**F**O R the preventing Tumultuous Disorders, which may happen hereafter upon presence of Assembling, to make Bonfires, and Fire-Works, and Disappointing the Evil Designs of Persons Disaffected to the Government, who commonly make use of such occasions, to turn those Meetings into Riots and Tumults: It is this Day Ordered by his Majesty in Council, That no Person or Persons whatsoever, do presume to make or encourage the making any Bonfires, or other Publick Fire-Works, at or upon any Festival Day, or at any other time or times whatsoever, without particular Permission, Leave or Order, first had from his Majesty, or his Board, or signified to them by the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor of London, or by the Justices of the Peace in their respective Limits, upon Pain of His Majesties Displeasure, and being Prosecuted with the utmost Severity of the Law; Whereof all Persons whom it may concern, are to take notice at their Perils.

*Venice, Octob. 27.* By a Vessel which arrived here four or five days ago from *Cephalonia*, we were informed that the Inhabitants of *Porto Vitulo* had obliged the Turks in *Garilon* there to send the Keys of the Town to Captain General *Morofini*; That those of *Chielisa* had done the like; and that it was believed several other places would follow their Example; which is not only confirmed by a Barque come from *Zant*, but we have by her farther advice, that the Forces of the Republick have likewise taken *Passava*, an *Portoquaglia*, and that the Turkish *Garilons* had been conducted to *Napoli de Malvasia*; That Signior *Lorenzo Venier*, was made *Proveditor Extraordinary* of *Porto Vitulo*, in which place the *Venetians* found 60 pieces of Cannon, and a very considerable quantity of Ammunition; and that the Captain General, after having put good *Garilons* into these places, was gone with the whole Army towards *Navarino*. A Merchant Ship is arrived here from *Alexandria*, from whence she came the 21st of the last month, the Master whereof reports, that six days before his departure there sailed out of that Port eleven Ships of *Barbary*, to convoy two other Vessels laden with Powder for *Constantinople*; That a great Turkish Ship, carrying above 60 Cuns, was not long before cast away, off of *Settecapi*, not one Man of those that were in her being saved. And that the *Tripolins* having taken a Ship belonging to *Ragusa*, bound hither from *Alexandria*, and carried her to *Rhodes*, the *Bassa* would not suffer them to sell, or otherwise dispose either of the Ship or her lading, saying, *They ought not to molest the Ships of Ragusa*. This week arrived here 1000 *Suissers*, part of the 4000 which are raising according to an agreement

made with the Senate, for the service of this Republick. The Convoy which we told you was preparing here, will sail on *Saturday* next, composed of 10 great Ships, which will carry to the Fleet 1500 Soldiers, a considerable sum of Money, and a great quantity of Ammunition and Provisions of all sorts.

*Vienna, Octob. 28.* Several Troops have within these few days passed by this place, going to their Winter-quarters, among which, were those of *Suabia*, who are returning to take theirs in the Empire; The *Sieur Kleinwachter* the Emperors Principal Ingenier, is gone to the Siege of *Caschau*, where his presence is the more necessary, for that the two Chief Ingeniers, who directed the attacks, are both become unserviceable for the present, the one being wounded, and the other fallen sick. The *Besiegers* according to the last advices we have from the Camp, were raising two Batteries on the edge of the Ditch, and were making some works for the security of their Trenches; The Prince of *Wirtemberg*, who Commanded one of the Attacks, was killed the 18th instant, with a Cannon Bullet, as he was viewing a work he had ordered to be cast up. General *Schultz* has we doubt not by this time received the Emperors Orders, and is in pursuance of them marching to joyn the Imperial Camp before *Caschau*. The *Baion de Mercy* was according to the last news we had of him, marching towards *Zolnock*; The Troops he has with him will take their Winter-quarters on that side, having for their security possessed themselves of several Castles and other advantageous Posts, as well about *Agria* as *Zolnock*. The *Ottoman* Forces in *Croatia* being gone into their Winter-quarters, The *Imperialists* Commanded by General *Leslie*, are about doing the like. The Turks are making several new Fortifications for the defence of the Town and Castle of *Esseck*, and are Fortifying some other Posts to secure the Bridge of *Esseck*. The *Serafquier Ibrahim* is it's said gone to *Adrianople*, where as well as at *Belgrade*, *Buda* and other Turkish places, we are assured Provisions are very scarce, and the *Janisaries* very mutinous. The Count *de Herberstein*, Governor of *Carelstadt*, is coming hither to take his leave of the Emperor, being made General of the Gallies of *Malta*. The Duke of *Lorraine* will part from hence in two or three days for *Inspruck*. The Letters from *Zolkiew* which is within three miles of *Loopol*, of the 10th instant, tell us that the King of *Poland* was arrived there, having left the Queen and the young Princes his Children at *Wiesockay*, and that the Castellan of *Cracow* had drawn 3000 Men together, and was marching with them to joyn the Army of the Crown.

*Vienna, Novemb. 1.* This day about Noon arrived here the Prince *de Piccolomini*, being sent by General *Caprara*, to give the Emperor an account, that *Caschau* the Capital City of Upper *Burgary*, which was provided with all things necessary for a long defence, surrendered the 25th of the last month upon Articles; And that the whole Garrison, consisting of 4000 men, as well Officers as Soldiers, had voluntarily put themselves into

the Emperors service. And that Count *Teckelej*, having in the desperate condition he was reduced to, retired to *Great Waradin*, to solicit the Assistance of the Turks, The *Bassa* of that Place had on the 15th past, made him a Prisoner, and had sent him with Irons on his Hands and Feet to *Adrianople*. And to this great news, is added that of the taking of *Zolnock* by the *Baron de Mercy*, (which we have likewise by an Express) the Turkish Garrison having upon his approach, abandoned the place, and retiring to *Agria*; And of *Leutsch* by Colonel *Heusler*. The same Express brings the Confirmation of the Imperialists being Possessed of *Little Waradin*, *Ca'o Ibraby*, *St. Nicolas*, *Onosb*, *Debrezin*, *Tockay* and *Potocke*, so that they are now Masters of all Upper Hungary, except *Agria*, and one or two places more, which are still in the hands of the Turks and the Rebels.

*Hamburg, Octob. 29.* The King of Denmark arrived the 26th of this month at *Itzar*, about seven German miles from hence; The 27th his Majesty went from thence to *Gluckstadt*, intending to return this day to *Itzar*. The Magistrates of this City have sent thither two of their Body to Compliment his Majesty, and to make him the usual present of Wine; From thence his Majesty will go to *Gottorp*, and after a few days stay there, will return to *Copenhagen*. The *Sieur de Guldenstolp*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sweden to the States General of the United Provinces, is arrived here, and will in a day or two continue his Journey for *Holland*. The last Letters from *Poland* give an account that the *Seraglio Soliman* and the *Cham of Tartary* were joyned together, that their Chief aim seemed to be to supply *Caminiec* with Provisions and Ammunition; And that the Polish Army was within a days march of them.

*Hamburg, Nov. 6.* We had Letters by the last Post from *Poland*, which told us, that the Turks and Tartars being joyned together, and making an Army of 6000 men, had endeavoured several times to enclose and fall upon the Poles, who, with the Forces of *Lithuania*, were not above 25000 strong; That from the first to the tenth of the last month the two Armies had been every day in Action; That they came at last to a general Battle; and that after a very obstinate and bloody Fight, the Poles obtained an absolute Victory, entirely defeating the Enemy, and taking their Cannon and Baggage, and all the Provisions designed for *Caminiec*. Of which we hope our next Letters will bring us the confirmation with the further particulars.

*Cologne, Nov. 6.* The Emperor having sent a *Manifesto* to the Magistrates of this City, by which they were required on pain of the Imperial Ban, to deliver *Gulick*, *Sacks*, and *Mechovius*, into the hands of his Commissioners here, they resolved, after some difficulty, to comply with it, and accordingly the 4th Instant very early in the morning the said three persons were put into a Boat, and carried under a Guard of 30 Soldiers belonging to the Duke of *Newbourg*, to *Duseldorp*, where they will be kept, under close imprisonment, till this place be cleared of those Mutineers, that continue to disturb the publick Peace, when it is said they will be brought back to be punished according to their desert. They write from *Alsace* that the new Fortifications at *Fribourg*, *Brisac*, *Schlestadt* and *Colmar*, are quite finished, and that the French continue to work with great diligence on those of *Strasbourg* and *Hunnirghen*.

*Brussels, Novemb. 3.* The 11th Instant arrived here the Prince de *Steinbeuse*, who served the last Campaign in Hungary, coming Post from *Vienna*, with the good News that *Caschau* was surrendered to the Imperialists the 25th past; That *Teckelej*, who fled to *Great Waradin*, was

made a Prisoner by the *Bassa* of that place, and sent bound in Irons to the Grand Signior; And that General *Mercy* and Colonel *Heusler* had taken *Zolnock* and *Leusch*, both which places were abandoned, the first by the Turks, and the other by the Hungarians, that were in them.

*Hague, Nov. 13.* The *Sieur Cambricke*, the Imperial Minister, hath communicated to the States General the late happy Successes of the Imperial Arms in Upper Hungary, in the taking of *Caschau*, *Zolnock*, *Leusch*, and several other places; and that the *Bassa* of *Great Waradin* having got *Teckelej* into his hands, had sent him Prisoner to *Adrianople*,

*Paris, Novemb. 10.* The King has had a fit of the Gout, which took him in the Foot and the Hand, but the pain thereof has at present left him. The Prince de *Conzi* is pretty well recovered, but the Prince de *Conzi* her Husband dyed last night of the Small-Pox. The fifth of this month dyed *Messire Jean de Montpefor de Carbon*, Arch-Bishop of *Sens*, in the 79th year of his age. The Bishop of *Soissons* is likewise dead.

*Paris, Novemb. 14.* The Ambassador of Poland at this Court, has received advice of a great Victory obtained by the Forces of that Crown against the Turks and Tartars, who, though above double the number of the Christians, were totally defeated, and their Camp and Carion taken: Of which we expect the particulars by the next Letters.
