The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the provisions of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amend-"ment of the church building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twentieth day of January one thousand eight hundred and fortyseven, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the several parishes of the said parish of Mackworth as far as the Old

Saint Werburgh, Saint Alkmund, and All Saints, situate in the town and county of the town of Derby, and within the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous parts of the said two first-mentioned parishes, and the whole of a certain detached portion of the last-mentioned parish, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry to be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate in the said parish of Saint Werburgh, for all ecclesiastical purposes, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the church "building Acts;" and that such consolidated chapelry should be called, "The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Derby," and be bounded as follows, that is to say :

" On the north by the liberty of Darley Abbey, in the said parish of Saint Alkmund, and part of the parish of Mackworth; on the west by part of the said parish of Mackworth; on the south by the remaining part of the said parish of Saint Werburgh, from which the said consolidated chapelry is separated by the Bramble Brook, from the said parish of Mackworth as far as the Old
