A Proclamation for the Meeting of the Parliament.

JAMESR.

Hereas on the second day of July taft, We fignified Our Pleasure to both Our Houjes of Parliament, that they should be adjourned until the fourth day of August last, and that We did not then intend to make a Session, but that the Seffion (hould be carryed on by further Adjournments, by fuch Members as were about the Town, until the Winter, unless fome Emergency bappened, which might require their Meeting, in which Cafe or whenfoever We fhould intend a Seffion , We declared We would fignific Our farther Pleasure by Our Proclamation. And Whereas on the fourth day of August laft, both Our faid Houfes of Parliament met at Westminster, and according to Our Royal Pleasure then Signified to them, were adjourned Royal Pleafure iden Significa to them, where adjourned until Monday the ninth day of November next, on which day We purposing to meet Our Loving Subjects in Parliament in Order to make a Selfion; And to the End the Members of both Our Houses of Parliament may not be ignorant of Our Intentions and good Pleafure herein, We do by this Our Proclamation, by and with the device of Our Coursell Public and Parlies the Image Advice of Our Council, Publish and Declare the same; And do hereby Will and Require all and every the Mem-bers of both Our Houses of Parliament, unless let and bindred by some Lawful cause, to Assemble and keep their day at Wellminster, on Monday the ninth day of November next, according to the faid laß Adjournment, as they will avoid Our Royal displeasure. Given at Our Court at Whitehal, the Eleventh Day of Oflober, 1685. In the First Year of Our Reign.

Carel fladt in Croatia, Sept. 22. The 14th inflant in the Morning our Governor the Count de Herberstein, marched from hence with the Troops under his Command, to make an Incursion into the Province of Lieca; In the Afternoon he came before the Caftle of Grebenar, and ordered Colonel Orfich, and Colonel Purstaller to attack the fame with the Infantry they Commanded, which they did, and in a inort time made themselves Maliers of the Outworks, and aftewards fet the Caffle on Fire, feveral of the Turks were burnt, many killed, and the reft made Prisoners; From thence our Forces marched to the River Licea, near which they refled all night, and the next Morning continued their march towards Budak, the Chief City of that Province; The Enemy upon our approach burnt all the Houfes as well as Forage in the Neighborhood, and put themfelves

lonel Voinowich, with the Cavalry under their Command. They paffed the River with 600 Horfe, and marched towards the Enemy; The Turkifh Horfe being charged by Colonel Gall, after having ftood about half an hour fled, and were foon followed by their foot, of which 250 were killed, and most of the reft taken Prisoners; after which our Troops returned to their Camp with fix Colors which they had taken. The 16th the General held a Council of War, where it was refolved not to make any farther attempt upon Budak, but that they should rather do the Enemy all the damage they could by Ravaging the Country; Accordingly our Forces marched from thence the fame day, and paffing by Nevi, Ribnick, and Bellay, advanced to the Caffle of Nivi Perufick, which they attacked and took, puting the Garifon to the Sword, except fome few, to whom they gave Quarter. The 18th they marched back again, and yefterday returned bither with a great deal of Plunder, and 130 Priloners, befides a great many Families of *Valaques*, who have put themselves under the Protection of the Emperor, In this Expedition about 30 of our Men were killed and 70 wounded; And of the Enemy above 400

Were flain, and 4000 houfes burnt. Fienna, Sept. 30. The Duke de Croy arrived here this afternoon from the Imperial Army, which continucs encamped between the Rivers Gran and Ipol, but it's believed the Troops will now in few days be fent to their Winter-Quarters; The Bavarian Cavalry have Orders to march to his Electoral Highneffes Territories, where they are to Winter, but the Infantry will be disposed of in Hungary, Silesia and Moravia; Prince Waldeck Is now here to confer with the Imperial Ministers about the Quarters to be affigned the Troops of the Empire, who if they cannot have them in some of the Hereditary they cannot have them in tome of the Hereditary Countries, will return home. We have an account that Cafcham has Capitulated; There are now 19 Imperial Regiments in Upper Hungary, under the Command of General Caprara, who its hoped will before they go into their Winter-quarters, reduce all that Country to the Emperors Obedience ; Major General Mercy was according to the laft Letters from the Imperial Camp, before Agria, and had begun to attack that place with his Cannon and Bonibs; The Body he has under his Command is composed of 15 Regiments. Count Teckeley's Secretary is fill here, and it's believed his Negotiation will not be fruitlefs. The Count de Magliano Envoy Extra-ordinary from the Duke of Savoy, to Compliment the Emperor upon the Elector of Bavaria's Marriage with the Arch-Dutchels, parted from hence yefter-day on his return home. The Letters from *Groatia* give an account that the Turks endeavor to reinforce themfolves on that fide to make head against the Imperial Forces Commanded by General Leflie, and into a pollure to defend the place; That day we artickt it with Bombs and Granadoes, but without doing any great Execution; And towards Evening yoo Iurkilh foot and 300 Horle drawn from the adjacent Garilons, appeared near the Town, where dition having fuffered very much for want of Pro-upon our General feat out Golonel Gall, and Co-1 visions and Forage; That the Baffa of Bofnia was polation of the Baffa of Bofnia was polation of the Baffa of Bofnia was polation. Poffel with 2000 Men at Orovizza, about a days march fro a Turanomits, where the Imperial Forces were encamped, and that the Count de Lavergne, had refolved to march with his Horfe and Diagoons toattack him there, before the fuccors he expected , had joyned him. The Letters from Cracow, affure usthat the Polish Army had piffed the Niester, but do not fay that the Forces of Litbuania had yet joyned them; There is a difcourfe still that the King would go and Command the Army in perfon, but it Is believed the ill State of his health would not permit it.

Hambough, Oftober 9. The Sieur Minders, Envoy from the Elector of Brandenburgh, and the Sieur de Groot the Dake of Hanouers Minifler, having formed a Project of an Accommodation, between the Duke of Zell and this City, they have put it into his H ghheffes hands, whole re olution thereupon, we are now expecting. We have an account from Berlin that the Electorial Princels of Brandenburgh was brought to bed the fixth inflant of a Son, to'the extraordinary joy of that Court. The laft Letters from Warfim told us that the Court was gone to Zolkiew, where it was believed their Majeflies would pais a month or fix weeks. That the Arch-Bilhop of Gnefna Primare and firlt Senator of the Kingdom was dead of an Apoplexy, having by his Will given great-eft part of his Effate to the King. That the Prince of Courland was gone to the Army with fome other perfons of the first Quality, but that it was thought the time of the year would not fuffer them to enter upon any great Action. They had an account that the Ottoman Forces Commanded by the Scrafquier Solymin had paffed the Danube, and were on their march towards the Niester; And that a confiderable Body of Tartars was likewife marching that way. We have had feveral advices from Poland that the Czars of Mofcovy were disposed to enter into the Alliance between the Empror, the Crown of Poland and the Republick of Venice, against the Turks, but the Letters that come directly from Moscow, fay the Inclination of that Court at prefent is altogether to Peace.

Cologne, October 9. Things are at prefent here in some suspence, the Imperial Commissioners expecting farther Iuftructions upon the account they have given the Emperor of their Proceedings here. The Deaccus that were put out of their Places about three years ago continue their inflances to be reflored, but have not yet obtained any answer from the Commissioners to their fatisfaction; And it's believed they will not, because of the pretence all the old Magistrates would then have to be likewife reflored; This week the Sindick Gulick, who was made a Prifoner at the demand of the faid Commission.rs for having been one of the chief promoters of the diorders that have fo long diffurbed the Peace of this City, was yesterday examined before them for the first time and it's faid a Process is ordered to be made against him. They write from Fienna that the Sicur Mayersheims, was parted from thence in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Emreror to the Elector of Cologne. Don Juan de J'imeniel. Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Spuin, to the El ctor Palatin, arrivel here the 7th inftant from Bruffels, and the next day continued Lis Journy for Eydelbergk.

Hague, Ollober 16. The Members of the States of Ho! and and Welf Frizeland, who adjourned the lait week, are most of them arrived here this day in or-der to their re-affembling to morrow. The Prince of Orange came hither lass but intends in two or three days to go back to the Velume to pass forme farther time there. The Deputies of the States General have had a Conference with the Council of Hague, Oflober 16. The Members of the States of

State, about giving the necessary Orders for the cleanfing the lower Rbin, which work will now for th-with be taken in hand. The Landtgrave of Heffe Caffel, parted the 10th inftans from Rouerdam, 111 a Yacht for Antwerp. The Letters from Vienna of the fourth inftant confirm the news we had of the furrender of Cafebaw.

Paris, Oftober 17. The Marcichal a' Estrees is re . turned with the Fleet under his Command from the Coalt of Barbary to Thoulon, and is in few days expected at Court. The Princefs de Comi has the Small-Pox. Monficur de St. Romain, who was the Kings Ambafador in Portugal, 19 artived at Rockel in his return hither. The Letters from Germany give an account that the Town of Cafehaw in Lipper Hungary had fent Deputies to General Caprara to accept of the General Amnestie; That Tockay was about doing the fame ; That Teckeley was dayly abandoned by those that were molt his Confidents, and that he himfelf did very carneftly follicite the Emperors Pardon.

Whitebal, QRober 9. The Heer Van Duyvenvoorden, the Heer Van Gilsers, and the Heer Dickyels, Amballadors Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces, had yellerday their Audience of Leave of the Queen Dowager, and this day of Prince George and the Princeis Ann of Denmark; being Conducted by Sit Charles Courel Malter of the Ceremonies.

Thisday likewife the Baron de Loe, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Trier, had Audience of their Royal Highnesses, Conducted by Sir Charles Cottrel.

Whitebal, Oftober 11. His Majefty has been pleafed to make choice of Sir Edward Herbert, Chief Juffice of Chester, to be Lord Chief Judice of the Kings-Bench ; And of Sir Edward Lutwich one of His Majeffies Serjeants at Law, to fucceed him in the Place of Chief Jultice of Chejter; His Majefly has been likewife pleased to remove Sir Robert Wright one of the Barons of the Exchequer, to the Court of Kings Bench, in the place of Sir Thomas Walcos dectated, and to name : it Edward Neville, one of His Majeffies Serjeants at Law, to be Baron of the Exchequer. Roger North and Oliver Mountague Efquires, both of His Majellies Council at Law, are made the first Attorny, and the other sollicitor General to the Queen.
