Venice, Octob. 12.

ON Tuesday last arrived here a Felucca with Letters from Captain-General *Morofini*, giving an account, That the Captain-Bassa having land- ed out of the Turkish Fleet several thousand men at *Napoli di Romania*, and joined with a great Body of Horse which the Turks had drawn together on that side, he marched towards *Calamata*, to keep the *Maynotes* from revolting to the Venetians; That Captain-General *Morofini*, who was newly reinforced with the Troops of *Saxony*, consisting in 3000 men, upon advice of it, resolved to march towards the Enemy, and to fight them, which he accordingly put in execution, having first made himself Master of the Fortress of *Zarnata*. The Captain-Bassa considering in the number of his Troops, and especially in his Cavalry, did not decline a Battle; And the two Armies being come near each other, and having posted themselves with the best advantage they could, they engaged with great courage on both sides; the Fight lasted several hours, and in conclusion the Turks were entirely defeated and fled; the place of Battle was covered with the Slain of the Enemy, and many were killed by the *Maynotes* in the pursuit. After this defeat of the Turks the Garrison of *Calamata* abandoned that place, into which Captain General *Morofini* put a Garrison, and the *Maynotes* besieged *Porto Vitulo*; of all which we shall be able in our next to give you a more particular relation.

Vienna, Octob. 11. The last Letters from Upper *Hungary* confirm that *Tockay*, *Onoib*, *Potack* and *Serentz* have surrendered upon Articles, and that Imperial Garrisons have been put into those places: That *Caschau* had likewise sent Deputies to General *Caprara* to Capitulate, and to accept the General *Amnestie* published by the Emperor; They at first made difficulty to receive a German Garrison, pretending it was contrary to their ancient Priviledges, but finding they contested this point in vain, they at last submitted to it. We do not hear with any certainty whether *Teckley* is retired. There is a report that he is gone to great *Warsawin*, but we can hardly believe he would put himself into the Hands of the Turks; who are so much intended against him, looking upon him as the cause of their present Misfortunes: On the other hand it's said he is fled to *Poland*, to seek refuge there, but that we can do little give credit to, seeing the King of *Poland* had declared to the Envoy he sent thither, That he would not protect him. In the mean time we have an account that *Teckley* having sent his richest Household-Goods, his Plate, and 100 thousand Florins in Money, towards *Poland*; the Imperialists upon notice of it intercepted the same, and made themselves Masters of this great Booty,

which is valued at above a Million of Florins: We are likewise informed that the Sieur *Peirbass*, one of *Teckley's* chief Officers, who was sent with 500 Men to reinforce the Garrison of *Caschau*, had laid hold of the Emperor's Pardon, and offered to enter with all his Men into his Imperial Majesty's Service, of which we expect a Confirmation. The Winter-Quarters being finally settled, the Imperial Commissioners are gone to the Army in order to the distribution of them. The *Bavarian* Cavalry are on their march towards his Electoral Highnesses Territories where they are to Winter; But the Foot are to have their Quarters in *Hungary*. The Letters from *Croatia* tell us, That the Turks have put 150 Wagons laden with Provisions; being guarded by 2000 Men, into *Cunitza*, and that the *Ottoman* Troops on that side being disappointed in the design they had formed upon *Pirvitzka*, were separated and going into their Winter-Quarters. The Count *de Lamberg*, late Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Electors of *Saxony* and *Brandenburg*, is named by his Imperial Majesty to go to *Ratibonne* to reside as his Commissioner at the Dyet.

Ratibonne, Octob. 16. The Duke of *Lorraine*, according to our last Advices, continued encamped near *Comorra*, expecting the Emperor's final Directions about the distribution of the Winter-Quarters: The Baron *de Mercy* was with the Troops under his Command still before *Agria*, and had with his Bombs and Cartasses ruined great part of the Town, but we do not think he will be able to make himself Master of the place; considering its Situation, and how well it is fortified. *Tockay*, *Onoib*, *Potack* and *Serentz*, have Capitulated, and received Imperial Garrisons; *Caschau* has likewise sent Deputies to General *Caprara*; And it's not doubted but the other small places that yet remain in the hands of the Rebels will follow their example. Count *Teckley* is daily abandoned by his principal Officers; His richest Goods, Plate and Money, which he was sending towards *Poland*, have been taken by 500 Imperialists who were abroad and had notice thereof.

Cologne, Octob. 19. The Magistrates of this City having at the instance of the several Companies of Trades resolved to send Deputies to *Vienna* to represent to the Emperor the present state of Affairs here; the Persons were accordingly named, and they prepared themselves for their departure, but after all their Journey is like to be stop'd, it having been signified to the Magistrates by the Emperor's Command; That they need not send any Deputies to *Vienna*; and that if they do, his Imperial Majesty will not give them Audience, seeing he has Commissioners now here to whom they may represent any Matters they are desirous to have laid before his Imperial Majesty. We are informed that the Count *de Stubeck*, as coming either as the Emperor's
