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Rome, Sept. 22.

THE Letters from *Naples* tell us, They had advice by a Vessel arrived there from the *Levant*, that the Venetians had taken *Modon* in the *Morea*; but it needs a Confirmation.

Venice, Sept. 29. The Forces of this Republick, according to the Advices we have received this week, continued Encamped on the second of this month in the Neighborhood of *Coron*, Captain General *Morofini* being resolved not to remove from thence till the Fortifications of that Place which had been ruined during the Siege were repaired. He had caused all his sick Men to be transported to *St. Maura*; And had sent six Gallies to *Calamata* to encourage the Maiorities to cast off the *Ottoman* Yoak, and to put themselves under the Protection of the Republick. By a Saique arrived from *Zara* we are informed that the Chevalier *Fanco* was marched with a Body of Morlaques to make an Incurfion into the Turkish Territories.

Lembourg, Sept. 16. We have Letters from the Army of this Crown of the 10th Instant, which was then still Encamped near the *Niefter*. The Crown General had held a Council of War, where it was resolved that the Army should march the 11th to meet the Forces of *Lituania*, who advanced very slowly towards them, and that after their Conjunction they should pass the *Niefter*, and enter into *Moldavia*. The freshest account we have of the Enemy, is, That the Serauquier *Solimán Mahomet* was marching with an Army of about 30000 Men towards the *Niefter*; and that in the mean time the Tartars had undertaken to defend the passage of that River. It is confirmed that the Turks have put a great Convoy into *Caminie*, so that that place is now sufficiently provided with all things necessary for its defence. The Cosacks in the Service of this Crown are continually abroad in Parties to observe the Enemy, and have of late defeated several small Bodies of Tartars. The Moscovites for this *Czekrin*, and thereby give great assistance to the Turks. The King and Queen of *Poland* are expected in few days at *Zolkiew*, where their Majesties have used to pass the latter part of the year, as we are told they intend now to do. They write from *Moscow* that the Czars had declared that they would appoint Commissioners to meet at some convenient place on the Frontiers with those of this Crown for the composing the Differences about the Limits.

Venna, Sept. 30. The Elector of *Bavaria* parted from hence the 24th Instant with the Archduchess his Wife, their Imperial Majesties accompanying them to Our Lady of *Brun*, two Miles from hence, where they Dined, Their Electoral Highnesses having taken leave of their Imperial Majesties, continued their Journey towards *Munick*. Prince *Waldeck*, and the Baron *de Dinghen* are returned hither from the Imperial Army, which they left Encamped between the Rivers *Ipol* and *Gran*, where the Duke of *Lorraine* intended to continue till he had an account from the Baron *de Mercy* of the success of the design upon *Agria*; His

Highness, notwithstanding the ill condition in which the Turks left *Novigrad*, has given Orders for the fortifying that place, towards the Expence: whereof the Pope has given a good Sum of Money. We have advice that the Serauquier finding all his Endeavours for the setting on foot a Negotiation for a Peace or a Truce ineffectual, has repassed the Bridge of *Esseck*, and has separated his Forces, sending part of them towards *Zigeth*, and the rest towards *Sclavonia* and *Bosnia*. The 6000 Men with which Count *Palfi* had Orders to march towards *Croatia* to joyn the Forces Commanded by General *Leslie*, were according to the last account we had of them advanced no farther than the *Kzban*, and seeing the lateness of the year as well as the Detachements the Serauquier has sent to reinforce the *Ottoman* Forces on that side, will in all likelihood hinder the execution of the design Count *Leslie* had formed to attack *Poffega*, it's believed these Troops under the Orders of Count *Palfi* will be Countermanded. They write from *Nymbusfel*, That they had quite cleansed the great Ditch, and brought the Water into it as before the Siege; That the Trenches were all filled up; That they are at present repairing the two attackt Bastions, and that the Governour had summoned in 2000 Peasants out of the Neighbouring Counties to work on the said Fortifications. The Letters from *Upper Hungary* inform us that General *Schultz* was before *Caschaw*; And that General *Caprara* was marched directly towards *Tockay*, resolving to take that place whatever it cost, that he might thereby open a passage and correspondence between *Transylvania* and *Zatmar*. The President of the Council of War, the Commissary General, and the Baron *d'Abete*, have frequent conferences together about settling the Winter quarters. It's said the Troops of *Brunswick* and *Cologne* will have theirs in *Hungary*, *Silesia* and *Moravia*. The Count *de Conningmark*, Maître de Camp General of the Forces of the King of *Sweden* is arrived here, and we are told he is treating with the Ambassador of *Venice*, about his entering into the service of that Republick during the present War, as General of their Forces by Land. We receive just now certain advice that *Caschaw* has surrendered upon Articles. And there are Letters which say that the Garrison and Inhabitants of *Tockay* had sent Deputies to General *Caprara* to capitulate.

Ratisbonne, Octob. 5. We have an account by an Express which came from *Vienna* the second Instant, That the Emperess was the day before brought to Bed of a third Son, to the great joy of that Court. The Letters from *Hungary* tell us, That the Imperial Army Commanded by the Duke of *Lorraine* would separate in few days, and go into their Winter-Quarters, his Highness having received advice that the Serauquier had repassed the Bridge of *Esseck*, having sent a Detachment to reinforce the *Ottoman* Troops on the side of *Sclavonia*, that they might be able to make head against General *Leslie*'s Army, which was Encamped the 20th of this Month near *Turanowitz*, having a Bridge over the *Drave*, which they had secured by planting several Pieces of Cannon at the head of

It. The Bissa of *Bosnia* was with the Troops under his Command at *Orsofsza*, two days march from *Turamowitz*, where he expected the Baisa of *Poffeg* to join with him; but the Count de *Luzerne*, who in the absence of General *Lishe* Commands the Imperial Army, had resolv'd to march towards the Enemy, and fight them before they were reinforced with the several Detachments that were on their march for that purpose. We have advice that Count *Hürberstein* was march'd from *Carelstadt* with 2 or 3000 Men to make a great Incurfion into the Turkish Territories, of which we are expecting the Particulars; The Turks in those, and even in the more remote parts of the *Ottoman Empire*, are in the greatest Consideration imaginable, and therefore we need not wonder that the Sérafquier has made such Advances towards a Peace, which is so necessary for that Empire at this time. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, That the Army of that Crown had pass'd the *Nieser*, and was marching towards the Enemy to fight them; and that the Cossacks had defeated a great Party of Tartars, and had taken a Vessel in the *Black Sea*, in which were two Baisas who were going to the Crimea with a great Sum of Money to be distributed among the Tartars. General *Schultz* has taken *Caschaw* by Composition. General *Caprara* was marching to attack *Tockay*; And the Imperial Troops Commanded by the Baron de *Mercy*, Count *Gondola*, and Colonel *Heuster*, (whom the Emperor hath lately made Major-Generals) were before *Agria*, and had begun to attack that place with Bombs.

Hague, *Octob. 11.* The Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel* arriv'd the 8th Instant at *Delfe*, the next day he went to *Ryterdam*, intending to pass from thence by Water to *Antwerp*. The Ratifications of the Treaty lately concluded with the Elector of *brandenburg* were exchanged the last week; And it's believed the States General will now in few days give order for the first payment of the Arrears of Subsidies due to his Electoral Highness. The Letters from *Germany* give an account of the surrender of *Caschaw*.

Brussels, *Octob. 12.* Our Governor General who was the last week very much indispos'd for two or three days, is perfectly well again, and gave yesterday publick Audience. Don *Foseph de Montada* is returned from *Holland*; whither he was sent by his Excellency to Compliment the Prince of *Orange*. The Prince de *Mourbach*, who hath been at the Court of *England* in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Cologne*, pass'd some days ago through this City in his return home. We have Letters from *Vicenna* of the first Instant which inform us that *Caschaw* was surrendr'd to General *Schultz*, and that *Tockay* had sent Deputies to General *Caprara* to lay hold of the Emperors Pardon. That the Sérafquier had re-pass'd the Bridge of *Esseck*; And had separated his Forces; And that the Imperial Troops were likewise preparing to go into their Winter-quarters; That his Highness had sent another Detachment towards *Upper Hungary*; And that the Baron de *Mercy* was with 10000 Men before *Agria*. The Emper's was brought to Bed the first Instant of a young Prince.

Paris, *Octob. 13.* The Sieur d'*Estavay de Mollondin* having by reason of his great age resign'd the Command of Colonel of the Regiment of *Suisse-Guards*, the King has given the same to the Sieur *Stoupe*, Lieutenant General of his Majesties Armies. The Count d'*Avaux*, Ambassador from this Crown at the *Hague*, has leave to return hither for some short time to look after his private affairs. The Sieur *Girardin* the Kings Ambassador to the *Ottoman Port*, who was going to *Thoulon* to Embark there for *Constantinople*, has upon the Directions he received from hence stop't his Journey, and will stay at *Lyons* till he has farther Orders.

There has happen'd some new Differences between the inhabitants of *Conterabia* and those of *Andayé*, upon which it's said Orders have been sent to the Marquis de *Boufflers* to return with the Troops under his Command towards those Frontiers.

Whitehal, *Octob. 6.* Count *Hamilton*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector Palatin, hath had Audience of their Majesties, of the Queen Dowager, and of their Royal Highnesses Prince *George*, and the Princess *Anne*, of *Denmark*, being conducted by Sir *Charles Cotrel* Master of the Ceremonies.

The Baron de *Loez*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Trier*, hath likewise had Audience of their Majesties, being conducted by *Charles Cotrel* Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies, and of the Queen Dowager, conducted by Sir *Charles Cotrel*.

Whitehal, *Octob. 6.* Their Majesties return'd hither this Afternoon from *Windfor*.

Whitehal, *Octob. 7.* This Afternoon the Heer Van *Duyvenvoorden*, the Heer Van *Gitters*, and the Heer *Dyckvelt* Ambassadors Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces, had their Publick Audience of Leave of their Majesties, being Conducted by the Lord *Berkeley* and Sir *Charles Cotrel* Master of the Ceremonies.
