

# The London Gazette.

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Naples, September 12.

**T**HE last week parted from hence the Spanish Gallies, 22 in number, for *Final*. The 9 instant an Extraordinary Courier arrived here from the Governor of *Milan*, upon which the Collateral Council of this City was assembled; And the next day three great Tartanes laden with Provisions and Ammunition were sent from hence to joyne the said Gallies. On *Thursday* last returned hither the Gallies of the great Duke of *Tuscany* from the *Levant*, having left the Venetian Fleet since the taking of *Coron*. The same day parted from hence two Gallies of *Genova* laden with *Silk*.

*Rome*, Sept. 15. On *Tuesday* last dyed here Cardinal *Paulo Savelli de Montalto* in the 63 year of his Age and the 20th of his Cardanlate; By his Death a Twenty Seventh place is become vacant in the Colledge of Cardinals. The Cardinal *Cibo* had this week an Audience of the Pope concerning the affairs of *Hungary*, upon which his Holiness hath sent a considerable Sum of money to his Nuncio at *Vienna* to be employed in the War.

*Genova*, Sept. 16. The Great Council being assembled on *Thursday* last to deliberate about divers publick affairs, made choice of Signior *Gio Battista Della Rovere* to go and reside at the Court of *France* in quality of Envoy Extraordinary from this Republick, but it's said he has prayed to be excused from that Employment. The Spanish Gallies, which passed the tenth Instant within sight of this City, are we hear arrived at *Porto Longone*. By a Vessel arrived from *Tholon* we are informed, that the 15 French Gallies have joyned their men of War that were lately before *Tripoli* under the command of the Marschal *d'Estrees*.

*Warsaw*, Sept. 15. The last Letters from *Lemboarg* gave an account, That the Sieur *Demideski* having received advice that the Turks were marching to put a great Convoy into *Caminiec*, he drew together what Troops he could from the Neighboring Garrisons, and sent Orders to the Sieur *Lejmiski* and Colonel *Posolski* to joyne him with the Forces of their Divisions, which they having accordingly don, they marched together toward *Cocchin*, but arriving near that place, were informed that the said Convoy, which was guarded by 5000 Turks under the Orders of Sui Bassa, and two other Bassa's, and 6000 Tartars of *Biolograd* under the Command of their General *Smalio*, was got into *Caminiec*, and that the Enemy after having refreshed themselves one day, had divided into four Bodies; One taking their march towards *Zublauiow*, and the others towards *Kassow*, *Sniatin* and *Romanow*, from whence having made incursions into *Procutia* and *Kolonia*, they afterwards all joyned at *Constantinow*, where they were attacked by a Detachment from the Polish Army and entirely routed, above 2000 of them being slain, and all the Plunder they had taken recovered, and that a great many more had been afterwards killed by the Country People. The Polish Army according to our last advices was encamped at *Bluffa* near the *Niester*, where they expected the Forces of *Lithuania* to joyne with them. The Cham of *Tartary* had joyned the Sersaquier *Solim*;

Men; They had posted themselves near the *Niester* to hinder the Poles from passing that River.

*Vienna*, Sept. 20. Our last Letters from the Imperial Camp near *Barkan* were dated the 17th Instant; They give an account, That the Baron *de Merzi* and Colonel *Hensler* marched the 10th with 8000 Men towards *Agria*, and took with them several pieces of Cannon and Mortars, having Orders to attack that place with Bombs, and to possess themselves of several Posts in order to block it up during the Winter, as well as to secure the Quarters which the Imperialists intend to take on the other side of the *Theis*. That the Duke of *Lorraine* had sent another Detachment of 6000 Men to reinforce the Army in *Croatia*, which according to our last Letters from thence was marching towards *Sclavonia*. That the Parties his Highness had sent out to learn News of the Enemy, confirmed the account he had before had from the Prisoners, That the Sersaquier *Ibrahim* was encamped with 15000 Horse and 8000 Foot near the *Danube*, about six Miles below *Buda*, and that there were 2000 Janisaries in *Pest*, and 800 in *Buda*. The Count *de Rabata* Commissary General hath sent this week a Sum of Money to *Newbeust* to be employed for the repairing the Fortifications of that place, which they work upon with great diligence. The Prince *de Lubomirski*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *Poland*, hath had his publick audiences, and made the Compliments he was charged with upon the Election of *Bavaria's* Marriage with the Archduchess; And the Count *de Magliano*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoy*, has performed the same Commission on the part of that Prince. The Emperor has given the Government of *Marabittin* vacant by the Death of *Abbas Masquiss de Giza*, to the Prince *de Salme*, Governour of the Archduke *Joseph*; The Letters from *Poland* shew, That the Forces of *Lithuania* had joyned with those of the Crovns; That the Generals had resolved to pass the *Niester* and to enter upon *Moldavia*, but that a Body of Tartars had posted themselves on the other side of that River, and dispersed in passage.

*Vienna*, Sept. 22. The Emperor we are told has written to the Duke of *Lorraine* to require the Release demanded by the Sersaquier *Ibrahim* for the *Bavoy* he would send hither with Proposals for a Truce; And Count *Feskeley's* Secretarys who is somewhat with like Overtures from himself had come back with an answer, that as to the satisfaction, The Duke of *Lorraine* continued in camp about 20 of this month near *Barkan*, but the season is so far advanced, that no considerable Action can be undertaken, and therefore they talk of nothing but of going into Winter Quarters to preserve the Troops, which are now in good posture, that they will be recruited with little trouble and expence, and easily put into a condition to begin the Campaign very early the next year. On *Friday* last arrived here an Express, being sent by General *Schulze* to give the Emperor an account of the Surrender of *Esperies*. The Particulars we have of it, are, That on the 10th Instant the Governour received a Warley, and a Cessation of Hostilities till the next morning, that he might in the mean time call together the inhabitants to deliberate with them concerning the Articles of Surrender; which General *Schulze*, belie-

ving his design herein was only to gain time, would not consent to; but demanded to have two Officers immediately sent to him as Hostages. The Besieged would not agree to it, and so the Siege was renewed on both sides. But the next day the Governor, understanding that the Besiegers would in few days be reinforced with a great Detachment from the Imperial Army, again desired a Parley, and agreed to send out a Lieutenant and two Burgers upon condition the Besiegers would give as many Hostages on their part, which was accordingly performed on both sides, and towards Evening the Capitulation was concluded and signed; The chief Articles of which were; *That the Magistrates and Burgers shall enjoy their ancient Privileges, and the Places and Employments they are at present in; but that all the Inhabitants shall be disarmed, and their Arms carried to the Town-house. That the Governor and all the Officers with such of the Garrison (which consisted in 300 Germans and 700 Hungarians) as desired it should be received into the Emperor's Service in the same quality they were then in, and that the rest should be conducted to some place which they should choose.* Accordingly the Town was surrendered the 12th. And the Governor and all the Germans and most of the Hungarians entered into the Emperor's Service, the rest except 10 or 12 voluntarily promising to return home, and never to bear Arms again against his Imperial Majesty.

*Brussels, Octob. 2.* The States of Flanders have granted the ordinary Subsidy for the year ensuing, and have sent Deputies hither to acquaint his Excellency with what they have done; and that if the Peace continue, they hope they shall be able to raise it the next year to what it was before the last War. The Bishop of *Strasbourg* is still at *Liege*, but will go from thence in few days to be present at the Assembly of the States of the Diocesis of *Cologne*, which are appointed to meet the 12th of this month at *Bon. Don Juan Antonio de Piemontel*, Governor and Captain General of the Provinces *del Rio de la Platte*, parted from hence the 27th past for *Hydelberg*, whither he goes in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from his Catholick Majesty to compliment the Elector Palatine.

*Brussels, Octob. 5.* Yesterday arrived here an Express from *Vienna* with the News that the Imperialists had taken *Speries* by Composition; and that General *Schultz* was marching towards *Caschau* likewise to reduce that place: That Count *Feckeley* had sent his Secretary to *Vienna* with Proposals of an Accommodation for himself, but that it was believed the Emperor would not hearken to them, no more than to those made by the Seraskier, who pressed very much for a Truce. And that the Forces in *Croatia* were on their march under the Command of the Count *de Lavignit* to besiege *Poffegrain* in *Solavonia*.

*Bagut, Oct. 5.* The Ratifications of the Treaty lately concluded between this State and the Elector of *Brandenburgh* were exchanged yesterday. The States of *Holland* are again adjourned till Wednesday next, not having as yet any final resolution about the Duties of Importation and Exportation, which is the chief business they have at present before them. The Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel* is gone to *North Holland*, from whence he will return to *Amsterdam*, and then take his Journey for *Brabant*. The Campaign being finished in *Hungary*, and the Troops upon going into their Winter Quarters, Prince *Wolff* as the last Letters from *Vienna* informed us was preparing for his return hither. The Herz *Vrancklyk* is come back from *Zealand*, where he hath been to assist the Assembly of the States of that Province. The Count *de Thun*, late Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor in England, arrived here the last week, and is gone from hence for *Brussels*.

*Paris, Octob. 6.* The Court parted the 28th of the last month from *Chambor*, and came the 30th to *Fontainebleau*. The *Marschal d'Estrees* arrived the 25th past with the Fleet under his Command at the Isles of *Heues*.

*Windsor, Sept. 28.* His Majesty taking into his Royal Consideration the many eminent and faithful Services which the Right Honorable *George Lord Jeffreys of Wem*, Lord Chief Justice of England, has rendered the Crown as well in the Reign of the late King of ever blessed Memory, as since His Majesties Accession to the Throne, was pleased this day to commit to him the Custody of the Great Seal of England, with the Title of Lord Chancellor.
