stores of all necessary provisions in all places on the Frontiers, that no sudden attempt can easily surprise them.

From Perpignan we are informed, that the Spaniards, having made an inroad into the French Quarters, where they had committed confiderable spoil and damage: The Duke de Noailles to prevent any greater inconveniences which might arise to the prejudice of his Government, gave Orders to the Sieur de Foucault with the Forces under his Command, to pass the Mountains, and to take an account of them, which he fucceisfully executed, forcing the enemy to a retreat, and feifing of some small Castles which they were possessed of, and for some dayes faced the Town of Puicerda, but in drawing off from thence, the Governor of the Town made a Sally with a party of 300 horse and near 800 foot, besides two or three hundred of the inhabitants in Arms, endeavouring to have fallen upon the Rear of the F ench, and to have disordered them in their retreat, but the Sieur de Foucault facing about, received them so warmly, that he forced them back, pursuing them to the Gates of Puicerda, killing about 100 of their, men , and afterwards retiring without any farther oppofition.

Hamburgh, Off. 26. The 24th inftant in the forencon, the Duke of Holftein Gostorp returned to Gluckfladt, where he entred privately, attended only by twelve of the Grandees of his own Court, and made his vifit to his Majetty of Denmark, who though he expected him not till the Akernoon, received
