Malta, Sept. 23.

UR Gallies, eight in rumber, which have ferved the Summer in the Venetian Fleets, returned hither the 21 of this Month. The next day the heart of the Count de la Tour, who was flain in the Siege of Goron, was folemnly Interred; We have lost in this Campagne 19 Knights, and 300 Soldiers, and the fick and wounded are about the fame number. In the division of the Spoil, we have got between 3 and 400 Slaves, and two pieces of Cannon, which were formerly taken from us by the Turks.

Rome, Nov 3. The French Ambassador had on Monday last Audience of the Pope, to acquaint his Holiness with the Resolution the King his Master hath taken, with the approbation of the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans, to refer to his Arbitrage the Pret nsions which the said Dutchess has, by the death of the late Elector Palatine her Brother, upon the Allodial Lands of the Palatinate, &c. the faid Ambalfador declaring, That the chief Molive which had in suced his most Christian Majesty to it, was, to take from the Princes of Germany all Jealousie, and pretence of excusing themselves from sending their Troops to the affishance of the Emperor against the Turks; and adding, That for the same Reason his Majesty will not do any thing that may diffurb the Peace of the Empire. The Pope received this Declaration with a great deal of fa-tisfaction, and caused an Express to be dispatched the next day to Cardinal Bonvis his Nuncio at Viems, to import the same to the Emperor. Yesterday Signior Lando, Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of Venice, had Audience of his Holiness, to give him an account of the late happy Successes of their Arms in the Morea, The Pope's Gallies which were fent with those of Tuscany and Malta to the affiftance of Wenetians, are returned to Civita Veccia.

Turin, Nov. 5. The Court of Savoy is expected here towards the end of this Month, from Moncalier. The Ambassadors of the Suisse Cantons of Soleure, are returned home extremely satisfied with their Reception and En, ettainment here. The Count de Magisano, who was sent by the Duke of Savoy, to compliment the Emperor upon the Electror of Bavaris's Marriage with the Archdutches his Daughter, is returned from Vienna.

Venice, Now. 2. A new Convoy of 40 Vessels is preparing here, under the Conduct of Signior Gioseppe Morosini, by which will be sent to the Flect 1500 Soldiers, 3 or 400 Slaves for the Gallies, and a considerable Sum of Money; Twelvenew Gallies, and three Men of War are building here, which will be finished against Spring. The

last Letters from the Fleet inform us, That Captain General Morosini had given Orders for the demolishing of Passaus; and that he had sent the Troops of Saxous and Brunswicke to, winter at Corfou and Zant.

Vienna, Nov. & We have an account from Upper Hungary, that the Baron de Mercy having put a Garison of 2000 Men, into Zolnocke, he palled the Theys, and sending out Parties to learn news of the Enemy, one of them took a Countrey Pellow who was going with a Letter from the Governor of Saravas, to the Balla of Temismaer, to demand a speedy supply of Foor, without which he let the Bassa know he was not in a condition to desend the place, in case the hristians should attack it; whereupon the Baron de Merey and Colonel Heuster directed their march thitier, and arriving near the place, understood the Turks had all indoped it: They found there 27 Pieces of Cannot, with a considerable quantity of Ammuhition and Provisions, and a great deal of Forage; our Honle and Dragoons were immediately fent in pursuit of the Garison, and overtaking them, killed 250, and took 45 Prisoners, the rest saving themselves by the favour of the Woods, and other places of difficult access; Saravas is a Fortrela built by the Turks lince Teckeley's Rebellion, is scieuated on the River Kiroz, which falls into the Theys about five German Miles from Zolnocke; and by the Acquisition of it, the two Provinces of Tarantaliens and Czongradientz, which have for many years been possessed by the Turks, are reduced to the Emperor's obedience, the Inhabitants having fent Deputies to General Mercy, to offer to supply his Forces with Provisions, and what else their Countrey affords, and to affure him that they are ready to take an Oath of Fidelity to the Emperor, We have likewise advice, that Debrecen, a very rich and populous Town, hath fent three Deputies to General Mercy at Saravas, to affure him of their Fidelity to his Imperial Majesty, and to pray he will please to take them under his Protection; This City has, during all the late Troubles in Hungary, preserved a Neutrality; having suffered both the udges appointed by the Emperor, and those establithed by the Port, to exercise their Authority. The Mateschal de Camp General Caprara has put 4000 Men into Caschaw, and has sent a Detachement to join the Baron de Mercy and Golonel Heuf fler, who, before they go into their Winter quarters, will return towards Agria, and defroy all the Countrey round it, that the Garison may not be able to subsist this Winter; the said General has fent another Detachement, to summon the Casses of Monganz and Ungwar. The Troops of Lunear burgh have begun their march homewards, but it's

faid they will return early in the Spring; all the principal Officers have been presented with Gold Chains and Medals, and Money has been distributed among the inferior Officers and Soldiers. The Prince of Transilvania is sending an Envoy, hither to mediate, as is given out, a Peace between the Emperor and the Turk, but it's believed he intends under that pretence to negotiate other matters that more nearly concern himself. The Turkish Aga who was twice sent by the Scrasquier to the Duke of Lorrgin, is again arrived at Comorray and has defired leave to come hither, being charge ed with new Proposals of Peace; but we are told he will be sent back without being heard, for that the Emperor will not enter into any Negotiation without the knowledge and concurrence of his Al-

Vienna, Nov. 11. The account we had of the Imperialifts having possessed themselves of Saravas, is confirmed; There was in the place 3000 Turks, who abandoned it upon the approach of our Troops. General Mercy and Colonel Heafler in their march towards the Theys took Ibran, Onoth, Mibeltelecke, Nagmial, Sicalo, Oran, and some other Castles and places, into all which they have put Garisons. And we have advice, that the Fortref of Mongatz is furrendred to the Detachement which General Caprara sent thither, the Princess Rogorzi, Count Teckeley's Wife, having, it's faid, upon the news the had of their march, left, the place, and retired towards Poland. The Emperor has given the Regiment of which the Prince of Wirtemberg (who was killed before Cafeban) was Colonel, to the Marquis Spinola.

Hamburgh , Nov. 13. They write from Ha+ noner, that the Sieur Grankou was arrived there in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburgh, and that the Duke of Hanouer had named Commissioners to confer with him, The Letters from Dresden and Berlin, confirm that the Electors of Saxony and Brandenburgh have promiled to affift the Emperor with 10000 Men the next Summer. We are told that the King of Sueden intends in the Spring to transport some Troops to his Territories in Germany. The Deputies of this City arearrived at Vienna, and have written to our Magistrates, that they have great hopes they shall succeed in the Business they were fent upon. The differences between the Duke of Zell and this City are not yet composed.

The Letters from Poland give an Account, That the Turks and Tartars having environed the Army of Poland (whom they very much exceeded in number) to cut off their Retreat, and having already very much streightned them, the Poles Yefolved to attack one of the Enemies Quarters, thereby to open a way for their Retreat, which they performed with that courage and refolutions that they gained their design with little loss on their side, though of the Enemy above 1000 were killed, and many Prisoners and part of their Baggage taken.

Cologne, Nov. 20. The Magistrafes of this City having privately resolved to send one of their Body to Vienna, to sollicite their Affairs at that Court, he accordingly parted from hence the last week, with Orders to make all the Falle he could an his Journey, but it's believed he will hardly ob tain Audience of the Emperor, seeing he has undertaken this Commission without the knowledge of the Imperial Commissioners here. The 15th

instant the said Commissioners summoned three Burghers of this City, named Biefen, Bochemer and Koningsfelt, to appear before them in 24 hours, upon pain, in case they did not, of the Imperial Ban. The Duke of Lorrain arrived the 12th of this Month at Tasprucke, where he will pass the Winter. They write from Vienna, that great Magazines are providing in Hungary for the next Campagne.

Brussels, Nov. 20. The Baron del Val, whom his Excellency fent lately to Paris, has, we hear, presented a Memorial to his most Christian Majefly about the Seizures made in the New Conquetts, to which he was expecting an Answer. The Convoy from Cadiz is arrived at Oftend. The Letters from Fienna of the 8th instant, give an account of the Surrender of the strong Castle of Mongatz, and that the Turks had abandoned Saravas, a place of importance (cituated on the River Kiroz; That the late Governor of Zolnocke was by the Bassa of Waradin sent Prisoner to Adrianople, not for much for having abandoned that place, as for that he was Count Teckeley's great Confident; as for Feckeley, it's faid he will be carried to Constantinopte, and there put to death publickly, to content the People, who are greatly incenfed against the Authors of this War.
