Milan, Decemb. 9.

HE Republick of Venice hath made a Treaty with our Governor the Count de Melgar, for 1500 Foot, and 500 Dragoons, which are to be paid on the fame foot as are the Troops of Lunenburgh now in the service of that State, and are to be sent home again within three Months after the Governor of Milan shall demind them, the Republick being obliged to make t'em up to the number they were when they entred into their Service, or to pay a Sum of Money in consideration thereof at the rate of so much a Man.

Vienna, Decemb. 20. The Cardinal Bonviss, the Pope's Nuncio at this Court, has, we are told, affured the Emperor, that his Holiness will assist him with a confiderable Supply of Money to be employed in the Preparations for the next Campagne. A great Council of War is appointed to be field here is the bog nping of February, at which the Duke of Lorrain will be present. The Imperial Officers that are here have most of them received the Money allowed them for their Recruits, being obliged to have their Companies completely the beginning of April. We told you in our last, that the Viner of Buta had cent another Letter to the P filmt of the Emperor's Council of War, she substa ce of it, as we are fince informed, is only this, that he, the said Visier, was expecting farther directions f om Adrianople, upon the Answer his Imperial Majesty had given to Aga Chelebi, that be would not begin any Conference or Negotiattio of Peace without the confent and satisfaction of his Ailies, and that he will, so soon as he has re-ceived them, send hither an account thereof, intima ing withal, that he believes the Grand Signior may be disposed, through the great desire he has to put an end to the War and the Calamities that attend it, to send Ambassadors hither to treat with fuch Persons as shall be authorized for that purpose by the Empgror and his Allies. The Princels Ragotzi has written 10 General Caprara in answer to the Letter she received from him, wherein she pretends a willingness to submit her self to the Emperor, but at the same time refuses to receive a Garison into the Castle of Mostgatz, and seems to believe that the condition of her Husband Count Teckelef, is not fuch as is reported, but on the contrary that he is very well treated by the Turk, and that he will return very suddenly. General Rabas is gone for Hungary & to give the necessary Orders concerning the Magazines which the Emperer has ordered to be provided at Comorra, and several other places of that Kingdom'.

days; when we expect likewise to hear what farther Proceedings will be had not after the Prisoners at Dufeld rps. The Sieur Bilderbeeque, Restdent of the States General of the United Provinces, is gone from hence to Bonne, to complim not the Elector of Cologne upon the death of the Bishop of Freisingue and Ratinbonne, his Electoral Highnesse's Brother.

Hamburgh, Decemb. 26. The Troops of La-menburgh, which served in Hungary this last Campagne are come back, having their Winter-quarters affigued them within the Territories of those Princes: The Count de Rapack who was appointed by the Emperor to conduct them, is arrived at Hancuer, to thank that Duke in the Emperors Name for the affishance of the said Troops. The Deputies which this City sentiame time ago to Vienna, to ropresent at that Court the State of the differences depending between them and the Duke of Zell, have not yet been able to obtain Audience of the Emperor. The Sieur Caunnz the Brandenburgh Minister is returned hither, and it s hoped, that by his Electoral Highuesses interposition the said differences, will be at last amicably composed. The Duke of Hanouer is gone for Italy, with the Dutchels his Wife, and the Prince his Bitleft Son, intending to pass the Carnaval at Penice or Genoua. They write from Holftein, that all the Low Lands are still under Water, that they have lost most of their Cattle, and that the misery of the Country People in these quarters can hardly be expressed. The last Letters from Poland gave an account, that the King hath summoned all the Senature of the Kingdom to meet the fourth of the next month at Zolkiew, to consult about the preparations for the next Campagne, which it's confidently faid will be greater than any that have been yet made on that fide fince the War. The advices from Moscow say generally, that the Czars appear very much inclined to enter into the League against the Turks, but they are not to be relyed upon, and therefore we must have patience till the Ambassadors of Poland arrive at that Court, when we shall hear with more certainty what the resolutions of the Czars are in this Conjuncture.

Eague, Jan. 1. The Province of Zealand having confented to the first payment of the Arrears of Subsidies due to the Elector of Brandenburgh, the Heer Van Szilte, who was sent hither by his Electoral Highness to receive the same, will now be very quickly dispatcht. The Sieur Guldenstolpe, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sueden, has since his Arrival here had several Conferences with the Deputies of the States General, about renewing, as is believed, the Alliance which is now going to expire between that Crown and this State. The Heer Spaen, Lieutenant-General of the Elector of Brandenburgh's Forgs, is still here.
