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Madrid, November 24.

THEIR Catholick Majesties are still at the *Buen Retiro*, and it's believed will continue there till after *Christmas*. Orders have been sent to the Viceroy of *Naples*, to permit the Republick of *Venice* to raise 1000 Men in that Kingdom. The Troops that are reformed in the *Milaneze*. are ordered to be sent to *Catalonia*.

Genova, Novemb. 24. The Governor of *Milan* departed from hence the 21st instant, with an intention to return hither against the *Carnavall*. This week arrived here the *Zant* and *Resolution*, in 40 days from *Newfoundland*, where they have had a plentiful Fishing.

Leghorn, Novemb. 21. The 15th Instant in the Evening arrived in this Road the Gallies of *Spain, Naples* and *Sicily*: The Governor of this place sent an Officer to Complement the *Marquis de Cogollado*, who Commands them, and to let him know, that he would salute him the next morning with the same number of Guns as had been formerly practised; but the Wind being fair, the Gallies sailed again in the Night, being bound for *Naples*. By a Vessel arrived from *Tunis*, we are informed, That the two Brothers, *Haly* and *Mehemet Beys*, were Encamped with their Forces very near that City, which was defended by the *Dey Achmet*, who having discovered a Correspondence the *Beys* had in the Town, in order to surprize it, had cut off the Heads of several of the most considerable of the *Divan* and the Militia, whom he suspected of favouring that Design. The *Beys* are assisted by the Government of *Argiers*.

Cracow, Novemb. 11. The Forces of this Crown are gone into their Winter-quarters, which have been assigned them, as near as conveniently they could to the Frontiers. The King who is now at *Zolkiew*, has it's said summoned all the Senators of the Kingdom to meet the beginning of the next month, to consult about the Preparations for the next Campaign, and has in the mean time declared, that he will Command his Army in Person the next Summer, and that he intends to be in the Field towards the end of *April*, or the beginning of *May*. The Troops are at present in no very good condition, having suffered very much by the continual skirmishes and engagements they had with the *Turks* and *Tartars*, for 10 or 12 days together, and through the scarcity of Provisions, which, being advanced so far, as they were into the Enemies Country, they could not without great difficulty be supplied with. The Colonels have Orders to make all the haste they can to recruit their several Regiments, and it's said Commissions will be given out for a further Levy both of Horse and Foot. The Ambassadors designed for *Moscovy*, have orders to hasten their departure, upon the

advice the King has received of the disposition the *Czars* are in, not only to determine amicably the differences that have so long depended about the Limits, but farther to make a perpetual Peace, and defensive Alliance with this Crown. There are Letters from *Lemburgh*, which say the *Turks* have besieged *Niemirow*, where General *Mohila* is with a good Garison of *Cossacks*; if this news be confirmed, it will oblige our Forces to take the Field again to relieve this place, which is of no small importance.

Vienna, Novemb. 29. The *Sieur Meninski* the Emperors chief Interpreter, is come back from *Comorra*. He had Orders to open the Letter the *Aga Achmet* was charged with, which he did; and having Interpreted it, sent it hither, with an Account, That the *Aga* had declared to him, That the *Grand Signior* did desire to Re-establish a Peace or Truce between the two Empires, and wished his Imperial Majesty would send Commissioners to *Buda* or *Constantinople*, to begin a Negotiation for that purpose; adding, That the *Visier* of *Buda* had in the mean time Orders not to exercise any Hostilities against the Imperial Troops; and that Count *Teckelej* had been Seized by the *Grand Signiors* Command, as being the Author of this War, and all the Calamities that have attended it. The *Visier* of *Buda's* Letter was much to the same effect: Upon which, Directions have been sent to the *Sieur Meninski* to return, as we are told, this Answer to the *Aga*; That the Emperor did not intend to send Commissioners or any other Ministers to the Port; nor to enter into any Negotiation of Peace or Truce, without the participation of his Allies. The Envoy from the Prince of *Transylvania* continues to sollicite an Exemption of Quarters on the behalf of several Villages on the Frontiers of *Hungary*, which belong to that Principality, and offers in lieu thereof to furnish a certain quantity of Forage and Provisions for the Imperial Troops. The *Chevalier de Lubomirski* has quitted his Regiment, and in consideration thereof, the Emperor has given him a yearly Pension of 3000 Crowns; It is said, that the said Regiment with those of *Thann, Holstein, Richardi* and *Keri*, will be reform'd and incorporated into other Regiments, which are not compleat. His Imperial Majesty has declared the Prince of *Savoy* and Colonel *Nigrelli* Major Generals of Foot. Count *Leslie* being very infirm, has desired leave to retire; and it's believed the Count *de Staremberg* will Command the Imperial Forces in *Croatia* the next Campaign. The Treaty with the Elector of *Saxony*, about the Troops he has offered to assist the Emperor with against the *Turks*, is not yet perfected. There is a like Negotiation on foot with the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and with the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*. The Princess *Ragotzi* is unwilling to put the Castle of *Mongatz* into the Hands of the Imperialists, having all her Richea there, and several

ral of the chief of the Rebels, who are retired thither with their Money and the best of their Goods, endeavour to keep her in that resolution. Upon which General Caprara has sent some Troops thither, who can only block up the said Castle, for its situation is such, that it is impossible to bring any Cannon to Attack it in this Season.

Ratisbome, Decemb. 2. The last Letters from Hungary tell us, that the Baron de Mercy and Colonel Heusler, had put their Troops into their Winter-quarters; that there was a Garrison of 2000 Men in Zuloock, and that the Emperor had given the Government of that place to Colonel Heusler. That General Caprara had sent 3000 Men to block up the Castle of Mongatz, upon the Princes Rigotzi's refusing to receive an Imperial Garrison. That there was a report, that the Turks had abandoned Giulia; And that they were preparing to do the like at Agria but this needs a confirmation. The Letters from Vienna speak of the great preparations that are making for the next Campaign, and assure us, that the Imperialists will be very early in the Field, and that the Emperor will have two Armies in Hungary, one Commanded by the Elector of Bavaria, and the other by the Duke of Lorraine.

Francfort, Decemb. 4. The States of the Circle of Suabia are to meet this week at Ulm, to settle the Winter-quarters for their Troops, which are returned from Hungary, as well as to take the necessary Resolutions concerning the recruiting them again for the next Campaign.

Hamburg, Decemb. 6. The Count de Noftitz, Ambassador from the Emperor to the King of Sweden, arriv'd here some days ago; He has sent his Train to Lubbeck, to Embark there for Stockholm, whither he intends to go himself by Land. The differences between the Duke of Zell and this City continue in the same State. The Baron de Kaunitz the Brandenburg Minister, is not returned to Berlin as was reported, but it's believed he will be very suddenly recalled, because of the great difficulties he meets with in this Negotiation. The Electoral Prince and Prince's of Brandenburg are arriv'd at Hanover. They write from Stockholm, That the King of Sweden has given the Velt Marschal Coningsmarke leave to Command the Forces of the Republick of Venice the next Campaign, according to the Agreement he lately made with the Venetian Ambassador at Vienna.

Amsterdam, Decemb. 10. We have had of late a great deal of bad weather, and we hear of several Ships being cast away on our Coasts, most of which came from the Baltick. The Ships from Archangel are come in, except two, which it's feared are lost. By a Vessel arriv'd from the West-Indies, we have advice, that the Spanish Fleet sailed the 16th of July last from Panama for Lima, but that the Mars will not be kept at Porto Vello till January next so that the Gallies cannot be expected in Spain till June or July following.

Bague, Decemb. 11. The Heer van Dieft Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, had the 7th instant a Conference with the Deputies of the Stat's General, but it is not said what was the subject of it. The States of Holland being adjourn'd to the 17th of this month, as we told you in our last, the Deputies of the Admiralties are likewise gone home Great endeavours are using to reconcile the differences between the Count de Bentem and his two Sons, about the succession of the County of that Name, the Elector of Brandenburg as well as this State employing their Mediation for that purpose. The last Letters from Vienna told us, that the Imperial Troops were every where gone into their Winter-quarters, except a detachment

of between 3 and 4000 Men, which General Caprara had sent to Mongatz, to oblige the Princes of Rigotzi to receive an Imperial Garrison into that Castle; And that they are making preparations at Vienna for a very early Campaign the next year. They write from Berlin, that the Elector of Brandenburg intends to raise several new Regiments against Spring.

Paris, Decemb. 15. The Ambassador of Poland having had his Audiences of Leave, is preparing for his departure from hence; Six Frigats are fitting at Brest and Rochefort, designed it's believed for the West-Indies. The differences between the Innhabitants of Anduze and those of Fontevabie, &c, it's said, is again composed. The Letters from Germaoy, tell us, that the Elector of Brandenburg intends to assist the Emperor with 7000 Men the next Campaign, and the Margrave of Hesse Cassel with 4000; That the States of Suabia and Franconia have resolved to increase their Forces at present in his Imperial Majesty's service. And that the Elector of Bavaria intends to be in the Spring at the head of a very good Army in Hungary.
