Venice, Octob. 12.

ON Tuesday last arrived here a Felucca with Letters from Captain-General *Morofini*, giving an account, That the Captain-Bassa having landed out of the Turkish Fleet several thousand men at *Napoli di Romania*, and joined with a great Body of Horse which the Turks had drawn together on that side, he marched towards *Calamata*, to keep the *Maynotes* from revolting to the Venetians; That Captain-General *Morofini*, who was newly reinforced with the Troops of *Saxony*, consisting in 3000 men, upon advice of it, resolved to march towards the Enemy, and to fight them, which he accordingly put in execution, having first made himself Master of the Fortress of *Zarnata*. The Captain-Bassa considering in the number of his Troops, and especially in his Cavalry, did not decline a Battle; And the two Armies being come near each other, and having posted themselves with the best advantage they could, they engaged with great courage on both sides; the Fight lasted several hours, and in conclusion the Turks were entirely defeated and fled; the place of Battle was covered with the Slain of the Enemy, and many were killed by the *Maynotes* in the pursuit. After this defeat of the Turks the Garrison of *Calamata* abandoned that place, into which Captain-General *Morofini* put a Garrison, and the *Maynotes* besieged *Porto Vitulo*; of all which we shall be able in our next to give you a more particular relation.

Vienna, Octob. 11. The last Letters from Upper *Hungary* confirm that *Tockay*, *Onoib*, *Potack* and *Serentz* have surrendered upon Articles, and that Imperial Garrisons have been put into those places: That *Caschau* had likewise sent Deputies to General *Caprara* to Capitulate, and to accept the General *Amnestie* published by the Emperor; They at first made difficulty to receive a German Garrison, pretending it was contrary to their ancient Priviledges, but finding they contested this point in vain, they at last submitted to it. We do not hear with any certainty whether *Teckley* is retired. There is a report that he is gone to great *Warsawin*, but we can hardly believe he would put himself into the Hands of the Turks; who are so much intended against him, looking upon him as the cause of their present Misfortunes: On the other hand it's said he is fled to *Poland*, to seek refuge there, but that we can do little give credit to, seeing the King of *Poland* had declared to the Envoy he sent thither, That he would not protect him. In the mean time we have an account that *Teckley* having sent his richest Household-Goods, his Plate, and 100 thousand Florins in Money, towards *Poland*; the Imperialists upon notice of it intercepted the same, and made themselves Masters of this great Booty,

which is valued at above a Million of Florins: We are likewise informed that the Sieur *Peirbass*, one of *Teckley's* chief Officers, who was sent with 500 Men to reinforce the Garrison of *Caschau*, had laid hold of the Emperor's Pardon, and offered to enter with all his Men into his Imperial Majesty's Service, of which we expect a Confirmation. The Winter-Quarters being finally settled, the Imperial Commissioners are gone to the Army in order to the distribution of them. The *Bavarian* Cavalry are on their march towards his Electoral Highnesses Territories where they are to Winter; But the Foot are to have their Quarters in *Hungary*. The Letters from *Croatia* tell us, That the Turks have put 150 Wagons laden with Provisions; being guarded by 2000 Men, into *Cunitza*, and that the *Ottoman* Troops on that side being disappointed in the design they had formed upon *Pirvitzka*, were separated and going into their Winter-Quarters. The Count de *Lamberg*, late Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Electors of *Saxony* and *Brandenburg*, is named by his Imperial Majesty to go to *Regisbonne* to reside as his Commissioner at the Dyet.

Regisbonne, Octob. 16. The Duke of *Lorraine*, according to our last Advices, continued encamped near *Comorra*, expecting the Emperor's final Directions about the distribution of the Winter-Quarters: The Baron de *Mercy* was with the Troops under his Command still before *Agria*, and had with his Bombs and Cartasses ruined great part of the Town, but we do not think he will be able to make himself Master of the place; considering its Situation, and how well it is fortified. *Tockay*, *Onoib*, *Potack* and *Serentz*, have Capitulated, and received Imperial Garrisons; *Caschau* has likewise sent Deputies to General *Caprara*; And it's not doubted but the other small places that yet remain in the hands of the Rebels will follow their example. Count *Teckley* is daily abandoned by his principal Officers; His richest Goods, Plate and Money, which he was sending towards *Poland*, have been taken by 500 Imperialists who were abroad and had notice thereof.

Cologne, Octob. 17. The Magistrates of this City having at the instance of the several Companies of Trades resolved to send Deputies to *Vienna* to represent to the Emperor the present state of Affairs here; the Persons were accordingly named, and they prepared themselves for their departure, but after all their Journey is like to be stop'd, it having been signified to the Magistrates by the Emperor's Command; That they need not send any Deputies to *Vienna*; and that if they do, his Imperial Majesty will not give them Audience, seeing he has Commissioners now here to whom they may represent any Matters they are desirous to have laid before his Imperial Majesty. We are informed that the Count de *Stubeck* is coming thither as the Emperor's

Emperor's Chief Commissioner for the Affairs of this City, and that other Deputies are expected from *Cobientz* and *Dufeldorp* to assist those that are already here. Three Burglers were apprehended yesterday, being accused of a design to help *Gulick*, *Sacks* and *Meebovius*, to escape out of Prison.

Hamburg, Octob. 19. The Letters from *Copenhagen* of the 13th Instant told us, That the King of *Denmark* would begin his Journey for *Holstein* the 15, and that it was believed he would pass the greatest part of the Winter at *Gottorp*; And that his Majesty had named the *Sieur Brinaw* to go in Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to Compliment the Emperor upon the Victories his Arms have obtained this Summer in *Hungary*. They write from *Berlin* that the Elector of *Brandenburg* has given out Commissions for the making several new Levies, resolving to have the next Spring an Army of 30000 Men. And that the Electoral Prince, born the fifth of this month, was Chosen the ninth, being named *Fredrick Augustus*. The *Sieur Gaultz*, the *Brandenburg* Minister, is now at *Zell*, endeavouring to accommodate the Differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City, but we do not know what success he has in his Negotiation.

Hague, Octob. 23. The States of *Holland* and *West-Friesland* are adjourned till the 15th of the next month. This week arrived here the Baron *Dodelsming*, being sent by the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to notify to this State, and the Prince of *Orange*, the birth of the young Electoral Prince. The Deputies of the States General who went to *Schenck Scans* to view the work that's now in hand for the cleansing the Lower *Rhin*, and the *Meuse*, are come back and have made their report to the States. The Letters from *Germany* do not only confirm the News of the surrender of *Tackay*, *Onab*, and other places in Upper *Hungary*, but farther tell us that the *Sieur Peterbasi*, one of *Tockley's* chief Confidants, had put himself with 600 Men into the Emperor's Service; And that the Imperialists had taken Count *Tockley's* best Goods, and a great Sum of Money, which he was sending to *Poland* to secure them.

Brussels, Octob. 23. The Council of State was yesterday assembled for several hours, his Excellency being present, which hath not been practis'd by the late Governors. Don *Fernand de Laseca* Superintendent of the Military Justice, being with the Kings leave, gone for *Madrid*, his Excellency has named the *Sieur Christy*, who was one of the Ambassadors from the Crown of *Spain* at the Treaty at *Nimeguen*, to supply that place till Don *Camargo*, to whom his Catholick Majesty has given that Employment, arrives from *Madrid*. The *Sieur Morat*, who brought his Excellency the News of the taking of *Nembaufel*, is with his Excellencies leave, returning to *Hungary* to serve there. They write from *Germany* that the Elector of *Brandenburg* has promised to assist the Emperor the next Summer with 12000 Men against the Turks. And that the Differences between the King of *Sweden* and the said Elector about their Limits in *Romania* are in a very fair way to be composed.

Marseilles, Octob. 17. The 15 French Gallies which came from the Coast of *Spain* are still at *Susa*, being detained there by the weather. The *Marschal d'Esrees* is arrived at *Toulon*, with the Fleet under his command; The *Chevalier de Tourville* is likewise returned from *Argiers*, whither he was sent to demand satisfaction for some Hostilities lately committed by one of their Ships; The Captain whereof upon the *Chevalier de Tourville's* com-

plaint was put in Irons; And several Slaves that had been taken in a French Tartane were likewise released. The *Sieur Girardin* his most Christian Majesties Ambassador to the Ottoman Port, is gone to *Toulon* to embark there for *Constantinople*, two men of War being appointed to attend him.

Paris, Octob. 20. The 17 Instant Count *Wielopolski* Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *Poland*, made his publick entry at *Fontainebleau*, having been received at *Moret*, by the *Marschal Duke de Duran*, and the *Sieur de Bonneuil* Introdutor of Ambassadors, and conducted from thence with the Kings Coaches and those of the Princes of the Blood to the House prepared for him, where he was complimented in the Name of His Majesty, by the Duke de *St. Agnan* first Gentleman of his Bedchamber, and by the *Marschal de Belfonds* on the part of the Dauphin, &c. And the next day he had his publick Audience of the King, of the Dauphin, Dauphiness, and the Duke and Dutches of *Orleans*, being conducted by the Count de *Marsan*, and the *Sieur de Bonneuil*; after which he was very splendidly entertained by the Kings Officers.

Kingston upon Thames, Octob. 13. This day was brought hither the New Charter His Majesty hath been graciously pleas'd to grant to this Corporation (which is thereby made a Mayor Town) accompanied by the Right Honorable the Earl of *Aylesbury* Lord Chamberlain of His Majesties Household, our High Steward, and the Lord *Darimaub* Master of the Horse to His Majesty, and Master General of the Ordnance, our Recorder, who were met two Miles out of Town by the Mayor and Aldermen in their Formalities, and a great number of the principal Gentry of the County of *Surrey*, and were afterwards all entertained by the Town at a splendid Dinner, with great Demonstrations and Expressions of their Loyalty to His Majesty.

Whitehal, Octob. 16. This day the Right Honorable Sir *Edward Herbert*, Lord Chief Justice of the Kings Bench, was sworn of His Majesties most Honorable Privy Council, and accordingly took his place at the Board.
