An Envoy is arrived here from the Emperor about the supplies which the Pope has promised to send to the Duke of Lorrain for the service of this Campagne; And we are affured that in few days a confiderable sum of Mony will be remitted from hence for that purpose to Fieuna. There is much discouse of a promotion of Cardinals. Venice, Sept. 8. Te Deum has been fung in all the Churches of this City, and on Tuesday last there was a Solemn Procession, at which the Doge and all the Nobility affilted, for the happy success of the Arms of the Republick in the Morea. The Senate have given a Medal and Chain of Gold to Lieutenant Colonel Magnanino who brought the news of it; and a yearly Pention of 600 Ducare, to the Ingenier Ballignani for the good Services performed by him in the Seige of Coron. We are affured that at the taking of that place, above three thouland Turks with their Bassa were put to the Sword; And on our fide there were about 400 killed among which were two Knights of Maka; and Prince Philip of Savoy, the Prince of Brunswick, the Marquis de Courbon, the Marquis de St. Paul, and 30 Knights of Malta, with several other persons of quality were wounded; The Chri-slians found in the place 76 pieces of Brass Cannon with a great quantity of Ammunition and Provisione, and the Plunder of the Soldiers is reckoned at above two Millions; besides what they took in the Enemies Camp after the defeat of the Turkish Forces which came to the relief of Coron, where the booty was likewise very considerable to the Soldiers, and the Republick gained 9 pieces of Cannon and two Mortars; Above 1000 of the Enemy were killed

The King of Policial and his Eldest Son Prince Fames parted the \$\frac{1}{2}\$ of the last month from Pilla Nova and came in the Evening to Fraga, where the next day his Majesty, accompanied with the Popes Nuncio and the Emperors Ambassador, assisted at the Singing Te Deurs for the deseat of the Turks near Gran and the taking of Newbeusel; The 27 the King continued his Journy towards Russia; and arrived the 28th ar Karenzo, and the 30th at Creminck. The Letters from Lembourg tell us that the Polish Army was encamped hear Trembowla, the Forces of Lisbuania not having yet joyned it; That they had deseated several Parties of Turks and Tartars, who thought to dissurb them in their March; And that the Crown General had rec. Ived advice that the Seraskier Soliman, to whom the Grand Signior hath committed the conduct of his Army against the Poles, hath not yet been able to form a Body of above 24000 Men; though the greatest part of it are Tartars. The same Letters tell us that the Turks have lately put a great Convoy of Provisions into Caminice; And that that place is very well pro-

vided with all things necessary for its defence; And

that the Grand Signior has depoted the Vayvode of

Valachia having put Constante Sedar, one of his Chief Officers, into his place. Vienna, Sept. 9. The Elector of Bavaria returned hither the 8th instant from Hungary, and intends to part from hence again on Monday next with the Arch-Duchels his Wife for Munici. The last Letters from the Imperial Camp near Peff are dated the 6th of this month. They tell us that belides Novigrad and Vaccia, the Turks have likewise abandoned Harwar 2 place of that confideration that a Baffa Commanded there, which they left in so much haste that they had not time to demolish the Fortifications ; That the Serasquier when he was now lately encamped in the plains of Pest had with him above 50000 Men, but that before he repassed the Danube the Tartars which were about 6000, left the Army and went home; And the Bassa's of Waradin, Temeswaer, and Agria were sent back with the Troops undertheir Command to their respective Governments; And that the Serasquier had posted himself with the rest of his Forces between Buda and Alba Regalis. We do not yet know what further Action the Duke of Lorrain will undertake; He has lent 6000 Men to reinforce the Body Commanded by General Leslie, who, as our advices from Croatia affure us is making preparations to beliege Possega the Capital City of Sclavonia; And at the same time Count Herberstein Governor of Carlestadt will attack wibit the Chief Town of Crossis. - N
