

ral of the chief of the Rebels, who are retired thither with their Money and the best of their Goods, endeavour to keep her in that resolution. Upon which General Caprara has sent some Troops thither, who can only block up the said Castle, for its situation is such, that it is impossible to bring any Cannon to Attack it in this Season.

Ratisbome, Decemb. 2. The last Letters from Hungary tell us, that the Baron de Mercy and Colonel Heusler, had put their Troops into their Winter-quarters; that there was a Garrison of 2000 Men in *Zulnoch*, and that the Emperor had given the Government of that place to Colonel Heusler. That General Caprara had sent 3000 Men to block up the Castle of *Mongatz*, upon the Princes *Rigozzi's* refusing to receive an Imperial Garrison. That there was a report, that the Turks had abandoned *Giula*; And that they were preparing to do the like at *Agria* but this needs a confirmation. The Letters from *Vienna* speak of the great preparations that are making for the next Campaign, and assure us, that the Imperialists will be very early in the Field, and that the Emperor will have two Armies in Hungary, one Commanded by the Elector of *Bavaria*, and the other by the Duke of *Lorraine*.

Francfort, Decemb. 4. The States of the Circle of *Suabia* are to meet this week at *Ulm*, to settle the Winter-quarters for their Troops, which are returned from Hungary, as well as to take the necessary Resolutions concerning the recruiting them again for the next Campaign.

Hamburg, Decemb. 6. The Count de *Nostitz* Ambassador from the Emperor to the King of *Sweden*, arriv'd here some days ago; He has sent his Train to *Lubeck*, to Embark there for *Stockholm*, whither he intends to go himself by Land. The differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City continue in the same State. The Baron de *Kaunitz* the *Brandenburg* Minister, is not returned to *Berlin* as was reported, but it's believed he will be very suddenly recalled, because of the great difficulties he meets with in this Negotiation. The Electoral Prince and Prince's of *Brandenburg* are arriv'd at *Hanover*. They write from *Stockholm*, That the King of *Sweden* has given the Velt *Marschal* *Coningsmarke* leave to Command the Forces of the Republick of *Venice* the next Campaign, according to the Agreement he lately made with the *Venetian* Ambassador at *Vienna*.

Amsterdam, Decemb. 10. We have had of late a great deal of bad weather, and we hear of several Ships being cast away on our Coasts, most of which came from the *Baltick*. The Ships from *Archangel* are come in, except two, which it's feared are lost. By a Vessel arriv'd from the *West-Indies*, we have advice, that the *Spanish* Fleet sail'd the 16th of *July* last from *Panama* for *Lima*, but that the *Mart* will not be kept at *Porto Vello* till *January* next so that the *Gallies* cannot be expected in *Spain* till *June* or *July* following.

Hague, Decemb. 11. The Heer *Van Dieft* Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, had the 7th instant a Conference with the Deputies of the Stat's General, but it is not said what was the subject of it. The States of *Holland* being adjourn'd to the 17th of this month, as we told you in our last, the Deputies of the Admiralties are likewise gone home Great endeavours are using to reconcile the differences between the Count de *Bentem* and his two Sons, about the succession of the County of that Name, the Elector of *Brandenburg* as well as this State employing their Mediation for that purpose. The last Letters from *Vienna* told us, that the Imperial Troops were every where gone into their Winter-quarters, except a detachment

of between 3 and 4000 Men, which General *Caprara* had sent to *Mongatz*, to oblige the Princes of *Rigozzi* to receive an Imperial Garrison into that Castle; And that they are making preparations at *Vienna* for a very early Campaign the next year. They write from *Berlin*, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* intends to raise several new Regiments against Spring.

Paris, Decemb. 15. The Ambassador of *Poland* having had his Audiences of Leave, is preparing for his departure from hence; Six Frigats are fitting at *Brest* and *Rochefort*, designed it's believed for the *West-Indies*. The differences between the Innhabitants of *Anduze* and those of *Fonsabie*, &c. it's said, is again compos'd. The Letters from *Germany*, tell us, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* intends to assist the Emperor with 7000 Men the next Campaign, and the Margrave of *Hesse Cassel* with 4000; That the States of *Suabia* and *Franconia* have resolv'd to increase their Forces at present in his Imperial Majesty's service. And that the Elector of *Bavaria* intends to be in the Spring at the head of a very good Army in *Hungary*.
