Falmouth, November 6.

He 4th Instant the Phanix of London put to lea, laden with Pilchards, bound for Legorne. By a Seaman lately arrived here we are advited that the St. John and Elizabeth, a Ship of 140 tuns, Captain Robinson Commander, was foundred in her way from Galloway in Ircland, ten of her men drowned, but the rest preserved by a Vessel that came in to their affistance. This day the Thomas and Katherine of London put to sea laden with Pilchards, bound for Zante.

P mouth, Nov. 8. Yesterday arrived here the Little-Guift from Ireland, and the John and Mary of London from the Canaries ; Several other Veffels are also come in f om Wales laden with Coals : by a Ship not long fince put in from Bofton in New-England, we are informed of the quiet and thriving condition of that place, and their ready zeal for his Majesties service, which they lately testified by the voluntary and feafonable fupplies fent to Sir John Harman of all forts of provisions and necessaries for the Squadron under

West-Cows, Nov. 9. On Wednesday night arrived here a small Offend Privateer from Cruising, having received much damage in a late form, and is now repairing, intending this night again to fail from hence. The Hunter of Wifmar having been repaired, intends with the first fair wind for

This day came in the St. John Baptist of Hambourgh from Sanst a Gruz but was in her way some months fince seiled by some French men of War, and sent into Breffe, from whence the was lately cleer'd; but in her passage for oftend, fuffered much damage, and iprang many leaks, and is here

Briftol, Nov. 9. This day 8 of our Ships, which some few days fince went out from this Port, were by a contrary winds driven home again, the greatest damage they have received being their disappointment for the present, but may in few days put to lea again.

Portfmonth, Nov. 10. Yesterday the Fairfax was paid off, and the men dismified with satisfaction. The Eagle and Milford are come in here to be refitted, with which the Revenge, which will suddenly be launched out of the dry Dock, and in few dayes be sent out to sea for a Winter-guard. On Fiddy last put in a Ship of 100 tuns from Gottenburg with

Pitch and Tax configured for this place.

Venuce, OH. 28. Letters arriving here by the way of Rome, bearing date the 20 past from Candia, tell us that the Turks having with much labour and blood endeavoured to lodge the nielves upon the breaches made in the Panigra and Mocenigo, but finding their attempts alwayes rendred fruiltels and unfuccesful by the great valour of the befieged, have fince employed their time in filling up the trenches, to hinder all communication between the two Bulwarks of Panigra and Mocenigo, whither with much danger and the lofs of many men, they brought a great quantity of earth, and had some hopes of making a way to pa's to the lett Angle of the Fort of Panigra, where they had made the most considerable breach. Bu to prevent this their defigne, the besieged employed a company of their choycest men with a number of Slaves taken out of the Gallies in the Hatbor, who appeared with so much courage upon the breach, that the Enemy was in little time forced to retire, and in the mean time employing many hands at the breach, they cast up so strong a defence

in that part, that the Enemy will find but little encouragement to attempt it any more, clearing all to the Trench, and throughing out all the earth which was cast in by the Enemy ; placing likewise a Machine over against the breach, invented by the Captain General Merofini, which being Musquetproof, would contain ao Souldiers, who might fecurely from thence manage their arms for the defence of the breach. Great numbers of Mines a e daily fprung, of which one of ours did very considerable execution, wherein by the firing of 12 barrels of powder great numbers of Turks were de-Proyed, and many of their bodies thrown into the Trench.

Our men want not courage to make an excellent defence, and have lately made feveral Sallies, and in all of them returned with fuccels.

By the way of Legorne we are affured of the lafe arrival of our Convoy of 12 Ships with 2000 men, and great store of provisions of all forts at Candia, which has so much encouraged the Garrison, that they were resolved the next day to make a lusty Sally upon the Turks, with 3000 men divided into three bodies, and to fall upon 3 several ofts of the Enemy, of which we expect the success : that the Turks are much discouraged by the tediousness of the Siege, the great loss of men received before it, and the little progress they have yet made, and that by advice given them from the Turkish Camp, they were told the Visier dispairing of success, had

fome thoughts of retiring, and giving over the Siege.

From Dalmaria we are informed of the fafe arrival there of his Excellency General Printi, who with extraordinary care and diligence is visiting the several Forts and Garrisons under his charge, and disposing all things to the best advantage for the peace and security of those parts.

On Monday next will be launched one of the two Great Men of War built upon the publick account in the Arlenal, the other will also be ready in few dayes, with a new Galle-

affe, which is also upon the stocks upon the same account.

Vienna, Off. 30. The Council of War has lately fent their Orders to the Maser of the Arfenal, to have in readiness feveral thousands of Musquets and Bandeliers to be sent to Brifgom, whither 'tis believed several Regiments will be commanded, but to march in small parties, that they may be the more conveniently entertained by the way; The Spanish Ambassador has also liberty for the raising of 6 Regiments of Horse and Foot in this City, which are to be sent into Milan for the defence of that Government. We have here much discourse of the intended Treaty between the two Crowns, to compose the differences about the Netherlands, of which we much doubt the effect : in the mean time the Martial preparations are much advanced, and his Imperial Majesty has by a late Courier affured the Governor of those Countries, that in case the Treaty prove ineffectual, he will not fail to succour them the next Spring with a very confiderable Army, to which end orders are given to all his Colonels to appear the next month at the Court, when some Refolution will be taken for their Employments.

A Courier arrived from Transituania informs us that the Prince Abaffi having used all his arts to satisfie the Ottoman Court for the Tribute required of him, has fo effectually wrought, that he has obtained the confirmation of all his titles and pretentions; and Orders are given to Count Solemnito acquiesce, and forbear any farther addresses as to his Claims upon the Prince Ragorsky, and to admit what grievances he has to the confideration of the Assembly or Diet, which is to be suddenly held in Transitvania.

Several of the Nobility of Hungary are here arrived to

confult with his Imperial Majesty about the Diet which is in little time to be called, and to consider of a place for its Affembly, whether at Presburg or Otterburg, fo foon as the Emperor shall have first upon that place. Letters are to be dispatcht to the States throughout that Kingdom to summon them

The Sieur Van Prifing, Envoy from the Elector of Bavaria, has had his Audience, but tis believed by his frequent convertings with the Grandees of that Court, and his long conferences with the Prince de Lobkewitz, that he is nego-

Paris, Nov. 10. Our Letters from Rockelle inform us, that the Squareron of 12 Men of War which some few dayes fince put to fea under the Command of the Sieur d' Almeras, intended for the Streights, have been severely handled at see by a violent storm, which dispersed them: three of them are returned back to Kochelle, the rel not yet heard of, and tis feared may have futtered much damage, if they are not wholly loft.

His Majesty is resolved to set apart a Stock for the reparation and fitting out his Gallies, intending to conferre the Charge and Command of General of them upon the Mar-

quis de Crequy.

His Majeity has granted a Neutralitie to the Franche Comte, referving to himself an yearly Rent of an hundred thousand Crowns, which are to be paid to the Swiffe Cantons for the Pention due to them from the Crown of

The same day the Parliament of Paris began to fit, where after several Speeches, the Atlembly defined that 15 dayes time may be given them before any Causes are heard, that all things may be duty prepared for putting the new Code into execution, in which the Judges meet with many diffi-

On Sunday last Cardinal Anthonio took his Oath of Fidelity to his Majesty in the Chappel of the Thuilleries, for his Archbishoprick of heims; 'tis believed he has Orders from the Pope to use his endeavours with his Majesty for encoura-

ging a Peace with spain.

Hague, Nov. 18. The Affembly of the States is put off till the 22 infant, by which time the Ratifications of the Treaty with sweden may be in readiness to be mutually exchanged, and some account be received from our Ministers abroad, that they may the better take their measures, and come to a resolution touching the Affairs of the Neather-

Several Conferences have been held with t'e Portugat Ambassador about the summes of Money required by the States from that Crown, of which an abatement is required by reason of the great expences that Kingdom has been at in maintaining the War with spain; but the determination of that affair will be put off for some time, that Ambas ador expecting fresh Orders from the King his Master, with his farther resolution upon the demands of the States.

The Baron de Bergeick intends in few dayes to return again to Bruffels, having not effected any thing in his Nego-

tiation here.

We are advised by the Directours of the East-India Company, that the Armes of Amfterdam, which straggled from the reft of their Fleet about the Ifle of Fere, was afterwards cast away upon the Coasts of Island, of 200 men which were aboard her, onely 5 2 hardly est aping in her Shallop, having been fix dayes at Sea with little or no provisions. The loss of this Ship is judged to amount to 15 Tun of Gold.

The Garrifon of Lille is by reason of the great contagion which rages there, reduced to 1800 men: His most christian Majetty has employed thither an Augustin Friar. who by his former success in applying remedies for the Plague at Dunkirk, 'tis hoped may be an inftrument of much good alle in that City.

London, Nov. 12. I onden, Nov. 13. On Monday last was held a Council of War aboard one of His Majesties Yachts, by which three Capains of Fireships, viz. Gibbons, Payn, and Mayhu, were for their Cowardize during the late attempt of the Dutch upon the River, condemned to be sent aboard the Vistory-Prize near Deprford the 18th Instant, where they are to have Halters put about their necks, and wooden Swo ds broken over their heads, and then to be towed through the water at a Poats Stern, from the ship to Deptford Dock, a Drum beating all the time in the Boat, and to be for the future rendred uncapable of any Command, Gibbons being farther sentenced to be triced up by the arms during the punishment of the other two.

The fame day the Mafter, Gunner, Boatfwain and Carpenter of Gibbons's thip were also sentenced for the same crime, to fland with ropes about their necks during the time of the punishment of the rest, and afterwards to receive 30 blows apiece upon their naked backs, and to be rendred uncapable o
