Malta, Sept. 23.

OUR Gallies, eight in number, which have served this Summer in the Venetian Fleets, returned hither the 21 of this Month. The next day the heart of the Count de la Tour, who was slain in the Siege of *Gordon*, was solemnly Interred; We have lost in this Campaigne 19 Knights, and 300 Soldiers, and the sick and wounded are about the same number. In the division of the Spoil, we have got between 3 and 400 Slaves, and two pieces of Cannon, which were formerly taken from us by the *Turks*.

Rome, Nov. 3. The French Ambassador had on Monday last Audience of the Pope, to acquaint his Holiness with the Resolution the King his Master hath taken, with the approbation of the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*, to refer to his Arbitrage the Pretensions which the said Dutchess has, by the death of the late Elektor Palatine her Brother, upon the Allodial Lands of the Palatinate, &c. the said Ambassador declaring, That the chief Motive which had induced his most Christian Majesty to it, was, to take from the Princes of *Germany* all jealousy, and pretence of excusing themselves from sending their Troops to the assistance of the Emperor against the *Turks*; and adding, That for the same Reason his Majesty will not do any thing that may disturb the Peace of the Empire. The Pope received this Declaration with a great deal of satisfaction, and caused an Express to be dispatched the next day to Cardinal *Bonvisi* his Nuncio at *Vienna*, to impart the same to the Emperor. Yesterday Signior *Lando*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of *Venice*, had Audience of his Holiness, to give him an account of the late happy Successes of their Arms in the *Morea*. The Pope's Gallies which were sent with those of *Tuscany* and *Malta* to the assistance of the Venetians, are returned to *Civita Vecchia*.

Turin, Nov. 5. The Court of *Savoy* is expected here towards the end of this Month, from *Moncalier*. The Ambassadors of the *Suisse* Cantons of *Soleure*, are returned home extremely satisfied with their Reception and Entertainment here. The Count de *Magliano*, who was sent by the Duke of *Savoy*, to compliment the Emperor upon the Elektor of *Bavaria's* Marriage with the Archdutchess his Daughter, is returned from *Vienna*.

Venice, Nov. 2. A new Convoy of 10 Vessels is preparing here, under the Conduct of Signior *Giuseppe Morosini*, by which will be sent to the Fleet 1500 Soldiers, 3 or 400 Slaves for the Gallies, and a considerable Sum of Money; Twelve new Gallies, and three Men of War are building here, which will be finished against Spring. The

last Letters from the Fleet inform us, That Captain General *Morosini* had given Orders for the demolishing of *Passava*; and that he had sent the Troops of *Saxony* and *Brunswicke* to winter at *Corfou* and *Zant*.

Vienna, Nov. 3. We have an account from Upper *Hungary*, that the Baron de *Mercy* having put a Garison of 2000 Men, into *Zolnocke*, he patrolled the *Theys*, and sending out Parties to learn news of the Enemy, one of them took a Countrey Fellow who was going with a Letter from the Governor of *Sarava*, to the *Bassa* of *Temiswaer*, to demand a speedy supply of 1000, without which he let the *Bassa* know he was not in a condition to defend the place, in case the Christians should attack it; whereupon the Baron de *Mercy* and Colonel *Heuser* directed their march thither, and arriving near the place, understood the *Turks* had abandoned it: They found there 27 Pieces of Cannon, with a considerable quantity of Ammunition and Provisions, and a great deal of Forage; our Horse and Dragoons were immediately sent in pursuit of the Garison, and overtaking them, killed 250, and took 45 Prisoners, the rest saving themselves by the favour of the Woods, and other places of difficult access; *Sarava* is a Fortress built by the *Turks* since *Teckeleys* Rebellion, is situated on the River *Kisboz*, which falls into the *Theys* about five German Miles from *Zolnocke*; and by the Acquisition of it, the two Provinces of *Taramaliens* and *Czongradientz*, which have for many years been possessed by the *Turks*, are reduced to the Emperor's obedience, the Inhabitants having sent Deputies to General *Mercy*, to offer to supply his Forces with Provisions, and what else their Countrey affords, and to assure him that they are ready to take an Oath of Fidelity to the Emperor. We have likewise advice, that *Debreccen*, a very rich and populous Town, hath sent three Deputies to General *Mercy* at *Sarava*, to assure him of their Fidelity to his Imperial Majesty, and to pray he will please to take them under his Protection; This City has, during all the late Troubles in *Hungary*, preserved a Neutrality; having suffered both the Judges appointed by the Emperor, and those established by the Port, to exercise their Authority. The Marschal de Camp General *Caprara* has put 4000 Men into *Caschaw*, and has sent a Detachment to join the Baron de *Mercy* and Colonel *Heuser*, who, before they go into their Winter-quarters, will return towards *Agria*, and destroy all the Countrey round it, that the Garison may not be able to subsist this Winter; the said General has sent another Detachment, to summos the Castles of *Mongatz* and *Ungwar*. The Troops of *Lunenburg* have begun their march homewards, but it's

said

said they will return early in the Spring; all the principal Officers have been presented with Gold Chains and Medals, and Money has been distributed among the inferior Officers and Soldiers. The Prince of *Transylvania* is sending an Envoy hither to mediate, as is given out, a Peace between the Emperor and the *Turks*, but it's believed he intends under that pretence to negotiate other matters that more nearly concern himself. The *Turkish* Aga who was twice sent by the *Seraskier* to the Duke of *Lorraine*, is again arrived at *Comorray* and has desired leave to come hither, being charged with new Proposals of Peace; but we are told he will be sent back without being heard, for that the Emperor will not enter into any Negotiation without the knowledge and concurrence of his Allies.

Vienna, Nov. 11. The account we had of the *Imperialists* having possessed themselves of *Saravos*, is confirmed; There was in the place 3000 *Turks*, who abandoned it upon the approach of our Troops. General *Mercy* and Colonel *Hensler* in their march towards the *Theys* took *Ibrau*, *Onoth*, *Mibeltelecke*, *Nagmial*, *Sicalo*, *Oran*, and some other Castles and places, into all which they have put Garisons. And we have advice, that the Fortrefs of *Mongatz* is surrendered to the Detachment which General *Caprara* sent thither, the Prince's *Rogotzi*, Count *Tockeley's* Wife, having, it's said, upon the news he had of their march, left the place, and retired towards *Poland*. The Emperor has given the Regiment of which the Prince of *Wirtemberg* (who was killed before *Caschau*) was Colonel, to the Marquis *Spinola*.

Hamburg, Nov. 15. They write from *Hannover*, that the Sieur *Grankou* was arrived there in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and that the Duke of *Hannover* had named Commissioners to confer with him. The Letters from *Dresden* and *Berlin*, confirm that the Electors of *Saxony* and *Brandenburg* have promised to assist the Emperor with 10000 Men the next Summer. We are told that the King of *Sweden* intends in the Spring to transport some Troops to his Territories in *Germany*. The Deputies of this City are arrived at *Vienna*, and have written to our Magistrates, that they have great hopes they shall succeed in the Business they were sent upon. The differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City are not yet composed.

The Letters from *Poland* give an Account, That the *Turks* and *Tartars* having environed the Army of *Poland* (whom they very much exceeded in number) to cut off their Retreat, and having already very much frightned them, the *Poles* resolved to attack one of the Enemies Quarters, thereby to open a way for their Retreat, which they performed with that courage and resolution; that they gained their design with little loss on their side, though of the Enemy above 1000 were killed, and many Prisoners and part of their Baggage taken.

Cologne, Nov. 20. The Magistrates of this City having privately resolved to send one of their Body to *Vienna*, to sollicite their Affairs at that Court, he accordingly parted from hence the last week, with Orders to make all the haste he could in his Journey; but it's believed he will hardly obtain Audience of the Emperor, seeing he has undertaken this Commission without the knowledge of the Imperial Commissioners here. The 15th

instant the said Commissioners summoned three Burghers of this City, named *Biesen*, *Bochemer* and *Koningsfelt*, to appear before them in 24 hours, upon pain, in case they did not, of the Imperial Ban. The Duke of *Lorraine* arrived the 12th of this Month at *Tisprucke*, where he will pass the Winter. They write from *Vienna*, that great Magazines are providing in *Hungary* for the next Campaigne.

Brussels, Nov. 20. The Baron *del Val*, whom his Excellency sent lately to *Paris*, has, we hear, presented a Memorial to his most Christian Majesty about the Seizures made in the New Conquests, to which he was expecting an Answer. The Convoy from *Cadiz* is arrived at *Ostend*. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 8th instant, give an account of the Surrender of the strong Castle of *Mongatz*, and that the *Turks* had abandoned *Saravos*, a place of importance situated on the River *Kiroz*; That the late Governor of *Zolnocke* was by the *Bassa* of *Waradin* sent Prisoner to *Adrianople*, not so much for having abandoned that place, as for that he was Count *Tockeley's* great Confident; as for *Tockeley*, it's said he will be carried to *Constantinople*, and there put to death publicly, to content the People, who are greatly incensed against the Authors of this War.
