Venice, Octob. 12. N Tuesday last arrived here a Felucca with Letters from Captain-General Mordfini, giving an account, That the Captain Balla having landed out of the Turkish Fleet feveral thoughout men at Napoli di Romania, and joined with a great Body of Horse which the Turks had drawn together on that lide, he marched towards Calamata, to keep the Maynotes from revolting to the Veneflans; That Captain-General Morofini, who was newly teinforced with the Troops of Saxony, con-fifting in 3000 men, upon advice of it, refolved to march towards the Enemy, and to fight them, which he accordingly put in execution, having fi It made himfelf Master of the Fortress of Zarnata. The Captain-Batla confiding in the number of his Troops, and effecially in the humber of his decline a Battle; And the two Armies br-ing come near each other, and having post-ed themiclues with the best advantage they could, they engaged with great courage on both files; the Fight lafted feveral hours, and in conclufion the Turks were entirely defeated and fird ; the place of Battle was covered with the Slain of the Enemy, and many were killed by the Mayhotes in the purfuit. Aften this defeat of the Turks the Garifon of Calamata abandoned that place, into which Capitain General Morofine put a Garifon, and the Magnotes belieged Porto Vitulo; of all which we shall be able in our next to give you a more particuiar relation.

Vienna, Odob. 11. The laft Letters from Upper Hungary confirm that Tockay, Onoth, Porack and Setentz have furrendied upon Articles, and that Imperial Garifons have been put into thole places: That Calebaw had likewife fent Deputies to General Cafrara to Capitulate, and to accept the General Amneflie published by the Emperor; They at first made difficulty to receive a German Garison, pretending it was contrary to their antient Priviledges, but finding they contefled this point in vain, they at last submitted to it. We do not hear with any certainty whither Heckeley is retired 21 There is a seport that he is gone to great Warglim, but we can hardly believe he would put himlelf into the Hands of the Turks; who are is much interfed aginft him, looking upon him as the caufe of their prefent Misfortunes a On the other hand it's faid he is fled to Poland, to feek refuge there, but that we can as little give credit to, feeing the King of Poland had declared to the Envoy he fant thither, That he would not Protect him. In the mean time we have an account that Teckeley having font his richeft Houshold-Goods, his Plate, and roo thoufand Florins in Money towards Poland; the Impe-rialifis upon notice of it intercepted the fame, and made themfelves Mafters of this great Booty,

which is valued at above a Million of Florins : We are likewife informed that the Sicur Peterbaft, one of Teckeley's chief Officers, who was fent with 500 Men to reinforce the Garifon of Calebam, had laid hold of the Emperor's Pardon, and offered to enter with all his Men into his Imperial Majeflies Service, of which we expect a Cohfirmation. The Winter-Quarters being finally feeled, the Imperial Commilfioners are gone to the Army in order to the diffribution of them. The Bavarian Cavalry are on their march towards his Electoral Highneffes Territories where they are to Winter ; But the Foot are to have their Quarters in Fungary. The Lecters from Croatia tell os, That the Tuiks have put 150 Wagons laden with Provifidns; being guarded by 2000 Mea, into Caniza, and that the Oitoman Troops on that fide being difapp vinted fin the defign they had formed upon Firovitza, were feparated and going into their Winter-Quarters. The Sicur Counitz, the Branden-burg Minifter, is now at Zell, endeavouring to ac. commodate the Differences besween the Duke of Zell and this City, but we do not know what fucces he has in his Negotiation.

Hague, Odob, 23, The States of Holland and Well-Friefland are adjourned sill the 15th of the next month. This work arrived here the Baron Bodelsming, being lent by the Elector of Brandenburg, to notify to this State, and the Prince of Orange, the birth of the young Electoral Prince.
