der his Command at Orovicza, two days march I from Turanomitz, where he expected the Bada of Poffega to joyn wich him ; but the Count de Lavergne, who in the abience of General Liflie Commands the Imperial Army, had refolved to march towards the Energy, and fight them before they were reinforced with the leveral Detachements that were on their march fif that purpole. We have advice that Count Herberflein was marched from Carel studi with 2 or 3000 Men to make a great Incursion into the Furkish Territories, of which we are expecting the Particulars; The Tu ks in those, and even in the more remoter parts of the Ottoman Empire, are in the greateft Confernation imaginable, and therefore we need not wonder that the Sérafquier has made fuch Advances towards a Peace, which is fo necessary for that Empire The Letters from Poland tell us, That at this time. the Army of that Crown had paffed the Nieffer, and was marching towards the Enemy to fight them; and that the Collacks had defeated a great Party of Tarta's, and had taken a Vellel in the Black Sea, in which were two Baila's who were going to the Crimee with a great Sum of Money to be diffributed among the Tartars. General Schultz has taken Cafcham by Composition. General Caprara was marching to attack Tockay; And the Imperial Troops Commanded by the Baron de Mercy, Count Gondola, and Colonel Leufler, (whom the Emperor hath lately made Major-Generals) were before Agria, and had begun to attack that place with Bombs.

Hague, Oltob. 12. The Landtgrave of Heffe-Caffel arrived the 8th Inftant at Delfe, the next day he went to Rotterdam, intending to pais from thence by Water to Antwerp. The Ratifications of the Treaty lately concluded with the Elector of brandenburg were excha ged the laft week; And it's believed the States General will now in few days give order for the fift payment of the Arrears of Subfidies due to his Electoral Highnefs. The Letters from Germany give an account of the furrender of Cafebaw. Bruffels, Oilgb. 12. Our Governor General who

was the laft week very much indifposed for two or three davs, is perfectly well again, and gave yefter-day publick Audience. Don Fofeph de Moneada is returned from Holland, whither he was fent by his Excellency to Compliment the Prince of Orange. The Prince de Mourback, who hath been at the Court of England in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Colegne, paffed fome days ago through this City in his return home. We have Letters from Ficana of t c hift Inffant which inform us that Cafebaw was furrendied to General Schultz, and that Tockay had tent D: puties to General Caprara to lay hold of the Emperors Pardon. That the Scrafquir had repassed the Bridge of Effeck; And had reparated his Forces ; And that the Enperial Troops were likewife preparing to go into their Winter-quarters; That his Highness had sent another Detachement towards Upper Hungar); And that the Baron de Mercy was with 10000 Men before Agria. The Empress was brought to Bed the first Instant of a young Prince.

Paris, Oftob. 13. The Sieur d'Estavay de Mollondia having by reason of his great age refigned the Command of Colonel of the Regiment of Suiffe-Guards, the King has given the fame to the Sieur Stoupe, Licutenant General of his Maj flics Armies. The Count d'Avaux, Ambassiador from this Crown at the Hague. has leave to return hither for some short time to look after his private affairs. The Sieur Girardin the Kings Ambassiador to the Ottoman Port, who was going to Thoulon to Embark there for Constantinople, has upon the Directions he received from hence flopt his Journey, and will flay at Lyons till he has farther Orders.
