

distinct body, under the Command of a General Officer appointed by his Electoral Highness. The Emperor has given the Regiment lately Commanded by the Prince de Wirtemberg who was killed in the Siege of Caffow, to the Marquis Spinola Lieutenant Colonel of Count Leslies Regiment. General Schuitz who returned hither from Upper Hungary upon General Caprara's being appointed to Command in Chief the Emperors Forces on that side has it's said taken Leave to retire on account of his great age. The last week were sent from hence 2000 Bombs and Carcasses with a very great quantity of Powder and Bullets for Hungary, where Magazines are prevailing in several places against the next Campaign. The Clergy of the Hereditary Countries have sent hither their Contributions for the War against the Turks.

Ratisbonne, Novemb. 13. The affairs of the Dyets here of late had some Interruption by the difference between the Electoral Colledge, and the Count de Winditzgratz one of the Imperial Commissioners. The latter pretends to be named in the Conclusions of the Empire, which are to be made to Compliment his Imperial Majesty upon the happy success of his Arms in Hungary, and the Birth of the young Arch-Duke, and the said Colledge insist, that their Conclusions ought to be only addressed to the Bishop of Passaw the Emperors principal Commissioner at the Dyet. Some Expedients have been proposed to remove this difficulty, but they have not been accepted, and there is a discourse that to put an end to this dispute the Count de Winditzgratz will be recalled. The last Letters from Vienna told us, that they had begun their Preparation for the next Campaign; That the Commissary General had orders to provide Magazines in the most considerable places of Hungary, and that care was taken to supply him with monies for that service. That the Turks had made Proposals of great advantage to the Emperor, but that his Imperial Majesty had in answer to them declared, that he would not enter upon any Treaty with them without his Allies the King of Poland and the Republick of Venice. And that the Cardinal Borvis the Popes Nuncio had assured his Imperial Majesty, that his Holiness would continue to give him all the assistance he was able for the carrying on the War. They write from Hungary that the Turks do fortifie several places in Croatia, and that it's believed they will act the next Summer with the best part of their Forces on that side. That the Garrison of Buda is in a very ill condition, wanting Provisions and other necessaries for their subsistence this Winter. And that the Basha who Commanded in Novigrad before the Turks abandoned that place, had been put in Irons for having had a Correspondence with Teckelej.

Cologne, Novemb. 27. The Emperor has written to our Elector to thank him for the Troops he sent this Summer to his assistance, and more particularly for his leaving one half of them to his Imperial Majesties disposal; They will we are told be put into some of the old Imperial Regiments to make them up their full number, and the other half are it's said to have their Winter-quarters in the Empire. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners meet every day to examine the Complaints made against our present Magistratos, and their answer to them, but it's believed they will come to no determination therein, till they have laid the matter before his Imperial Majesty, and received his directions thereupon. The three Prisoners at Dusseldorp have now more liberty than they were allowed at first, and some of their Friends are permitted to go to them.

Paris, Decemb. 1. The Count Wislopolski Great

Chancellor and Ambassador Extraordinary of Poland, had the 27th of the last month his Audience of Leave of the King at Versailles, being Conducted by the Count de Marsan, and the Introducer of Ambassadors. The 28th died here the Duke de Villeroy Marschal of France in the 88th year of his age. The Prince de la Roche Sur Ton has upon the death of his Brother taken upon him the Name of Conti. The Letters from Germany tell us, that the Turks, among other their Proposals of Peace, offer to put into the Emperors hands Buda and Agria.

Westminster, Novemb. 28. On Thursday last Charles Gerard Esq; commonly called the Lord Brandon, was brought to his Tryal at the Kings-Bench Bar, upon an Indictment of High Treason, For Conspiring with other false Traytors to Raise a Rebellion within this Kingdom and the late King of Ever Blessed Memory to depose, and to death and final destruction to bring, and the Ancient Government of this Kingdom to alter and subvert; of which he was upon a full Evidence found Guilty, and being then committed to the Tower, was this day brought again to the Kings-Bench-Bar, where Sentence of death passed upon him as in Cases of High Treason.
