Madrid, Novemb. 8. HE 6th instant, being our King's Birth-day, when He entred into his 25th year, all the Nobility and Foreign Ministers made their Complimen s to his Ma esty, as likewile to the Queen and the Queen-Mother. The Prince -de Gonzague having resigned the place of President of the Council of the Indies, the King, it's faid, has given it to the Marquis de los Feles. The Duke d'Ossuna will, it's believed, be made Gensal of the Gallies of this Kingdom, and the Conde de Banos Viceroy of Gulicia. The Heer Van Heemskerke, Ambassador from the States General, has p esented a Memorial, to demand the Restitution of the Dutch Fly-Boats which were some time fince carri d into Cadiz, by the Viceadmiral Papacking, on pretence that they were laden with Controband Goods,

Milan, Novemb 7. The Count de Melgar our Governor is now at Genoua, to co fer with the Marquis de Cogolludo, General of the Gallies of Naples which are at present in that Port. His Excellency before he went thither, received Orders from Spain to reform 20 Companies of Foot, and several Troops of Horse of the Forces in this State; and to send besides 200 Foot to Cata-

Venice, Novemb. 13. The Advices we receive from the Levant, speak of a great Commotion at Constantinople, which, it's said, was begun by the Greeks, for that the Caimacan had forbid them to drink Wine at a Feast they yearly celebrate, which they always used to do on that day; and that it went so far, that the Caimacan was obliged, for his security, to get an extraordina-ty Guard about his House: It is added, That the Fanisaries grow very mutinous, and that even at Adrianople they have cut off some of their chief Officers. This is certain, That things are in greater Disorder throughout the whole Ottoman Empire, than can well be described; and that all sorts of People make Imprecations against the Authors of this War.

Venice, Novemb. 16. By Letters from Prevefa, of the 27th past, we have advice, That Captain General Morofisi was gone with the Gallies to the Golfe of Arta, but it was not known upon what delign. The great Convoy, by which too thoufand Zechins, and a great quantity of Provisions and Ammunition of all fores is fent to the Flee. failed from hence on Thursday last. Four M-n of War and 12 Gallies are fitting out here against the Spring. Commissions will be given out for the raifing several new Regiments, with which, and the farther affiftance the Elector of Saxony has promiled to give the Republick, our Forces by Land will, we are told, be made above to thousand Men more than they were this last Campagne; It is said they will be commanded under the Capt, General,

by Count Coningsmarke, and that the Ambassador of this State at Vienna hath lately made an Agreement with him for that purpole. The Imperial Ambaflador here has lately had an Audi noe of the Senate, to affure them, That the Emperor will not enter upon any Treaty of Peace with the Turks. without the knowledge and concurrence of this Republick. The Moffer of a Vessel arrived here from Zant, reports. That a French Tartane had brought News thicher, That the Captain Bassa having fent 4 Gallies with Succors to Candia, they had been separated by a Storm, and that one of them, in which was the Balla of Negroponte, being met by the Privateer Manetta, was taken by him; of

which we must expect a confirmation.

Vienna, Novemb. 15. We begin to prepare for the next Campagne, which, it's faid, will be begun very carly, and with greater Armies than the Emperor has yet had in the Field fince the present War. On the other fide we are affored, That there is a general Fear and Consternation among the Turks; That all their Efforts to raise Men, prove very unsuccessful; and, in a word, That their Affairs are in that condition, that nothing but a Peace can restore them; which they there-fore very earnessly d fire, as appears by the repeated Overtures they have lately made to this Court, but the Emperor will not hearken to them, declaring, He will not make a Peace, but with the Inclusion and Satisfaction of his Allies. We have not, of late, received any Letters from Upper Hungary, which do not give an account of the taking of some place or other by the Imperialists of The last told us, That they had made themselve. Masters of Gyula, scituated between Agria and Waradin; and that the Count de Seacke had taken a Catile, in which he found all Teckel y's Horses, and 12000 Ducats in Money. The Prince of Transituania has, we are rold, written to the Emperor, to pray him to give Order, that the Imperial Forces may not commit any Hossilities against his Territories: And, it's said farther, that this Prince will quit his Engagements with the Turks, and enterinto an Alliance with his Imperial Majesty.

Vienna, Novemb. 18. The Sicur Mininschi is
