visit; That having posted his Troops, and planted his Mortars, the Enemy made a Sally, out quickly retited again; That the Imperbilitis p Elently after beg n to shoot their Bomb, which caused a great Fire in the Town, but the Turks encouraged by their Baffa quenched it, though not till aft r f veral Houses were laid in Ashes. We have Letters from Turanowitz in Crostia of the 29th of the lait month, which tell us that the Serasquier Ibrabim was arrived at Mobatz, where he intended to stay about 15 days to give the necessary Orders about supplying Cantiza with Provisions and Ammunition, that they may be in a condition to sublist in case they should be blocke up this Winter; And that a Letter had been intercepred which a Country Fellow was carrying to Canisza, by which it appeared that the Enemy were drawing what Forces they could together on the fide of Creatia, with a resolution to fight the Imperialiss commanded at present by the Count de Lavergne; who we hear are removed from their Camp at Tutanowitz nearer to their Bridge on the Drave, upon the advice their Lieutenant General had received that the Turks had a design to attack it. Prince Walderk and the other general Officers that are here have daily Conferences with the Prefident of the Council of War, and some other of the Emperor's Ministers about the Winter-Quarters, which are not yet finally fetled. The Troops of Lunenburg will return home; But we shall not know how those of Cologne will be disposed of till we have an account of what the Sieur Mayersheim, whom the Emperor has fent to that Elector, has Negotiated with his Electoral Highnels. His Impefial Majelly we are told defires they should Winter in and in confideration of their remaining in his Service a Sum of Money is offered his Electoral Highness. It is said at Court that the Elector of Brandenburg has declared that he will assist the Emperor the next Summer with 20000 Men; And that the Elector of Saxony will likewise assist his Imperial Majesty with a Body of 4000 Men. The Mareschal de Coningsmark has made, we are told, an agreement with the Ambalfador of Venice about his entring into the Service of that Republick, whose Forces he is to Command next to the Captain General. On Thursday last were presented to the Emperor the six Standards taken by Count Herberstein in the late Incurfion he made into the Province of Licea.

Ratubonne, Odob. 11. We continue to receive very good News from Hungary. General Caprara has reduced Tockay, Onotz, and some other Casses to the Emperor's Obedience, but we have not yet any certain advice of the surrender of Casebam. The Imperial Forces before Agria have laid part of the Town in ashes, and though they do not intend formally to beliege the place, yet they hope with their Bombs to oblige the Inhabitants to furrender. They write from Croatia that the Turks had formed a delign to attack the Bridge the Imperialifis have on the Drave, but that they had been disapp in:ed by the Count de Lavergne's sending a Detachement to reinforce the Troops that were appointed for the guard of it. The Letters from Poland give an account of the Conjunction of the Forces of Lithuania with those of Poland; That the Army had afterwards passed the Niester, and advanced into Moldavia with a refolution to fight the Enemy, so that we expect to hear of some considerable action from that fide. We have an account by the last Letters from Vienna that Tockay, Onoth, and Serentz were surrendred to the Imperialists, That Caschaw did Capitulate; And that one of Count Teckeley's chief Officers had deserted him, and had put himself with 200 Men into the Emperor's Service. They write from Poland that the Army of that Crown was entred into Moldavia, and was within two hours march of the Enemy, commanded by the Serasquier Solyman.

Brusselles, Ostob. 19. The Letters we received by the last Spanish Ordinary told us that his Excellency Don Francisco Antonio d'Agurto will be continued in this Government. Don Fuan de Leyseca Superintendant of the Military Justice parted from hence this day for Madrid. being called by his Catholick Majesty to his Station in that Court. We gave you an account in one of our last, that one Taylor, who was in the late Rebellion in England, had been seized at Malines; This morning Captain Stanford was sent from hence with part of his Troop to conside the Prisoner to Oseand, where a Yacht is arrived to carry him for England.
