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A Proclamation for the Meeting of the Parliament.

WHEREAS on the second day of July last, We signified Our Pleasure to both Our Houses of Parliament, that they should be adjourned until the fourth day of August last, and that We did not then intend to make a Session, but that the Session should be carried on by further Adjournments, by such Members as were about the Town, until the Winter, unless some Emergency happened, which might require their Meeting, in which Case or whensoever We should amend a Session, We declared We would signifie Our farther Pleasure by Our Proclamation. And Whereas on the fourth day of August last, both Our said Houses of Parliament met at Westminster, and according to Our Royal Pleasure then Signified to them, were adjourned until Monday the ninth day of November next, on which day We purposing to meet Our Loving Subjects in Parliament in Order to make a Session; And to the End the Members of both Our Houses of Parliament may not be ignorant of Our Intentions and good Pleasure herein, We do by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice of Our Council, Publish and Declare the same; And do hereby Will and Require all and every the Members of both Our Houses of Parliament, unless let and hindered by some Lawful cause, to Assemble and keep their day at Westminster, on Monday the ninth day of November next, according to the said last Adjournment, as they will avoid Our Royal displeasure.

Given at Our Court, at Whitehall, the Eleventh Day of October, 1685. In the First Year of Our Reign.

Carelstadt in Croatia, Sept. 22. The 14th instant in the Morning our Governor the Count de Herberstein, marched from hence with the Troops under his Command, to make an Incurfion into the Province of *Licca*; In the Afternoon he came before the Castle of *Grebemar*, and ordered Colonel *Orfich*, and Colonel *Purftaller* to attack the same with the Infantry they Commanded, which they did, and in a short time made themselves Masters of the Outworks, and afterwards set the Castle on Fire, several of the Turks were burnt, many killed, and the rest made Prisoners; From thence our Forces marched to the River *Licca*, near which they rested all night, and the next Morning continued their march towards *Budak*, the Chief City of that Province; The Enemy upon our approach burnt all the Houses as well as Forage in the Neighborhood, and put themselves into a posture to defend the place; That day we attackt it with Bombs and Granadoes, but without doing any great Execution; And towards Evening 500 Turkish foot and 300 Horse. drawn from the adjacent Garifons, appeared near the Town, where upon our General sent out Colonel *Gall*, and Co-

lonel *Voinowich*, with the Cavalry under their Command. They passed the River with 600 Horse, and marched towards the Enemy; The Turkish Horse being charged by Colonel *Gall*, after having stood about half an hour fled, and were soon followed by their foot, of which 250 were killed, and most of the rest taken Prisoners; after which our Troops returned to their Camp with six Colors which they had taken. The 16th the General held a Council of War, where it was resolved not to make any farther attempt upon *Budak*, but that they should rather do the Enemy all the damage they could by Ravaging the Country; Accordingly our Forces marched from thence the same day, and passing by *Novi*, *Ribnick*, and *Bellay*, advanced to the Castle of *Nivi Perusick*, which they attacked and took, putting the Garifon to the Sword, except some few, to whom they gave Quarter. The 18th they marched back again, and yesterday returned hither with a great deal of Plunder, and 130 Prisoners, besides a great many Families of *Valaques*, who have put themselves under the Protection of the Emperor. In this Expedition about 30 of our Men were killed and 70 wounded; And of the Enemy above 400 were slain, and 4000 houses burnt.

Vienna, Sept. 30. The Duke de *Croy* arrived here this afternoon from the Imperial Army, which continues encamped between the Rivers *Gran* and *Ipol*, but it's believed the Troops will now in few days be sent to their Winter-Quarters; The *Bavarian* Cavalry have Orders to march to his Electoral Highnesses Territories, where they are to Winter, but the Infantry will be disposed of in *Hungary*, *Silesia* and *Moravia*; Prince *Waldeck* is now here to confer with the Imperial Ministers about the Quarters to be assigned the Troops of the Empire, who if they cannot have them in some of the Hereditary Countries, will return home. We have an account that *Caschau* has Capitulated; There are now 19 Imperial Regiments in Upper *Hungary*, under the Command of General *Caprara*, who its hoped will before they go into their Winter-quarters, reduce all that Country to the Emperors Obedience; Major General *Mercy* was according to the last Letters from the Imperial Camp; before *Agria*, and had begun to attack that place with his Cannon and Bombs; The Body he has under his Command is composed of 15 Regiments. Count *Teckeleys* Secretary is still here, and it's believed his Negotiation will not be fruitless. The Count de *Magliano* Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoy*, to Compliment the Emperor upon the Elector of *Bavaria's* Marriage with the Arch-Dutchess, parted from hence yesterday on his return home. The Letters from *Croatia* give an account that the Turks endeavor to reinforce themselves on that side to make head against the Imperial Forces Commanded by General *Leslie*, and in his absence by the Count de *Lavergne*; That three Bassas who had been in the Turkish Army in *Hungary*, were arrived at *Sigetb*, with the Troops under their Orders, which were in a very ill condition having suffered very much for want of Provisions and Forage; That the Bassa of *Bosnia* was Postd

Posted with 2000 Men at *Orovizza*, about a days march from *Turanowitz*, where the Imperial Forces were encamped, and that the Count de *Lauvergne*, had resolved to march with his Horse and Dragoons to attack him there, before the succors he expected had joyned him. The Letters from *Cracow*, assure us that the Polish Army had pass'd the *Niester*, but do not say that the Forces of *Lithuania* had yet joyned them; There is a discourse still that the King would go and Command the Army in person, but it is believed the ill State of his health would not permit it.

Hambough, October 9. The *Sieur Minders*, Envoy from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the *Sieur de Groot* the Duke of *Hanovers* Minister, having formed a Project of an Accommodation, between the Duke of *Zell* and this City, they have put it into his Highnesses hands, whose resolution thereupon, we are now expecting. We have an account from *Berlin* that the Electoral Princess of *Brandenburg* was brought to bed the sixth instant of a Son, to the extraordinary joy of that Court. The last Letters from *Warsaw* told us that the Court was gone to *Zolkiew*, where it was believed their Majesties would pass a month or six weeks. That the Arch-Bishop of *Gnesna* Primate and first Senator of the Kingdom was dead of an Apoplexy, having by his Will given greatest part of his Estate to the King. That the Prince of *Courland* was gone to the Army with some other persons of the first Quality, but that it was thought the time of the year would not suffer them to enter upon any great Action. They had an account that the Ottoman Forces Commanded by the Seraskier *Solyman* had pass'd the *Danube*, and were on their march towards the *Niester*; And that a considerable Body of Tartars was likewise marching that way. We have had several advices from *Poland* that the *Czars* of *Moscow* were desir'd to enter into the Alliance between the Emperor, the Crown of *Poland* and the Republick of *Venice*, against the Turks, but the Letters that come directly from *Moscow*, say the Inclination of that Court at present is altogether to Peace.

Cologne, October 9. Things are at present here in some suspense, the Imperial Commissioners expecting farther Instructions upon the account they have given the Emperor of their Proceedings here. The Decrees that were put out of their Places about three years ago continue their instances to be restored, but have not yet obtained any answer from the Commissioners to their satisfaction; And it is believed they will not, because of the pretence all the old Magistrates would then have to be likewise restored; This week the *Sindick Gulick*, who was made a Prisoner at the demand of the said Commissioners for having been one of the chief promoters of the disorders that have so long disturb'd the Peace of this City, was yesterday examined before them for the first time and it is said a Process is order'd to be made against him. They write from *Vienna* that the *Sieur Mayersheims*, was parted from thence in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Elector of *Cologne*. Don *Juan de Jimenez*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Spain*, to the El *Stor Palatin*, arriv'd here the 7th instant from *Brussels*, and the next day continued his Journey for *Hydelberg*.

Hague, October 16. The Members of the States of *Holland* and *West Frize*, who adjourn'd the last week, are most of them arriv'd here this day in order to their re-assembly to-morrow. The Prince of *Orange* came hither last night but intends in two or three days to go back to the *Veluwe* to pass some farther time there. The Deputies of the States General have had a Conference with the Council of

State, about giving the necessary Orders for the cleansing the lower *Rhin*, which work will now forthwith be taken in hand. The Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*, parted the 10th instant from *Rosterdam*, in a Yacht for *Antwerp*. The Letters from *Vienna* of the fourth instant confirm the news we had of the surrender of *Caschau*.

Paris, October 17. The Marschal d' *Estrees* is returned with the Fleet under his Command from the Coast of *Barbary* to *Thoulon*, and is in few days expected at Court. The Princess de *Coni* has the Small-Pox. Monsieur de *St. Romain*, who was the Kings Ambassador in *Portugal*, is arriv'd at *Roche* in his return hither. The Letters from *Germany* give an account that the Town of *Caschau* in Upper *Hungary* had sent Deputies to General *Caprara* to accept of the General Amnestie; That *Tockay* was about doing the same; That *Tackley* was daily abandoned by those that were most his Confidants, and that he himself did very earnestly sollicite the Emperors Pardon.

Whitehal, October 9. The Heer *Van Duyvenvoorden*, the Heer *Van Gitters*, and the Heer *Dyckvelt*, Ambassadors Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces, had yesterday their Audience of Leave of the Queen Dowager, and this day of Prince *George* and the Princess *Ann* of *Denmark*, being Conducted by Sir *Charles Cottrel* Master of the Ceremonies.

This day likewise the Baron de *Loe*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Trier*, had Audience of their Royal Highnesses, Conducted by Sir *Charles Cottrel*.

Whitehal, October 11. His Majesty has been pleas'd to make choice of Sir *Edward Herbert*, Chief Justice of *Chester*, to be Lord Chief Justice of the Kings-Bench; And of Sir *Edward Lutwich* one of His Majesties Serjeants at Law, to succeed him in the Place of Chief Justice of *Chester*; His Majesty has been likewise pleas'd to remove Sir *Robert Wright* one of the Barons of the Exchequer, to the Court of *Kings-Bench*, in the place of Sir *Thomas Walcot* deceased, and to name Sir *Edward Neville*, one of His Majesties Serjeants at Law, to be Baron of the Exchequer. *Roger North* and *Olivier Mountague* Esquires, both of His Majesties Council at Law, are made the first Attorney, and the other Solicitor General to the Queen.
