PRESENT,

'The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act "to amend and render more effectual an Act, "passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventh day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county of Lancaster, and within the diocese of Chester, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the new church of Saint George, situate at Stayly-bridge, in the said parish of Ashton-under-Lyne (which was erected by your Majesty's said Commissioners, and consecrated in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty), under and

by wirtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render "more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous "parishes," or under or by virtue of any other power or authority in any wise enabling your Majesty's said Commissioners in this behalf; and that such district should be named, "The Chapelry District of New Saint George, Stayly-bridge," and that the boundaries thereof should be as follow, that is to say:

" The boundary commences at the bridge over the river Tame, at the southern end of Waterstreet, and proceeds north easterly up the middle of that street to King-street; then continues north easterly up the middle of King-street to Churchstreet, continuing up the middle of Churchstreet to the northern extremity thereof; and from that point, in a straight line for the length of one hundred and ninety one yards north westerly, to the eastern end of Cow-lane; then north westerly up the northern side of that lane to Ridge-hill-lane; and then northerly up the middle of Ridge-hill-lane and Arlies-lane, as far as Spoutbrook; it then proceeds northerly up the middle of May-hill-lane, until it enters the old turnpike road from Mossley to Ashton-under-Lyne, along
