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Rome, September 22.

Yesterday was Celebrated here the Anniversary of the Pope's Coronation, who entered this day into the tenth year of his Pontificate. Cardinal Cibo had this week a long Audience of the Pope about the Affairs of Hungary, and we are told his Holiness bid him assure the Emperor he would continue to give him all the assistance he was able in the War he is now engaged in against the Turks, The Republick of Venice have named four Persons for the Pope to chuse one, to fill the Place of Auditor of the Rota, vacant by the death of Signior Palucci, which must be held by a Venetian.

Naples, Octob. 3. Our Viceroy having received an account that the famous Cicconesto, who went to seave against the Turks in *Dalmatia*, is returned with above 60 *Banditti* more into this Kingdom, and gone towards *Chieta*, his Excellency has sent some Troops that way to suppress them, or at least to secure the Country from the Disturbance they might otherwise give it. The Mountain *Vesuvius* has within these few days begun to burn again, vomiting Flames, and a prodigious quantity of Ashes, with a most terrible Noise. Orders have been sent to the Gallies of this Kingdom to return hither, that they may be disarmed and laid up during the Winter.

Milan, Octob. 10. The Count de Louvigni *Majstre* de Camp General of the Forces in this State, is returned hither from visiting *Alexandria*, *Mortara*, *Valanz*, *Tortona* and other places, where he took a review of the Garisons, and reformed several Troops. Our Viceroy the Count de Melgar, is at present at *Robecco*, where he intends to pass some short time; He has published an Edict forbidding upon great Penalties the carrying of Corn out of this State.

Genova, Octob. 16. The *Pearl* Frigate, the *Angle*, the *Cadix* Merchant, and the *Antego* Merchant, are arrived here from the Coast of *Spain*; wanting only six days from *Alicant*. They bring no other News than that many *Poor-Jack* Ships were arrived at *Alicant* from *Newfoundland* in fourteen and fifteen days, a very great passage, and it's laid they have had a very good Fishing. The Spanish Gallies which are at present at *Porro Longone* are very suddenly expected here, where they will be joynd by four Gallers more of the Squadron of the Duke of *Turks*. The *Sieur d'Obbeville* Envoy Extraordinary from *France*, was yesterday at the Palace to desire of the Senate a positive answer to what he lately represented to them by Order of the King his Master. The little Council was assembled on *Thursday* last, and had a long debate about Signior *Centurione*, who has been some time a Prisoner, but we do not know what resolution they came to.

Vienna, Octob. 21. The Duke of *Lorraine* returned hither yesterday from *Hungary*; The *Lunenburg* Troops are gone home, and the rest of the Forces that were encamped between the Rivers *Gran* and *Ipel* are marching to their Winter-Quarters. There are now in Upper *Hungary* 32 Regiments Commanded by the *Velt* Marshal *Caprara*, General *Schultz*, and the Baron de *Mercy*, where they are to Winter. The first of these Generals arrived the sixth Instant in the Camp before *Caschau*, having caused his Troops to leave that place some days before. *Peterhafi*, who had made a shew of entering into the Emperor's Service, being come near the Town, put himself into it with the 600 Men he had with him, which was a great encouragement to the Garison to defend the place: General *Caprara* sent twice to summon them, but received no answer, whereupon he resolved to go on with the Siege, and caused the Trenches to be opened on the 10th Instant, which was done with the loss of a Lieutenant and 10 Soldiers: The 11th several great Pieces of Cannon were brought into the Camp from *Esperies*, and the General gave Orders for the raising three Batteries against the Town; The same day 100 Hungarians commanded by a very eminent Officer among them made a Sally, who, being surrounded by some Imperial Troops, were most of them slain or taken Prisoners; The 12, the Besieged made another Sally, and advanced a good way into our Camp, but were at last repulsed with the loss of 19 Men on their side, and 30 on ours. Count *Teckelej* is retired with 300 Horse to the other side of the River *Teissa*, but his principal Officers are in *Caschau*, among which is *Falgel* who commands in Chief there. General *Schultz* having taken *Tockay* and several other places on that side, marched with the Troops under his command to *Potack*, thinking that Town would have likewise submitted, but the Garison made a very stout resistance, and General *Schultz* after having been some days before the place received orders from General *Caprara* to make all the haste he could to joyn him, that so they might employ their whole strength against *Caschau*. The Baron de *Mercy* having been several days before *Agria*, and done considerable execution with the Bombs he caused during that time to be shot into the Town, finding it would be very difficult and hazardous to make any farther attempt upon a place of that strength in the season we are now in, resolved to march from thence towards *Zolnock*, a place on the *Teissa*, whither Colonel *Heussler* was already gone, which he accordingly put in execution, after having destroyed all the Country about *Agria*, thereby to deprive the Garison of the Subsistence they might have received from thence this Winter. The Letters we had the last week from *Croasia* told us, That the 1000 Turks which went with the Convoy to *Ganizza*, had joynd with 4000 more not far from *Legrad*.
