Genoua, Oftober 14.

🔫 H E eighth inftant arrived here a Dotch Man of War with two Merchant Ships under his Convoy from Cd diz, from whence they have brought about doo thouland pieces of Eight. The Senate have this week put forth a Proclamation, Forbidding all their Subjects on very fevere penalties to affront any Stranger. Yester-day arrived here nine Spanish Gallies from Porto Longone, two whereof belong to Naples, and have Orders to return thither, but the other feven being the Squadron of the Duke of Turfis will Winter here. The Letters from Legborn of the 10th in-flant tell us, that a Veffel was arrived there from Cape Negro and Tunis, by which they had advice, that a great Army was marching from Argiers, towards Tunis, to affift the two B others Haly and Mehemet, Sons of Morad Bey, against the picfent Dey of Tuniz, and that it was believed the two Parties would in f w days decide their quartel by a Battle. That there was a report that the Tripolins had cut off their old Dey for the Peace he lately made with the French. And that the Algierines have broke with the Dutch, having taken a confiderable Ship bound for Holland for the Coalt of Spain.

Venice, Oltob. 20. By a Tartan: arrived from Cephalonia we are informed, that the Forces of this Republick, after the taking of the Fortrelles of Zarnata and Calamata, marched towards Navarino, to attack that place; that the Captain Baila, upon advice of it, having again got together his scattered Troops, and received a new reinforcement, marched thither to hinder the delign of the Chrislians; That Captain General Morofini advancing thereupon towards the Enemy, a sattle had enfued, in which 4000 Turks were Slain, and the reft put to flight, and all their Cannon-and Baggage taken; and that this Victory had colt the Venetians 1500 Men, who were killed upon the place of fight; but the Senate having no account thereof from the Captain General, we know not what credit to give to this report. The last Letters from the Fleet informed us, that Signior Meline was Sailed with the Ships under his Command towards the Archipelago, having received advice that feveral Ships of Barbary were cruifing there, and that they had taken a Venetian Ship very richly laden. They write from Dalmatia that the Vaivode Fanco, Understanding that 3000 Turks were on their march towards Sebenico, with a delign to Plunder and hurn the Suburbs of that City, he laid 1200 Morlaques in

Ambush, who falling upon the Turks when they leaft expected it, routed them, killing many and taking divers Prifoners. This week arrived here an old Galeafs with feveral broken Campon, which were taken at Coron; A great Convoy is preparing to early Provisions and Aminunicion to the Fleor, which will be ready to Sail in few days. In the mean time the Senate give out Commissions daily, for the raifing new Troopsio And wes are told that the Elector of Saxony ands the Duke of Hanouer, will further affift this State with a confiderable Body of Men against the next Spring. The laft week Signior Bellono was received into the number of the bobility, he paying too thousand Ducats in confideration thereof. We have advice by the way of Ragufa, that the Plague right very much at Conftantinople ; which togethon with the account they had of the taking of Newbeufel, and the other ill fuccesses of the Ottoman Forces in Hungary, had call the Inhabitants of that City into the greatest confirmation that can be imagined That the Janifaries grew every day mone and more diforderly ; And that at Adrianopte, where the Grand Signior has for fome time had his Relidence, they had cut off the heads of feveral Chief Officers; that they threatened the Grani Vifier with a like Treatment; And that the Grand Signior himfelf was not out of danger; But that to quiet them, and the reft of the Soldiery, confiderable fums of mony had been diffributed among them, and it was given out, that the Grand Signior would go into the Field, and Command his Army in perfor the next Summer.

Madrid, Odob. 11. Their Catholick Majeflies went the feventh inftant to Buen-tesiro, where it's believed they will continue till towards Chrifimafs. The Marquis de Feuquieres, Amballador Extraordinary from France, made the first instant his publick Entry here, and the next day had Audience of the King. Signior Durazzo the Poples Nuncio made his publick Entry the third, and had his Audience the day following. Don Vincente de Gonzaga has refigned the Prefidentihip of the Council of the Indies, intending to pais the reft of his life at San Bernardino, and it's believed the King will give that Place to the Marquis de los Velez. We have an account from the West-Indies, that the South See is quite cleared of Pyrates; That 1500 thoufand pieces of Eight had been brought to Panama on the Kings account, and that greater fums were dayly expected there in order to be Tran ported to Europe.
