

" We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Henry Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, as the Visitor of the said cathedral church of Gloucester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that so much of the said sum of two thousand and fifty-seven pounds, twelve shillings and five pence, Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, as shall be required by the said Dean and Chapter for the purpose aforesaid, may and shall be sold, and that the proceeds of the sale thereof shall be applied to and invested in the purchase by the said Dean and Chapter of all that the said outstanding term so granted as aforesaid in the messuages or dwelling-houses, garden and premises particularly described in the said schedule hereunto annexed, and that the said Dean and Chapter shall and may so deal with and appropriate the same, and each and every part thereof, as shall in their judgment be most conducive to the improvement of their cathedral and the precincts thereof, in conformity with the provisions of the said secondly recited Act.

" And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

" A messuage or dwelling-house, with the out-buildings, garden, stable, coach-house and appurtenances thereto belonging, late in the occupation of Henry Hooper Wilton; and another messuage or building adjoining thereto, and situate in a lane called Grace-lane, otherwise Saint John's-lane, and lately occupied by the said Henry Hooper Wilton and his partner as law offices. All which said premises are situate within the precincts of the cathedral church of Gloucester, and are bounded on the south west by lands late in the occupation of John Gough; on the south, in part by the said lane called Grace-lane, and by lands of the Dean and Chapter of Gloucester, in the occupation of William King, or his under tenants; on the north east, by a brook called Full-brook; on the west, by a piece of ground of the said Dean and Chapter, called

the Common-orchard or grove, part of the said cathedral church, and by a garden in the occupation of Paris Dick, Doctor of Medicine."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrars of the two several registries of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, at Bristol and Gloucester.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS a Treaty has been concluded between Her Majesty and His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Oldenburg, whereby due protection has been secured within the said duchy for the authors of books, dramatic works, or musical compositions, and the inventors, designers, or engravers of prints and articles of sculpture, and the authors, inventors, designers, or engravers of any other works whatsoever of literature and the fine arts, in which the laws of Great Britain and of Oldenburg do now or may hereafter give their respective subjects the privilege of copyright, and for the lawful representatives or assigns of such authors, inventors, designers, or engravers, with regard to any such works first published within the dominions of Her Majesty:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her reign, intituled " An Act to amend the law relating to international copyright," doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the day of the date hereof, the authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of any of the following works (that is to say), books, prints, articles of sculpture, dramatic works, musical compositions, and any other works of literature and the fine arts, in which the laws of Great Britain give to British subjects the
