Genoua, November 6.

His week arrived here the Charles from Cadiz and Alicant, and the Lucy Ketch from Legorn. The Spanif Gallies are fill here, but will part from hence, in few days, for Naples, where they are to winter. The Governor of Milan, who has been all this week enterta ned by Signior Spinola in his Palace at St. Pier d'Arena, came this Evening into the City, and is lodged at the Carmelites : It's faid, he has Pretenfions upon the Republick for the Troops he raif.d, at their defire during their late differences with France

Venice, Nov. z. On Wednesday last arrived here a Tartane, with Letters of the rith of the laft Month from the Fl et, which was then at Porto Cittero : They tell us, That the Captain General having demolifhed Calamata, a place that by reafon of its lcituation could not be well defended, he failed from thence, with part of the Fleet, to Perto Vitalo, which the Maynotes had fonie days before made themselves Masters of : That the Captain General having landed with his Forces, marched towards Chielifa, a flrong Fortrels, fcituated on a Rock about two Miles from Porto Vitulo, in which was a Garison of 300 Turks, commanded by Affan Bassa, Governor of the whole Province of Massa ; who, upon the approach of the Venetians, fent an Officer to the Captain General to capitulate : That Articles were accordingly agreed on, and that, in pursuance of them, the Turks marched out with their Arms, Bag and Baggage, leaving in the place 55 pieces of Cannon, and good flore of Ammunition and Provisions; and, according to the Capitulation, were to be conducted to Vatica, but the fid Baffa chole rather to remain in the Venetian Camp: After which, the Captain General fent a Detachment to Paffava, a Fortress 10 Miles farther in the Countrey, there were in it 200 Turks, who no fooner heard of the Surrender of Chielifa, and the march of our Troops towards them, but they refolved to abandon the place, which they ac-cordingly put in execution; fo that the Forces of the Republick are now pollefled of the whole Province of Mayna, of which the Captain General has made Signior Lorenzo Penier Governor : And we are affured, that above Twelve thousand Maynotes have already put themselves into the Service of thi State.

HEREAS Our Army which is entred int sidavia, by reason several Regiments that

ought to have joined it are not yet arrived in the Camp ; and that the new Levies are not in that order, nor do amount to the Number that was expected, in exposed to great danger, the Enemy ( with whom they have had continual Skirmistes from the first, to the fixth of this mo the though without any advantage on the file of the Infidels ) very much exceeding them in Number, and being daily reinforced by fresh Troops, as well under the Orders of the Serafquity Solyman, as the Cham of Tartary, and Sultan Galga, fo that the fuccess of a Battel, which can bardly be avoided, is much to be feared: To prevent thereof the damage which Our faid Forces, and confequently the whole Kingdom may otherwife fuftain, We do Command and Require all the Militia, which ought in fuch Occafions, to follow Our Standard, to march day and night, from the moment that they have knowledge of this Our Command, sewards the Bridge on the Nicher, whither We intend to go in Person, if there be need of it, to encourage Our Forces, exhorting, in the mean time, Our faid Militia (for the love of their Countrey, the discharge of their Duty, and the Common Good of Chriftendom) immediately to obey thefe Our Orders, in the doing whereof, they will recommend themselves to Our Royal Favours But, on the constrary, if they fail therein, will not only incur Our high Di-pleafure, but oblige UI to proceed again. It them with the utmost severity.

In pursuance of these Orders, the Militia of the adjacent Palatinates have already begun their march, and divers of the Nobility are preparing to attend the King, who is gone to Zolkiew, from whence he will temove nearer to the Frontiers as there shall be occasion.

Warfaw, Odob. 18. The Letters from Lemburgh tell us, That the Forces of this Crown have obtained a great Victory against the Enemy. All the Particulars they give us, are : That the Battel was on the 1oth infant; That the Fight lafed 5 hours; That 1 200 of the Enemy were flain, and many Prifoners taken ( among which, were fome of the chief Officers of Sultan Galga) with feveral Standards, and the best part of their Baggage. The joy of which news is the greater, for that we received ic at a time that there was more reafon to fear the loss of our whole Army, the Enemy being treble their number, and having fo environed them, that they could not retreat without great difficulty and We have Advice that the Coffacks, in the hazard fervice of this Crown, have taken the Town of Farolicke, on the Nitfler, the Garifon, which conlisted in 1200 Men, being most of them cut in pice ces, and the reft, with their Commander in chief, made Priloners.

Vienna, Nov. 5. The Campigne is ended in Up- 1 per Hungary, by the Surrender of Calcham, and feveral other places that were-poffelled by the Reb:ls. General Caprara carried on the Siege with great vigor, but, on the other fide, the Rebels made to obfinate a Defence, and the Befiegers began to fuffer fo much by the weather, that it's thought the Imperialifs would have been forced to retire, had not the Baron Petrozzy arrived, as he did, in the Camp, with the news of Teckeley's being made a Prisoner by the Balla of Wazadin, who being fent by General Caprara into Cafebaw, to give the Inhabitants an account thereaf, they immediately refolved to fubm t; and having obtain'dArticles for the preferving their Rights and Priviledges, accordingly furrendred the place theasth of the laft Month : All the Germans that were in the place, being about 180, immediately took an Oath of Fidelity to the Emperor, and were received into the Imperial Regiments, and the Hungarians were permitted to return to their feveral Homes, except the chief Officers, whom General Caprara ordered to be fecured, till he thould receive his Imperial Majefties directions concerning them. The Baron de Mercy and Colonel Heusler having put 2000 Men into Zol-nocke, passed the River Teisfa, and marched towards St. Nicolas, to attack that place. In their way they found four pieces of great Cannon, which the Garilon of Zolnocke ( who, we told you, abandoned the place, upon the approach of the Imperialis) had been forced, by the hafte they were in, to leave behind them. General Schuhz is arrived here from Hungary, having put the Troops he commanded under the Orders of General Caprara. The Duke of Larrain parted from hence on Wednefday last for Insprucke, from whence he intends to go and make the Elector of Bavaria a Vifit at Mucicke.

Francfort, Nov. 12. The Imperial Forces in Upper Langary are now marching to their Winterquarters. The Baren Petrózzy brought with him, as they write from Lungary, 7000 of the Rebels into the Emperor's Service, and we expect to hear by the next Letters that the firong Caffle of Mongatz is in the hands of the Imperialifts. The Letters from Municke tell us, That the Marquis de Belfonds, lent by the Dauphinels to compliment the Elector of Bavaria, her Brother, upon his Marriage, was arrived there, and had had Audience of their Electoral Highnefics.

Hamburgb, Nov. 16. We are told from Berlin. That the Elector of Brandenburg hath named Commillioners to treat with the Sicur Graffentbal, the Suedifb Envoy, about adjusting the differences concerning the Limits in Pomeren: And that there was much difcourie of an Alliance between the King of Sueden, and his Electoral Highnefs. Count Coningfmark arrived the 9th inflant at Stetin from Vienna; he is going for Stockbolme, to defire, it's (aid, the King of Sueden s leave, to ferve the Republick of Venice, as General of their Forces by Land, acco ding to the Agreement he hath made with their Ambaffador at the Emperor's Court.

Hague, Novemb. 20, The Letters from Vienna of the 8th inftant, confirm the Account we gave you in our laft, of the manner of Teckeley's being made a Prifoner by the Turks at Waradin; and add, that they had carried him from thence to-

wards Adrianople. The Heer Guldenftolpe, Envoy Extraordinary from the K ng Sueden, arrived here the laft week: It's believed to foon as he has had Audience of the States General, Commiffioners will be appointed to confer with him about renewing the Treaty between this State, and the Crown of Sueden, which is now going to expire. The Venetian Ambasfadors are arrived at Amflerdam in their way to England.

Paris, Nov. 21. The King, accompanied with the Dauphin and Dauphinefs, parted the 13th instant from Fontainebleau, and came the next day to Verfailles. His most Christian Majefty has named the Bilhop of Poistiers to be Archibilhop of Sens, and the Bilhop of Lavour to be Archibilhop of Aix. The news we had of the death of the Archibilhop of Lyons, is not confirmed. It's faid, the Ambifiador of P land will make no long flay here.
