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Madrid, Novemb. 8.

THE 6th instant, being our King's Birth-day, when He entred into his 25th year, all the Nobility and Foreign Ministers made their Compliments to his Majesty, as likewise to the Queen and the Queen-Mother. The Prince *de Gonzague* having resigned the place of President of the Council of the *Indies*, the King, it's said, has given it to the Marquis *de los Feles*. The Duke *d'Offuna* will, it's believed, be made General of the Gallies of this Kingdom, and the Conde *de Banos* Viceroy of *Galicia*. The Heer *Van Heemskerke*, Ambassador from the *States General*, has presented a Memorial, to demand the Restitution of the *Dutch* Fly-Boats which were some time since carried into *Cadix*, by the Viceadmiral *Pachino*, on pretence that they were laden with Contraband Goods.

Milan, Novemb. 7. The Count *de Melgar* our Governor is now at *Genoua*, to confer with the Marquis *de Cogolludo*, General of the Gallies of *Naples* which are at present in that Port. His Excellency before he went thither, received Orders from *Spain* to reform 20 Companies of Foot, and several Troops of Horse of the Forces in this State; and to send besides 200 Foot to *Catalonia*.

Venice, Novemb. 13. The Advices we receive from the *Levant*, speak of a great Commotion at *Constantinople*, which, it's said, was begun by the *Greeks*, for that the *Caimacan* had forbid them to drink Wine at a Feast they yearly celebrate, which they always used to do on that day; and that it went so far, that the *Caimacan* was obliged, for his security, to get an extraordinary Guard about his House: It is added, That the *Fanariens* grow very mutinous, and that even at *Adrianople* they have cut off some of their chief Officers. This is certain, That things are in greater Disorder throughout the whole *Ottoman* Empire, than can well be described; and that all sorts of People make Imprecations against the Authors of this War.

Venice, Novemb. 15. By Letters from *Prevesa*, of the 27th past, we have advice, That Captain General *Morosini* was gone with the Gallies to the *Golfe of Arsa*, but it was not known upon what design. The great Convoy, by which 100 thousand *Zechins*, and a great quantity of Provisions and Ammunition of all sorts is sent to the Fleet, sailed from hence on Thursday last. Four Men of War and 12 Gallies are fitting out here against the Spring. Commissions will be given out for the raising several new Regiments, with which, and the farther assistance the Elector of *Saxony* has promised to give the Republick, our Forces by Land will, we are told, be made above 10 thousand Men more than they were this last Campaign; It is said they will be commanded under the Capt. General,

by Count *Coningsmarke*, and that the Ambassador of this State at *Vienna* hath lately made an Agreement with him for that purpose. The *Imperial* Ambassador here has lately had an Audience of the Senate, to assure them, That the Emperor will not enter upon any Treaty of Peace with the *Turks*, without the knowledge and concurrence of this Republick. The Master of a Vessel arrived here from *Zant*, reports, That a *French* Tartane had brought News thither, That the Captain *Bassa* having sent 4 Gallies with Succors to *Candia*, they had been separated by a Storm, and that one of them, in which was the *Bassa* of *Negroponte*, being met by the Privateer *Manetta*, was taken by him; of which we must expect a confirmation.

Vienna, Novemb. 15. We begin to prepare for the next Campaign, which, it's said, will be begun very early, and with greater Armies than the Emperor has yet had in the Field since the present War. On the other side we are assured, That there is a general Fear and Conternation among the *Turks*; That all their Efforts to raise Men, prove very unsuccessful; and, in a word, That their Affairs are in that Condition, that nothing but a Peace can restore them; which they therefore very earnestly desire, as appears by the repeated Overtures they have lately made to this Court, but the Emperor will not hearken to them, declaring, He will not make a Peace, but with the Inclusion and Satisfaction of his Allies. We have not, of late, received any Letters from *Upper Hungary*, which do not give an account of the taking of some place or other by the *Imperialists*: The last told us, That they had made themselves Masters of *Gyula*, situated between *Agria* and *Waradin*; and that the Count *de Seacke* had taken a Castle, in which he found all *Teckel's* Horses, and 12000 Ducats in Money. The Prince of *Transylvania* has, we are told, written to the Emperor, to pray him to give Order, that the *Imperial* Forces may not commit any Hostilities against his Territories: And, it's said farther, that this Prince will quit his Engagements with the *Turks*, and enter into an Alliance with his *Imperial* Majesty.

Vienna, Novemb. 18. The *Sieur Minischi* is gone by the Emperor's Order to *Comorra*, to receive the Letter which the *Turkish* Aga has for his *Imperial* Majesty, and what he is farther charg'd with. The Princess *Ragotzi* having sent to General *Caprara*, to let him know, that she would submit herself to the Emperor, and to desire him to employ his good offices on her behalf, and the said General having accordingly written thither, his *Imperial* Majesty has granted her his Pardon, which was sent by the last Courier to General *Caprara*, with a power to him, to allow to all that shall demand it, the benefit of the General Amnestic, upon which, it's not doubted but that those of *Teckel's* Party who are not yet come in, will likewise return to their Duty and Obedience to his *Imperial* Majesty.

The 16th instant arrived here Count Zichbi from Raab, with an account, that the Governor of *Vesprin* being informed, that several Wagons and Mules were going to *Buda* with Provisions and Cloaths for that Garrison, under a Guard of 300 *Turks*, commanded by the Visier of *Buda's* Lieutenant, he sent out 180 *Hussars*, who laying themselves in an Ambush, fell upon the said Convoy on the 8th instant, and after a sharp Fight, defeated the Enemy, about 50 of them being slain, and 30, with the Officer that commanded them taken, and the rest put to flight, and that the said *Hussars* were returned to *Vesprin* with their Prisoners and Booty; he adds, that the *Hussars* of *Raab* had cut off a small party of *Turks*, of whom twelve were killed, and 8 taken Prisoners.

Municke, *Novemb. 13.* The Marquis de Bel-fonds arrived here the first of this month, being sent by the Dauphin, to compliment the Elector of *Bavaria* upon his Marriage; The same Evening he had Audience of their Electoral Highnesses, and the next day of Prince *Joseph* of *Bavaria*, his Electoral Highnesses Brother, and of the Princess his Sister. The Duke of *Lorrain* is now at *In-sprucke*, and intends, we are told, to come hither, to make our Elector a Visit. The Letters from *Vienna* continue to give us a very good account of Affairs in *Hungary*, where the *Imperialists* have within these two Months possessed themselves of above 20 Castles, and other places, in which the *Turks* or Rebels had Garrisons. The *Imperial* Troops in *Croatia* are gone into their Winter-quarters, the *Turks* being likewise retired to theirs; The latter fortified the Town of *Effeck*, and have put a Company of Provisions in *Canisfa*. The Cities of *Ums*, *Ausburg*, *Ratisbonne*, and *Nu-remberg*, have made very rich Presents to our Elector upon his Marriage.

Co.ogne, *November 27.* The *Imperial* Sub-Commissioners have now before them several Complaints made against our present Magistrates, who have given an Answer to them in writing, wherein they endeavour to justify all they have done in the matters in question. *Gulicke*, *Sacks* and *Mechowin* remain in the mean time under close Imprisonment at *Dusseldorpe*, the said Commissioners expecting the Emperor's farther directions concerning them. The States of this Arch-bishoprick are now assembled to raise Money for the maintaining the Forces of our Elector, which are employed in the War against the *Turks*, besides which, it is said, his Electoral Highness will raise two new Regiments of Horse for the Emperor's Service. The *Lunenburgh* Troops that served in *Hungary* this Campaign, are returning home; but those of *Franconia*, and *Suabia*, are to have their Winter-quarters in the Hereditary Countries. They write from *Hungary*, That the strong Castles of *Mongatz*, and *Ungwar* are surrendered to the *Imperialists*.

Hamburg, *Novemb. 19.* The differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City will we hope be now very quickly composed, through the Interposition of the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, whose Minister the *Sieur Kaminiz* is at present here endeavouring to dispose our Magistrates to yield in some Points, which occasion the difficulties that still remain in this matter. The Letters from *Poland* confirm the account we gave you in our last, That the Forces of that Crown had repulsed the *Niaster*, and were going into their Winter-quarters, and that the *Turks* were retired towards the *Danube*. The Letters add, That the King of *Poland* has given Orders for the recruiting his Troops, resolving to be himself early in the Field the next Summer, and that *Solinsky*, General of the re-

volted *Cossacks*, who was lately taken Prisoner at *Soborlitz*, had been brought to *Lemburg*.

Hague, *Novemb. 30.* The States of *Holland*, who met the 23^d instant, having adjourned for 2 or 3 days, are now again assembled. There is a discourse of increasing the Forces of this State by Land, and of fitting out a Squadron of Ships against the Spring. The Baron *Bodelwincke* parted from hence yesterday, on his return to *Berlin*; and the Heer *Stille*, sent hither by the Elector of *Brandenburgh* to receive the first payment of the Arrears of Subsidies, in pursuance of the Treaty lately concluded between his Electoral Highness and this State, will be dispatched in few days. The last Letters from *Vienna* told us, That it was believed the *Imperialists* would endeavour to make themselves Masters of *Agria*, or *Great Wladin*, before they went into their Winter-quarters.

Paris, *Novemb. 28.* The Ambassador of *Poland* is preparing to take his leave, in order to his return home. The Mar schal de *Villeroy* lies very ill. The *Algierines* have taken a Vessel belonging to *Genoua*, on the Coast of *Provence*.
