

"Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," or under or by virtue of any other power or authority vested in them by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation bearing date the 30th day of March 1849, in the words following; that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Dilhorne and Blurton, in the county of Stafford, and within the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said two parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, for the consecrated church of Saint Peter, situate at Forsbrook, in the said parish of Dilhorne, under and by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose, contained in the ninth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' or under or by virtue of any other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Forsbrook,' with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned:

"The consolidated chapelry of Forsbrook is bounded on the north by part of the said parish of Dilhorne, from which such proposed consolidated chapelry is separated, by proceeding from the north-western corner of a field marked No. 782 on the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Dilhorne in an easterly direction along the northern enclosure thereof, and of the fields Nos. 778 and 777; then southerly along the eastern enclosure of No. 795; then easterly along the northern enclosures of Nos. 812 and 813; then northerly along the western and easterly along the northern enclosure of field No. 814, and the northern enclosures of fields Nos. 815, 855, 853, 850, 849, and 883; then south-easterly along the eastern enclosures of fields Nos. 883 and 892, as far as the parish of Draycot; on the east the proposed consolidated chapelry is bounded by the said parish of Draycot, on the south by the parish of Stone, and by the turnpike-road leading from Blythe Marsh to Stone, as far as the south-western corner of a field in the said parish of Blurton, called Upper Gate Field, and on the west by the western enclosures of the field called Upper Gate Field, and part of the southern enclosure of Far Field, as also of the western enclosure of the latter field, and of Far Plough Field to the north-western corner thereof, where it meets the boundary line of the parish of Caverswall, by which parish it is then bounded on the west and north-west as far as the north-western corner of field No. 782, where the boundary of the said proposed consolidated chapelry commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured green and red:

"That the consents of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Lichfield (as the Bishop of the diocese), of the very Reverend the Dean of the cathedral church of Saint Mary and Chadd at Lichfield, and the chapter of the same church, as the patrons of the parish church of the said parish of Dilhorne, and of the Most Noble George Granville, Duke and Earl of Sutherland, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, as the patron of the parish church of the said parish of Blurton,

have been severally obtained to the formation of the hereinbefore proposed consolidated chapelry, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned; in testimony whereof the said John Bishop of Lichfield, and George Granville Duke and Earl of Sutherland have signed and sealed this representation, and the said dean and chapter have caused their common or capitular seal to be hereunto affixed:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that it has been mutually agreed between the dean and chapter of the said cathedral church at Lichfield, and the said George Granville Duke and Earl of Sutherland, as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners testified as hereinafter mentioned, and also of the said John Bishop of Lichfield, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Saint Peter, at Forsbrook aforesaid should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the said John Bishop of Lichfield, and by his successors, bishops of Lichfield, for ever:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said Representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed formation into a consolidated chapelry be accordingly made, and the agreement in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is hereby pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," or under or by virtue of any other power or authority vested in them by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, in the words following; that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Dewsbury, in the West Riding of the county of York,
