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Vienna, Octob. 14.

THE last Letters from the Imperial Camp near *Comorra* told us, that the Duke of *Lorraine* had received the Emperors Orders about the distribution of the Winter-quarters, that in pursuance of them the Army was going to separate, and that we might expect his Highness here in few days; That the Fortifications of *Newbetsel* as well as those of *Gran* were almost repaired; And that the Imperialists have taken several Castles which the Enemy were possessed of in the Neighborhood of those places. We have from Upper *Hungary* not only the Confirmation of the surrender of *Tockey*, *Onorb*, *Pozack* and *Serentz*, but likewise an account that the Towns of *Sonna*; *Pallotz*, *Dorqnitz*, *Woldokin* and *Sparditz*, have submitted and laid hold of the General *Amnestie*, and that the Officers and Soldiers of these Garisons are most of them entered into the Emperors service. *Teckelcy* isit's said retired to the strong Castle of *Mongatz*; his Money and Plate was taken by a Party of the Garison of *Zarmar*; *Peterhass* has we are told actually put himself into the Emperors Service. The Count *de Breuner* is appointed by the Emperor to conduct the *Lunenburgh* Troops who are returning home through his Imperial Majesties Territories, and to furnish them with all things necessary in their march. The Elector of *Saxony* has offered to assist the Emperor with five Regiments of Horse and as many of Foot; And besides he and the Duke of *Hanouer* will raise 10000 Men for the Republick of *Venice*. The Count *d' Abele* dyed here suddenly two days ago of an Apoplexy. The Letters from the Court of *Poland* of the fourth instant say that the Princes of *Moldavia* and *Valachia* had sent to the Crown General to let him know, that if the Christian Forces advanced that way they would joyn with them against the Turks. The Serafquier *Ibrahim* has again sent to the Duke of *Lorraine* to desire a Passport for an Envoy he would send hither with Proposals of Peace.

Cologne, Octob. 23. The Baron *de Mayerheim* the Imperial Minister is arrived at *Bonne*; He has had Audience of the Elector of *Cologne*, and it's believed he will obtain what he was sent to desire of his Electoral Highness, to wit, that his Troops, now in the Emperors Service, may Winter in the Hereditary Countries, that so they may be the readier for the next Campagne, which will be begun very early. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners continue to examine the Promoters of our late disturbances, and have ordered Process to be made against some of the chief of them, according to the Orders they have received from *Vienna*. The Letters from *Strasbowg* of the 19th instant tell us that Monsieur *de Belfonds* had passed through that City in his Journey to *Munick*, being sent by the Dauphiness to Compliment the Elector of *Bavaria* her Brother

upon his Marriage. And that all the French Troops on that side were gone into their Winter-quarters.

Hamburg, Octob. 23. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, that the Troops of *Lithuania* have been engaged with a Body of Tartars, and that after a very warm dispute, the latter were routed with considerable loss. They write from *Riga* that the Moscovites seeing the great successes the Christians have had against the Turks, began to shew some disposition to enter into the League against them, and that the Czars had named Commissioners to meet with those of *Poland*, at some convenient place on the Frontiers, for adjusting the differences which have so long depended about the Limits. The last Letters from *Gluckstadt* told us, that the King of *Denmark* was expected there as this day. We have an account from *Stockholme*, that the Queen of *Sueden* was Brought-to-bed the 7th instant of a young Prince, who was Christned *Frederick*.

Hague, Octob. 30. The Commissioners appointed by the States General have been in conference with the Sieur *Dieck*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, upon the Memorial he lately presented to the States about his Electoral Highnesses Subjects Trading in *Africa*. Monsieur *Bening* is to go to *Scenck Scans* on the part of the Province of *Holland*, to confer with the Deputies of the other Provinces about cleansing the lower *Rhin* and the *Iffel*. The Heer *Stißen* will be dispatched in few days, the States having ordered the payment of the monies he was sent by the Elector of *Brandenburgh* to receive, in pursuance of the late Treaty concluded between his Electoral Highness and this State. They write from *Muesstricht*, that the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel* arrived there the 23d of this month, and parted again the 25th for *Germany*. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 18th instant tell us, that notwithstanding the several reports of the surrender of *Caschaw*, the freshest advices they had from Upper *Hungary* made no mention thereof, but said on the contrary that General *Caprara* had caused the place to be invested, and that he had on the second instant sent a Trumpeter into the Town, to know of them whether they would stand out a Siege, and that the Magistrates had sent him back without any answer. But these Letters confirm the taking of *Tockey* and several other places and Castles, by detachments sent out by General *Caprara* for that purpose. They write from *Croatia* that 5000 Turks continued encamped near *Orovitz*, and that another Body was drawing together on the side of *Canizza*, with a design as it was believed to make a great incursion into the Imperial Territories; And that therefore Orders had been sent to the Croats to be upon their Guard, and the Ban or Viceroy of *Croatia* was marching with several Troops to reinforce the Imperial Camp near *Turanowitz*.

Edinburgh, October 15. Yesterday being his Majesty's Birth-day, was observed here with great Solemnity; at five in the morning all the Cannon of the Castle were discharged; After eight there were Sermons in all the Churches: suitable to the occasion: At eleven 50 old Men in new blew Gownes, (to each of which was given a shilling for every Year of the Kings Age) came from the Abbey to the Cross of this City praying for their Majesties; About three in the afternoon 26 Companies of the City Trainbands, with his Majesties Troop of Guards, and the City Company Commanded by Captain *Graham*, were drawn up about the Cross, which was adorned with an Arbour of Ever Greens in fashion of a Crown, laden with Oranges and several other Fruits and Flowers, eight several Conduits from the Cross as well as the other Conduits in the Town running Claret; At which time the Lord Provost, the Bailiff, and other Magistrates in their Scarlet Robes, the Counsellors in their Gowns, the Nobility of His Majesties Privy Council, and the Senators of the Colledge of Justice, ushered by Trumpets and Waits, Sword and Mace, came in Procession from the Council House to the Cross, where was Erected a Theatre hung with Tapistry, upon which was placed a large Table covered with a very noble Banquet; And having on their knees drank the health of their Majesties and all the Royal Family, caused the Sweet-meats to be distributed among the People, who expressed their joy with loud and repeated Acclamations, which were answered with several discharges of the Cannon of the Castle, and Volleys of the Trainbands. From thence the Lord Provost and the Nobility with the rest of the Company went to the great Bonfire in the outward Court of his Majesties Palace, where they were again entertained with a Banquet and the Royal Healths repeated; The night concluding with Bonfires (which were so many that the Streets were hardly passable) Ringing of Bells, and other demonstrations of joy amongst all Ranks of people.

New-Castle upon Tyne, Octob. 16. On the 14th instant His Majesties Birth-day, Sir *Henry Brabant* our present Mayor, having summon'd all the Trainbands to be in Arms; He with his Brethren the Aldermen, accompanied by a great number of the Gentry, both of the Town and Country, and preceded by the Town Musick, went in their Formalities that Morning to Church, whence (after having heard Divine Service) they returned in like order to the Mayors House; where there was a very noble Entertainment, at which Their Majesties, and Royal Families Healths were drank, with several discharges of Cannon, planted for that purpose, and from Ships in the River. After dinner the Mayor, Aldermen, and rest of the Company, walked from the Mayors to the *Sandhill* our Common Market-place, the Trainbands making a Lane, and having surrounded one of the Fountains running with Wine, they there drank their Majesties and Royal Families Healths, accompanied with *Huza's* from the numerous croud of Spectators, Volleys from the Trainbands, and discharges of Cannon; Then they proceeded to the *Guildhall*, where their Majesties and Royal Families healths were repeated, accompanied as before with *Huza's*, Volleys, and discharges of Cannon, and all the while the Bells never ceased Ringing: In the Evening a large Bonfire or high Pyramid of Tar-barrels, being erected in the said Market place, Mr. Mayor ordered a Gibbet to be fixed on the top, upon which hung the Association and Bill of Exclusion; which after standing a while for Publick view, were burnt by the hands of the Common Hangman; and for conclusion of this Solemnity

Mr. Mayor gave a Ball at his House, and the Streets were full of particular Bonfires.

Whitehal, Octob. 21. This day the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount *Preslon*, was Sworn of His Majesties most Honourable Privy Council, and accordingly took his place at the Board.

His Majesty hath been lately pleased to confer the Honor of Knighthood upon *Paul Ricaut* Esq; formerly His Majesties Consul at *Smirna*, and now Chief Secretary to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of *Ireland*.

The Baron *de Blomberg*, Envoy from the Duke of *Courland*, had the 17th instant Audience of His Majesty, the 18th of Her Majesty, the 19th of the Queen Dowager, and this day of their Royal Highnesses Prince *George* and the Princess *Ann* of *Denmark*, being conducted by Sir *Charles Cotrel* Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehal, Octob. 23 His Majesty was pleased this day to give the White Staff to the Right Honourable the Earl of *Mulgrave*, whom His Majesty has made Lord Chamberlain of His Household, upon the death of the Right Honourable the Earl of *Ailesbury*, who dyed on *Tuesday* last at his House at *Amptihl* in *Bedfordshire*.

The Baron *de Loe*, Envoy from the Elector of *Trier* had this day Audience of Leave of His Majesty, conducted by Sir *Charles Cotrel*.

London, Octob. 23. This day *Henry Cornish* was according to the Sentence passed upon him on *Monday* last at the *Old-Bayly* executed in *Cheapside*, over against *King-street*.

Elizabeth Gaunt likewise Convicted of High Treason was burnt at *Tyburn*. And *Edward Lindsey* a Soldier was hanged on *Tower-hill* for running away from his Colours.
