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Venice . Octob. 12. N Tuesday last arrived here a Felucca with Letters from Captain-General Mordfini, giving an account, That the Captain Bassa having landed out of the Turkish Fleet several thoughid men at Napoli di Romania, and joined with a great Body of Horse which the Turks had drawn together on that lide, he marched towards Calamata, to keep the Maynotes from revolting to the Venefians; That Captain-General Morofini, who was newly feinforced with the Troops of Saxony, confifting in 3000 men, upon advice of it, refelved to march towards the Enemy, and to fight them, which he accordingly put in execution, having fi it made himself Master of the Fortress of Zarnata. Captain-Baffa confiding in the number of his Troops, and especially in his Cavalry, did not decline a Battle; And the two Armies being come near each other, and having posted themiclys with the best advantage they could, they engaged with great courage on both fides; the Fight lasted several hours, and in conclufion the Turks were entirely defeated and fird; the place of Battle was covered with the Slain of the Enemy, and many were killed by the Mayhotes in the pursuit. Aftenthis descat of the Turks the Garison of Calamata abandoned that place, into which Captain General Morofine put a Garison, and the Maynotes besieged Porto Vitulo; of all which we shall be able in our next to give you a more particuiar relation.

Vienna, Odob. 11. The last Letters from Upper Hungary confirm that Tockay, Quotb, Potack and Setentz have furrendred upon Articles, and that Imperial Garisons have been put into those places: That Calcham had likewise sent Deputies to General Cafrara to Capitulate, and to accept the General Amnestic published by the Emperor; They at first made difficulty to receive a German Garison, pretending it was contrary to their antient Privis ledges, but finding they concelled this point in vain, they at left submitted to it. We do not hear with any certainty whicher Heckeley is retired as There is a report that he is gone to great Wardin, but we can hardly believe he would put himself into the Hands of the Turks; who are is much intenfed aginst him, looking upon him as the cause of their present Missortunes a On the othershand it's said he is fled to Poland, to feek refuge there, but that we can as little give credit to, feeing the King of Poland had declared to the Envoy he fent thither. That he would not Protect him. In the mean time we have an account that Teckeley having fent his richest Houshold-Goods, his Place, and roo thoufand Florins in Money towards Poland; the imperialiss upon notice of it intercepted the same, and made themselves Masters of this great Booty,

which is valued at above a Million of Florins: We are likewise informed that the Sieur Peterbass, one of Teckeley's chief Officers, who was sent with soo Men to reinforce the Garison of Casehaw, had laid hold of the Emperor's Pardon, and offered to enter with all his Men into his Imperial Majessies Service, of which we expect a Confirmation. The Winter-Quarters being sinally seeled, the Imperial Commissioners are gone to the Army in order to the distribution of them. The Bavarian Cavalry are on their march towards his Electoral Highnesses Territories where they are to Winter; But the Foot are to have their Quarters in Aungary. The Lecters from Croatia tell us, That the Tuiks have put 150 Wagons laden with Provisions, being guarded by 2000 Men, into Canitza, and that the Ostoman Troops on that side being disappyinted she she define they had formed upon Pirovitza, were separated and going into their Winter-Quarters. The Count de Lamberg, late Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Electors of Saxony and Brandenburg, is named by his Imperial Majesty the got to Ratubonne to reside as his Commissioner at the Dyec.

Raribonne, Offibb. 16: The Duke of Lorrain, according to our last Advices, continued encamped near Comorra, expecting the Emperor's sinal Directions about the distribution of the Winter-Quarters: The Baron' de Mercy was with the Troops under his Command still before Agria, and had with his Bombs and Cartaffes rained great part of the Pown, but we do not think he will be alief to make himself Master of the place, considering its Situation, and how well it is fortified. Tookas, Onoth, Posack and Serents, have Capithated, and received Imperial Garisons; Casebam has likewise sent Deputies to General Capitans; And it's not doubted but the other finally places that yet remain in the hands of the Rebels will follow their example. Count Teckeles is daily abandoned by his principal Officers; His richest Goods, Plate and Money, which he was sending towards Poland, flave been taken by soo Imperialists who were abroad and had notice thereof.
