Madrid, Novemb. 8. HE 6th inftant, being our King's Birth-day, when He entred into his 25th year, all the Nobility and Foreign Ministers made their Complimen s to his Ma effy, as likewile to the Queen and the Queen-Mother. The Prince -de Gonzague having refigned the place of Prefident of the Council of the Indies, the King, it's faid, has given it to the Marquis de los Feles. The Duke d'Offuna will, it's believed, be made Gen-The sal of the Gallies of this Kingdom, and the Conde de Banos Viceroy of Galicia. The Heer Van Heemskerke, Ambassador from the States General, has p clented a Memorial, to demand the Reflitution of the Dutch Fly-Boats which were fome time fince carri d into Cadiz, by the Viceadmiral Papachino, on pretence that they were laden with Contreband Goods,

Milan, Novemb 7. The Count de Melgar our Governor is now at Genoua, to co fer with the Marquis de Cogolludo, General of the Gallies of Naples which are at prefent in that Port. His Excellency before he went thither, received Orders from Spain to reform 20 Companies of Foot, and feveral Troops of Horfe of the Forces in this State; and to fend befides 200 Foot to Catalonia.

Venice, Novemb. 13. The Advices we receive from the Levans, fpeak of a great Commotion at Constantinople, which, it's faid, was begun by the Greeks, for that the Caimacan had forbid them to drink Wine at a Feast they yearly celebrate, which they always used to do on that day; and that it went fo far, that the Caimacan was obliged, for his fecurity, to get an extraordinaty Guard about his House: It is added, That the Fanisaries grow very mutinous, and that even at Advianople they have cut off fome of their chief Officers. This is certain, That things are in greater Diforder throughout the whole Ottoman Empire, than can well be deferibed; and that all forts of People make Imprecations against the Authors of this War.

Venice, Novemb. 15. By Letters from Prevela, of the 27th paft, we have advice, That Captain General Morofini was gone with the Gallies to the Golfe of Arta, but it was flot known upon what defign. The great Coavoy, by which 100 thoufand Zeebins, and a great quantity of Provisions and Ammunition of all forts is fent to the Fleer, failed from hence on Thurfday laft. Four Man of War and 12 Gallies are fitting out here agains the Spring. Commificions will be given out for the raifing feveral new Regiments, with which, and the farther affiftance the Elector of Saxony has promifed to give the Republick, our Forces, by Land will, we are told, be made above 10 thoufand Men more than they were this laft Campagne; It is faid they will be commanded under the Capt, General,

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by Count Coning marke, and that the Amballador of this State at Vienna hath lately made an Agreement with him for that purpole. The Imperial Amballador here has lately had an Audience of the Senate, to allure them, That the Emperor will not enter upon any Treaty of Peace with the Turks, without the knowle ige and concurrence of this Republick. The Mafter of a Veifel arrived here from Zant, reports, That a French Tartane had brought News thither, That the Captain Balla having fent 4 Gallies with Succors to Candia, they had been feparated by a Storm, and that one of them, in which was the Balla of Negroponte, being met by the Privateer Manetta, was taken by him; of which we mult expect a confirmation.

which we mult expect a confirmation. Vienna, Novemb. 15. We begin to prepare for the next Campagne, which, it's faid, will be begun very carly, and with greater Armies than the Emperor has yet had in the Field fince the prefent War. On the other fide we are affured, That there is a general Fear and Confernation among the Turks; That all their Efforts to raife Men, prove very unfuccefsful; and, in a word, That their Affairs are in that Condition, that nothing but a Peace can reftore them; which they there-fore very carnefly d fire, as appears by the repeated Overtures they have lately made to this Court, but the Emperor will not hearken to them, declaring, He will not make a Peace, but with the Inclusion and Satisfaction of his Allies. We have not, of late, received any Letters from Upper Hungary, which do not give an account of the taking of fome place or other by the Imperialifier The faft told us, That they had made themselve. Mafters of Gyula, feituated between Agria and Waradia; and that the Count de Scacke had taken a Calil, in which he found all Teckel y's Horles, and 12000 Ducats in Money: Th Prince of Tra-filuania has, we are fold, written to the Emperor, to prayhim to give Order, that the Imperial Forces may not commit any Hoffilities against his Territories : And, it's faid farther, that this Prince will quit his Engagements with the Turks, and enter into an

Alliance with his Imperial Mayelly. Vienna, Novemb. 18. The Sicur Mininfebi is gone by the Emperor's Order to Comorra, to receive the Letter which the Turkifb Aga has for his Imper Majelfy, and what he is farther charg'd with. The Princels Ragotzi having fent to General Caprara, to let him know, that the would fubmit her felf to the Emperor, and to defire him to employ his good offices on her behalf, and the faid General having accordingly written hither, his Imperial Majefty has granted her his Pardon, which was fent by the 'laft Courier' to General Capara', with a power to him, to allow to all that thall demand it, the benefit of the General Amnefite, upon which, it's not doubted but that thole of Teckeley's Party who are not yet come ift, will likewife: return to their Duty and Obedigece to his Imperial Majefty.
