Madrid, Decemb. 6. Efferday the Lord Lanfdown, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majefty of Great Britain, had his first Audience. of the King and Queen. His Cathor lick Majefly has Named the Count de Melgar Governor of the Milaneze, to go his Ambaffador to the Pope. The Ambaffador of Holland continues his inftances for the Restitution of the Dutch Veffels which were fome time ago carried into Cadiz by the Vice Admiral Popachino, and there Confilcated with their Lading, on pretence that the Goods were Contraband, but has not yet obtained an answer to his fatisfaction. Some new diforders having lately happened on the Frontiers, between the French [and the Inhabitants of Fonterabia, of which the French Ambailador at this Court has complained, charging the latter with having been the Aggreffors, an Alcalde has been fent thither to enquire into the matter, and to caufe the Authors thereof to be exemplarily punished.

Genoua, Decemb. 1. This week arrived here the Dutch Convoy composed of seven great Ships, bound for Smirna. Two days ago came into this Port the Fohn with Poor Fack from Newfoundland. The Duke of Mantua, the Prince of Monaco and the Governor of Milss, are expected here against the Carnaval.

Marseilles, Decemb. 10. We have an account from Thoulon, that 14 Men of War are fitting out there with great diligence, with two Fireships and two or three Galiots which are to be Commanded by the Chevalier de Tourville. This Morning returned into this Port the three Gallies which have been these two months at Seuta. A Squadron of fifteen Gallies is ready to Sail from hence;

And there are eight new ones upon the Stocks. Vienna, Decemb. 6. The Emperor having Communicated the Proposals of Peace made by the Aga Scelebi to the King of Poland and the Republick of Venice, their refolutions thereupon are expected, that fo an answer may be returned in the name of all the Allies to the faid Aga, who con-tinues in the mean time at Comorra. The Euvoy that is here from the Prince of Transilvania has had feveral conferences with the Commissioners appointed by the Emperor to Treat with him, and we are not without hopes that that Prince will be brought to quit his Engagements with the Turks, and to put himfelf and his Country under the Pro-tection of his Imperial Majefty. We have an actection of his Imperial Majefty. count from Upper Hungary, that the Troops which General Caprara had fint to Montgate had appeared before that place, upon which the Rebels aban-doned the Town; and retired into the Caffle, but that the Imperialifis finding it a thing altogether impracticable to attack the faid Caffle to morrow to visit Louvaine and Leeume, which in the featon we are in, have contented themselves places he has not seen since his coming to the Go-

haff Palatin of Hungary feems inclined to refign the Government of the Bergh Towns ; if he docs, it's believed the Empercr will give it to Count Palfi, who we are affured has with others of the Principal Nobility of that Kingdom undertaken to bring into the Field the next Summer 10000 Hungarian Horle and 10000 Foot.

Vienna, Decemb. 9. The Count de Breiner, who was fent by the Emperor to Conduct the Lu-nenburgh Troops, that ferved in Hungary this laft Campagne, through the Imperial Territories, is come back. Part of the Cologne Troops and those of Suabia are likewife marching home to take their Winter-quarters in the Empire, but the lat-ter will return in the Spring. The Caffle of Montgatz is like to remain in the hands of the Rebels this Winter, being fecured by it's fituation, which is such, that it is impossible to bring any Cannon against it at this time of the year. The Princels Ragotzi all this while pretends a willing-nels to fubmit her felf to the Emperor, and endea-vors to excuse her not Surrendring of Montgatz, laying, It is not in her power to do it, for that the Garison there is absolutely Commanded by one of Count Teckeleys Officers, who pays them punctually, and flatters them with hopes of relief.

Cologne, Decemb, 15. The Imperial Sub-Com-millioners having the 12th inflant, received an Express from Vienna, repaired the next day to the Town-Houle, and fignified to the new Magiftrates, who were then affembled there, That they had Directions from bis Imperial Majefly to, reftore the Old Magiffrates, who were put out about three years ago in a diforderly and Tumultuous manner, and accordingly the two old Bugermasters Beywich and Wifebius, the Sindicks Cufeman and Hugo, with the relt that had been difplaced, were put again in poliefion of the Magiltracy, the new Magi-trates quietly submitting to the Emperors Orders therein, after which one of the Imperial Commiffioners made a Speech to the Magiffrates they had reftored, recommending to them a diligent care of the Publick Peace, and an Impartial Administra-tion of Justice. The Marquis de Torey Envoy Extraordinary from his most Christian Majesty to the King of Denmark, arrived the 30th of the last month at Ratisbonne, where he will make some thort flay, and then return home by the way of Strasbourgh. The States of Susbia were affembled the second of this month, to confider among other things of raising a Fond to recruit their Troops in the Emperors Service.

Bruffels, Decemb. 18. The States of this Pro-vince are now allembled here, in order to raile an Extraordinary Subfidy to be employed towards the payment of the General Officers of the Army. Our Governor General intends to go from hence to block it up at the pre out. Count d'Effer-1 vernment. The Marquils de Bedmapili daily ex-

p &cd here from Spain, most of his Servants being already arrived by Sea. The Prince de Waudemont continues in a ve y weak Condition without auy figs of Amendment. And the Prince de Rache hes dangeroufly ill at Mons. The Letters from Vienna of the 6th Instant tell us, That the Empsror with the Hungarian and Auxiliary Troops, will have 100 thouland fighting Mcn in the Pield the next Summer. They wite from Upper Hungary, that the chief of the Rebels in Monigatz do diffwade the Princels Ragotzi from fubmiting to the Emperor, giving her hopes of her Hufbands Liberty; which is much talked of, but as we have reason to be ieve, without any ground. These Letters add, that upon the advancing of the Imperial Troops towards Montgatz the Rebels retired from the Town into the Caffle, but finding afterwards that the Imperialists could not binguptheir Cannon, and that they were therefore drawn back, the Lungarians returned into the Town.

Bruffelles, Decemb. 21. His Excellency parted from hence this morning for Louvain and Leeuwe intending to be here again on Sunday or Monday The States of this Province have in comnext. pliance with his Excellencies demand, refolved to raife Fifty thousand Florins for a Months pay to the General Officers. Our Span h Letters, which came this day, tell us, that a very confiderable fum of mony will be very speedily remitted hither. That the Count de Melgar at present Govenor of Milan is appointed by the King of Spain to go his Ambaflador Extraordinary to the Pope. And that the Count de Monterey, the Duke d'Uzzeda, and the Duke de Bournonvilleare in Nomination for the Government of Milan. The Letters from Vienna of the 10th inflant, tell us, that the Prince's Ragotzi having fent to the King of Poland to defire his Interpolition with the Emperor on her behalf, his Majesty had refused to meddle therein, but had advised her to submit her

felf in time to his Imperial Majefty. Paris, Decemb 22 The 12th Inftant arrived here, the Marquils de la Pierre from Turin, with the News of the Dutchels of Savoy's being brought to bed of a young Princeis; He had the fame day Audience of the King, and of the Duke of Orleans, being prefented to them by the Marquifs Ferrero Ambaffador of Sayey. His most Christian Majesty has named the Marquifs d'Urfe, and the Duke of Orleans the Count de Tonnerre, to go and make their Compliments at the Court of Savoy on this occafion. The 20th of this month the Count de Lobcowitz Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor had his first Publick Audience of the King at Verfailles, being conducted by the Introductor of Amballadors. Signior Bapt. Nani is coming hither in the quali y of Ambaffador Extraordinary from the Republick of Veni e. The Letters from Germany tell us, that the Emperor and the Elector Pala'in, have confented to refer the differences between the faid Elector and the Dutchels of Orleans to the Popes Arbitrage,

This day Signior Zeno London, Decemb. 15. and Signior Giustiniani, Ambassadors Extraordinary from the Republick of Venice, made their Publick Entry, having been received at Depiford, by the Earl of Tarmouth, and Charles Cottrel Elq; Aflistant-Master of the Ceremonies, and brought by Water in the Kings Barge to the Tower ; At their Landing they were saluted with the ulual Discharge of the Cannon , and were ftom thence Conducted in His Majeflies Coach followed by four Coaches of their own, and a great many others with fix Horfes a-plece all in

Mourning, to the Houle appointed for their Enterrai ment in St. James-Square, where their Excellencies were Complimented from the King by my Lord Lumley; from the Queen by Her Majeilies Vice Cnamberlain; from the Queen Dowager, likewife by Her Vice-Chamberlain; and from their Royal Highneffes Prince George, and the Princels Ann, of Denmark, by the Mafters of their Horle.

The'r Excellencies Whitehall, Decemb. 18. Signior Zeno and ignior Giuftiniani, Amballadors Extraordinary from the Republick of Venice, had this Afternoon their Publick Audience of their Majeffics, to which they were Conducted by the Earl of Darby, and Sir Charles Coutrel Malter of the Ceremonics in the Kings Coach followed by their own and a great Irain of other Coaches with Six Horfes apiece, with all the other Honors that are given to Ambaffadors of Crowned Heads.

Whitehal, Decemb. 18. His Majesty has been pleafed to appoint the Right Honorable the Lord Viscount Tiviot, Colonel Robert Philips, and John Evelyn of Depeford Elgito execute the Office of Lord Privy Scal, during the absence of his Excellency the Earl of Clarendon' Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.
