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Genova, Octob. 9.

This week arrived here the *Good-will*, the *Loyal Subject*, the *Batchelor*, the *Scanderberg*, and the *Lucy Ketch*; As likewise the Dutch Convoy, with one great *Genouefe*, all from *Cadiz*, from whence they have brought two Millions in Money, and one in Merchandize. The sixth Instant at Midnight happened here a very great Rain, which lasted about two hours with that violence, that it filled the Cellars and under Rooms in this City with Water, and overflowed the *Custom-House* and *Porto Franco* at least a Foot and an half; Many People were drowned, and towards the Water side not only the Houses, but the Walls of the Town were in much danger, the Water being there above seven Foot high. The Damage is Calculated at above 300000 Dollars, besides that sustained in the Country, which is very considerable.

Warsaw, September 30. We have an account of three Rencontres which the Forces of this Crown have had with the Enemy, since the beginning of this month; The first was with 1200 *Tartars*, whom Colonel *Polley* with 600 Horse surprized near *Lockovitz*; many of them were killed, and the rest, except about 100, made Prisoners. The second happened near *Polositz* where 2000 *Tartars*, returning from an Incurtion they had made into the Territories of this Crown, were defeated by 800 Polish Horse, who were sent with a sum of money to be distributed among the Cossacks Commanded by General *Mobila*, above 500 of the Enemy were slain upon the place, 200 taken Prisoners, and the rest put to flight. The third was between the Enemy and Colonel *Aposfel*, he was detached with 2000 Cossacks towards *Moldavia*, and passing the River *Pruth* advanced towards *Fassi* the Capital City of that Province, and ravaged all the Country thereabouts, upon which the *Hospodar* drew what Troops he could together under the Command of *Serdan* his Lieutenant General, who being reinforced with a body of Turks, Commanded by a *Bassa*, fell upon the Cossacks, but were so well received by them, that above 800 of the Enemy were slain, and several Prisoners taken. Our Army according to the last Letters we had from *Lembourg* was marching towards the *Seraskier Solyman*, who had with him about 30000 Men, so that we expect to hear of a Battle between them. The King of *Poland* has resolved to send a great Embassie to the *Czars* of *Moskovy* to compose the differences about the Limits. The Polish Court was the 18th of this month at *Kjais*, where their Majesties intended to stay two or three days, and then to continue their Journey towards *Russia*.

Venice, Octob. 12. On Wednesday last *Te Deum* was sung in the Church of *Sr. Mark*, at which the Doge and the whole Senate assisted, as likewise in all the other Churches of this City, for the Victory lately obtained by the Forces of this Republick against the Turks, Commanded by the Captain *Bassa*, and the taking *Zarnata* and *Calamata* in the *Morea*;

Of which we have received the following Relation. Captain General *Morosini* resolving to encourage the People of the Province of *Maina* in the disposition they appeared to be in to cast off the *Ottoman* Yoaik, had no sooner put *Coron* into a posture of defence, but he sent the *Maynotes* who came upon the taking of that place into the Service of the Republick with some other Troops to attack *Zarnata*, one, and the strongest, of the 3 Fortresses built by the Turks since the War of *Candia*, to keep those people in awe, and some days after, having caused the Army to reembark, the whole Fleet sailed from *Coron*, and arrived the next day at *Chitie*, which is about five miles from *Zarnata*, and was there joyned by the Ships that had on board the Troops of *Saxony* consisting in 3000 Men; From thence the Fleet sailed towards *Calamata*, near which place the Forces Landed again. In the mean time the Captain *Bassa* having put ashore what Men he could out of the Turkish Gallies which he left at *Napoli de Romania*, securing the Port with great Chains, and having joyned with a great Body of Horse and Foot, marched towards *Calamata* to keep the *Maynotes* from revolting to the Venetians; which Captain General *Morosini* having advice of, he sent an Officer to the Garrison of *Zarnata*, to let them know that if they did not immediately Surrender the place, they must expect to be treated in the same manner they of *Coron* had been; The Garrison desired they might send to the Captain *Bassa*, to acquaint him with the condition they were in, which was permitted, but the Officer not returning at the time they expected, they Surrendered the place on the 11th of September, 600 Men marching out with their Arms and Baggage; but the *Agā* that Commanded them, fearing he should be ill treated by the Captain *Bassa*, stayed in our Camp. In the place were found 55 pieces of Cannon with a considerable quantity of Ammunition and Provisions. The Captain *Bassa* being now advanced with 10000 Men, within five miles of *Zarnata*, Captain General *Morosini* resolved to fight him, and accordingly marched towards the Enemy; feigning at the same time a design of making a descent to give them a diversion in some other place, for which purpose he caused some Troops to embark, and Commanded the Fleet to keep along the Coast. Our Forces being come near the Enemy on the 14th past, were drawn up in Battallia by General *Dogenfeldt* on an advantageous ground; And on the other side the Turks were in a posture to receive them; Their Horse fell upon our Left Wing, and at the same time a great Body of their Foot advanced towards our Right at the head of which was the Prince of *Brunswick*, but found so brave a resistance, that they were forced to retire; They presently after returned and charged a second time with greater fury than before; and the Fight was maintained with great Courage and Resolution on both sides, till the Enemy not being longer able to keep their ground, fell into disorder, and soon after dispersed and fled. The number of their slain was very

very great, but the loss on our side was not very considerable. The Garrison of *Calamata* hearing of the Defeat of the Captain Bassa, set fire to the Magazine and abandoned the place; which was immediately possessed by our Forces, who found there 15 pieces of Cannon. The Maynotes in their pursuit of the Enemy took a great many Prisoners, which were put on board our Gallies; and have since besieged *Porto Fiuolo*; And we hope our next Letters will not only give an account that they have taken that place, but that our Forces have likewise reduced *Chiesala* and *Passavia*, the only places of any strength the Turks are Masters of in that great Province.

Brussels, October 25. Our Governour General has caused a Placat to be published, forbidding all Officers as well as Soldiers to depart from the places where they are in Garrison without leave from his Excellency or the Governour of the Place. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 14 instant confirm the news, we had of the taking of Count *Teckley's* Plate and Money, and of *Peterbasi's* having abandoned him, and put himself into the Emperors service; and add, That the Seraskier had again written to the Duke of *Lorraine* to desire a Passport for an Aga which he would send to *Vienna* with Proposals of Peace. That the *Lunenburg Troops* were marching home, not liking the Winter Quarters which the Emperor would have assigned them. That the Elector of *Saxony* had offer'd to assist the Emperor with five Regiments of Horse and as many of Foot, and to leave the entire disposition of them to his Imperial Majesty. And that the said Elector and the Duke of *Hanover* are going to raise 10000 men to assist the *Venetians* the next Campaigne. The advices from *Hungary* say, that the Seraskier Bassa hath sufficiently provided for this Winter the Garrisons of *Canisa*, *Sigeth*, *Fiva*, *Cherches* and other places on that side; and that the Duke of *Lorraine* was sending several Regiments towards *Spiria*, *Carniola* and *Carinibia*, where they are to Winter for the security of those Countries. That *Caschan* and several other places are surrendered to the Imperialis, and that it was not known whether *Teckley* was retired, but the General opinion was that he was gone to *Mongitz* a place of great strength. The Letters from *Venice* give an account that the Forces of the Republick had taken *Zarnata* and *Calamata* in the *Morea*, having defeated the Captain Bassa who was marching with 10000 Men to relieve those places.

Hague, Octob. 26. This week arrived here the Herr *Stillen*, being sent by the Elector of *Brandenburg* to receive 150000 Florins in pursuance of the late Treaty concluded between this State and his Electoral Highness, being the first payment of the Arrears of Subsidy that remain due to his Electoral Highness. He has had Audience of the States, and will we are told be very quickly dispatched with entire satisfaction. The States General have named Commissioners to enter into Conference with the Herr *Van Dieß*, Envoy Extraordinary from the said Elector about making a regulation to be observed between the *West-India* Company of these Countries and his Electoral Highnesses Subjects in *Africa*. We have Letters from *Gluckstadt* which tell us that the King of *Denmark* was expected there the 23d. of this month, and that his Majesty intend'd to go from thence in few days for *Gottorp*. The Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel* having been to see several places in *Brabant* is gone from thence to *Maastricht*.

Paris, Octob. 27. The 19th instant the Baron *del Val*, Envoy Extraordinary from *Spain*, had Audience of the King at *Fontainebleau*; And the next day the Ambassador from *Poland* had a private Audience of his Most Christian Majesty. The Marquis *de Marini* Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of *Genova*, and the Baron *de Nesselroth*; and

the Baron *de Neubaus*, who are here with the same Character, the first from the Elector Palatin, and the other from the Elector of *Bavaria*, have had their Audiences of Leave. The Prince of *Conti*, who we told you had the Small-Pox, is so well that she is lookt upon to be out of all danger; But Monsieur *de Tellier* the Chameler lies very ill, and its believed he will not recover.

London, Octob. 19. This day *Henry Cornish* Esq; was brought to his Tryal at the *Old Bayly*, being Indicted of High Treason for Conspiring with other false Traytors to Raise a Rebellion within this Kingdom, and the late King of Ever Blessed Memory to death and final destruction to bring, and the Ancient Government of this Kingdom to Alter and Subvert, of which he was upon a full Evidence found Guilty, and received Sentence of death as in Cases of High Treason.

There were likewise Tryed *William Ring* for harbouring and concealing *Joseph Kelloway* and *Henry Lawrence*, who were in the late Rebellion in the *West*. *John Fernelley* for harbouring and concealing *James Burton* a person Outlawed for High-Treason, and *Elizabeth Gaunt* for succoring and assisting the said *Burton* with many and helping him to a passage in order to his escape beyond the Seas, and were all three found Guilty of High Treason, and had Sentence of death passed upon them accordingly.
