Rome, September 1

**T**His Morning arrived here an Express with the news of the defeat of the Turks in the *Morea* and the taking of *Coron* by the *Venetians*, which hath very much encreased the joy we were in for the Victories obtained by the Imperial Forces in *Hungary*. An Envoy is arrived here from the Emperor about the supplies which the Pope has promised to send to the Duke of *Lorraine* for the service of this Campaign; And we are assured that in few days a considerable sum of Money will be remitted from hence for that purpose to *Vienna*. There is much discourse of a promotion of Cardinals.

*Venice*, Sept. 8. *Te Deum* has been sung in all the Churches of this City, and on Tuesday last there was a Solemn Procession, at which the Doge and all the Nobility assisted, for the happy success of the Arms of the Republick in the *Morea*. The Senate have given a Medal and Chain of Gold to Lieutenant Colonel *Magnani* who brought the news of it; and a yearly Pension of 600 Ducats, to the Ingenier *Bassignani* for the good Services performed by him in the Siege of *Coron*. We are assured that at the taking of that place, above three thousand Turks with their Bassa were put to the Sword; And on our side there were about 400 killed among which were two Knights of *Malta*; and Prince *Philip of Savoy*, the Prince of *Brunswick*, the Marquis de *Courbon*, the Marquis de *St. Paul*, and 30 Knights of *Malta*, with several other persons of quality were wounded; The Christians found in the place 76 pieces of Brass Cannon with a great quantity of Ammunition and Provisions, and the Plunder of the Soldiers is reckoned at above two Millions; besides what they took in the Enemies Camp after the defeat of the Turkish Forces which came to the relief of *Coron*, where the booty was likewise very considerable to the Soldiers, and the Republick gained 9 pieces of Cannon and two Mortars; Above 1000 of the Enemy were killed in that action and among the rest *Kalil Bassa*, Viscer of the *Morea*. The Senate have had no Letters from Captain General *Morofini* since those of the 11th of the last month, which gave an account of the said defeat and the taking of *Coron*, but by particular Letters by the way of *Zam*, we are informed, that 300 Maynottes had put themselves into the service of the Republick and that these had assured the General that a far greater number would follow their Example. That the Forces of this State continued in the Neighborhood of *Coron* the General not thinking fit to remove from thence till he had put the place (the Fortifications wherof were very much ruined in the Siege) into a posture of defence; These Letters add, that the Turkish Garrison in *Madon* being in a great Consternation upon the taking of *Coron*, had sent Deputies to Captain General *Morofini* to Treat about the surrender of that place, but this needs a Confirmation. The reports we had of a

fight between the Turkish Fleet and the Ships of the Republick Commanded by Signior *Molinò* and Signior *Delfino* and of the latter having obtained a great Victory, prove to have been without ground. The last Letters from *Dalmatia* told us that the Provveditore General *Vallier* was at *Spalato*, And that the Vayvode *Fancò* was drawing together a great Body of Morlacks with a design to attack some place in the Province of *Bosnia*.

*Dantzicke*, September 5. The King of *Poland* and his Eldest Son Prince, *James* parted the 25 of the last month from *Villa Nova* and came in the Evening to *Praga*, where the next day his Majesty, accompanied with the Popes Nuncio and the Emperors Ambassador, assisted at the Singing *Te Deum* for the defeat of the Turks near *Gran* and the taking of *Newbeusel*; The 27 the King continued his Journey towards *Russia*; and arrived the 28th at *Karenzo*, and the 30th at *Czerminck*. The Letters from *Lembourg* tell us that the Polish Army was encamped near *Trembowia*, the Forces of *Lithuania* not having yet joyned it; That they had defeated several Parties of Turks and Tartars, who thought to disturb them in their March; And that the Crown General had received advice that the Seraskier *Soliman*, to whom the Grand Signior hath committed the conduct of his Army against the Poles, hath not yet been able to form a Body of above 24000 Men; though the greatest part of it are Tartars. The same Letters tell us that the Turks have lately put a great Convoy of Provisions into *Caminic*; And that that place is very well provided with all things necessary for its defence; And that the Grand Signior has deposed the Vayvode of *Valachia* having put *Constante Sedar*, one of his Chief Officers, into his place.

*Vienna*, Sept. 9. The Elector of *Bavaria* returned hither the 8th instant from *Hungary*, and intends to part from hence again on Monday next with the Arch-Duchess his Wife for *Munick*. The last Letters from the Imperial Camp near *Pest* are dated the 6th of this month. They tell us that besides *Novigrad* and *Vaccia*, the Turks have likewise abandoned *Hawan* a place of that consideration that a Bassa Commanded there, which they left in so much haste that they had not time to demolish the Fortifications; That the Serasquier when he was now lately encamped in the plains of *Pest* had with him above 50000 Men, but that before he repassed the *Danube* the Tartars which were about 6000, left the Army and went home; And the Bassa's of *Waradin*, *Temeswaer*, and *Agria* were sent back with the Troops under their Command to their respective Governments; And that the Serasquier had posted himself with the rest of his Forces between *Buda* and *Alba Regalis*. We do not yet know what further Action the Duke of *Lorraine* will undertake; He has sent 6000 Men to reinforce the Body Commanded by General *Leslie*, who, as our advices from *Croatia* assure us is making preparations to besiege *Poffega* the Capital City of *Sclavonia*; And at the same time Count *Haberstein* Governor of *Carlestadt* will attack *Wibitz* the Chief Town of *Croatia*.

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great many Carpenters, Masons and other Workmen have been sent to *Newbushel* to work with the Garrison for the repairing the Fortifications of that place, which is so ruined that there are not twelve Houses fit to lodge in; and we are assured that the repairing the two Balliums will cost above two hundred thousand Livres; towards which the Arch-bishop of *Gran* has offered 80000, and the Cardinal *Bonvisi* the Popes Nuncio will likewise contribute a considerable sum. *Espriets* holds out still; And its said that the Governor to shew his resolution of defending it to the last, has caused three Gallows to be set up, one to hang such of the Magistrates, and the other two the Burghers and Soldiers, that shall speak of surrendering the place.

*Brussels*, Sept. 22. The Letters from *Madrid* by the last Spanish Ordinary said it was generally believed there that our present Governor *Don Antonio Francisco d'Agurio* will be continued in this Government, which we hope our next Letters will bring us the certainty of. In the mean time the States of the several Provinces have given his Excellency an Extraordinary supply towards maintaining the Forces, which he is endeavouring to put upon such a Foot that they may be punctually paid for the future. The Prince *de Faudemont* is much indisposed; And the Duke and Duchesse of *Holstein* are likewise very ill of a Fever. They write from the French Court that the Officers as well of Horse as Foot have received Orders to recruit their Troops and Companies with 10 Men in each. The French Forces which were drawing together at *Conde* and *Mauberge* on our Frontiers are commanded, and accordingly are marching back to their several Garrisons. *Don Juan de Pimental* is preparing for his Journey to *Heidelberg* whither he goes to compliment the Elector *Palatin* in the Name of his Catholick Majesty. The last Letters we have from *Vienna* are of the 9th Instant. They give an account that the Elector of *Bavaria* was returned from *Hungary*; That the Imperial Army were still encamped near *Pell*; That upon a General Muster it appeared they have not lost above 3000 Men during this whole Campaign; That the Troops were in a very good condition, being very well supplied with Provisions and all manner of necessaries, and that a great quantity of Bombs and other Ammunition hath been lately sent from *Vienna* to the Army, which makes it thought they have a design to attack *Agria* or some other place of importance, but the more general opinion is that the Duke of *Lorraine* will not undertake a Siege so late in the year but will rather put his Forces betimes into their winter Quarters, that they may the Earliest begin the Campaign the next year, if the winter do not produce a Peace.

*Hague*, Sept. 25. The States of *Holland* and *West Friesland* adjourned on Friday last till to morrow. The Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*, who was here in person, parted from hence this Afternoon for *Amsterdam*, from whence he intends to go to *Brabant*. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 13th Instant, tell us that the Emperor had received an account by an Express, That the Viceroy of *Croatia* entering into several Villages; and that after four days march he came to *Dubitzca*, a very rich Town, with a Castle adjoining to it on the River *Thana*; Which the Croats, with little opposition made themselves Masters of, and having got a great deal of Rich Plunder set first to it; They in the Cable in the mean time giving the alarm to the Neighboring places the Turks halted from thence to their assistance, and having together formed a Body of about 1500 Men, they followed the Croats and fell upon them in their retreat, but were so well received by them that between 4 and 500 of the Turks were killed and the

rest put to flight; The Croats in this occasion took seven Colors (which were presented to the Emperor by the Officers who brought this news) and returned home laden with the Spoyle of the Enemy. Its said they found in *Dubitzca* 300000 Florins in ready Money, besides Plate and other Riches.

*Paris*, Sept. 26. The 20th Instant arrived here the Count *Wielopolski* great Chancellor of *Poland* and Ambassador Extraordinary from that Crown to his Most Christian Majesty. with a very numerous Train. The Court is still at *Chambor*, but will remove from thence to *Fontainebleau* before the end of this month. The King has given the place of great Master of the Artillery, Vacant by the Death of the Duke *de Lude* to the Marschal *d'Humiegers*.

*Oxford*, Sept. 17. On Tuesday last was brought hither from *Hamersmith*, the Corps of the Right Honourable Sir *Leoline Jenkins* Kt. which was Attended by some of his Friends, and by his Domestick Servants, and was met without his City, by several of the Doctors and Principal Members of the University, as also by the Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens, some in Coaches, and others on Horse-back; It was Conducted to the Publick Schools, where the Vice-Chancellor and the Right Reverend Father in God the Lord Bishop of this Diocess, with the whole Body of the University, received and placed it in the Divinity-School, which was fitted for that purpose; This afternoon the Vice-Chancellor and the Lord Bishop, together with the Noblemen, Doctors, Proctors and Masters, met in their respective Formalities; And the Memory of the Deceased being solemnized in a Latin Speech by the University Orator; the Corps was removed to the Chappell of *Jesus College* (to which he was a liberal Benefactor in his life time, but more especially at his Death) where the Vice-Chancellor, Principal of the said College, read the Offices of Burial, and a Latin Speech was also spoken by one of the Fellows, which was accompanied with Musick and Anthems suitable to the Occasion.

*Windsor*, Sept. 18. His Majesty returned hither this Evening from *Windsor*.
